Three registered Jersey heifer calves will be awarded to three Eastland County 4-H Club members at Cisco on August 5 as a continuation of the County Youth Dairy Program, it was announced today from the County Agent's office.

All three of the heifers are dividend animals coming from those who had heifers and who raised them and who are now returning a calf to fulfill their obligations. The program is administered by an executive committee of business men from Cisco, Eastland and Rising Star. T. D. Wheat, of Eastland is chairman.

Those to get a heifer include Mary Caroline Berry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Berry, Mary Caroline is a member of the Cisco 4-H Club. Her brother, Ralph, also got a heifer under the program a year or so ago.

Robert Bell, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Townsend of Nimrod, will get one of the animals. Robert is a prominent member of the Seranton Club. He formerly lived in Fort Worth but now makes his home with his grandparents.

The other recipient will be Jimmy Sandlin of the Carbon 4-H Club. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. D. Sandlin of that community. His brother, Carrol Sandlin, also formerly had one of the animals.

H. T. Bonney of Petos No. 1 Mrs. F. W. Allen, regular field project 10 miles southeast of Ranger in Minerva J. Robinson Survey, has been plugged at 3,160 feet.

Plugging reports have been filed with the Railroad Commission for two wildcat failures in Eastland County.

Plugged at 4,021 feet was U.S. Smelting, Refining & Mining Co. No. 1 Fon Mitcham, Section 493, SP Survey, five miles northwest of Cisco.

Plugged at 1,585 feet was Burton W. Hancock, Eastland, No. 1 Paul Trippet, Section 44, Block 4, T&U Survey, three miles west of Eastland.

Location has been entered for Vaughan Production Co. No. 1-A M. Hagaman. It is a Hagaman (Marble Falls) Field project 2 1/2 miles north of Ranger. Site is 950 feet east and 1,700 feet north of the northeast corner of D. R. Kinchloe Survey 8, but in E. Chambliss Survey.

At the end of 1953, the United States had 801,859 producing oil wells scattered through 28 states. Many of these wells produce both oil and gas.

Major products made from crude oil are gasoline, kerosene, light and heavy fuel oils, lubricating oils, wax, asphalt, and rock.

America's first commercial oil well—the Drake well—was housed in a ramshackle wooden structure 35 feet high, and was drilled to a depth of 69 1/2 feet with a six-horsepower engine.

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

Serve fruit punch to children for mid-afternoon snacks. They are nutritious and delicious. Always make a sugar syrup for sweetening either small or large recipes of fruit punch. This eliminates the problem of undissolved sugar.

For a flaky brown crust, brush top of pies lightly with milk.

Empty lipstick tubes make good containers for pins and needles.

Take sardines, spread them with lemon juice and prepared mustard, and then grill under the direct flexible flame of your broiler. Serve them on buttered toast fingers.

For a salad treat, cucumbers may be peeled, cut into slices about two inches thick, hollowed out carefully, and then filled with

sardines, diced shrimp, salmon or tuna fish and mayonnaise. Serve on crisp lettuce, ice cold.

If you have the misfortune to get a fish bone caught in your throat, suck a lemon slowly to soften it.

On trips, hang a shoe bag back of the car seat — the pockets are handy for toys, maps, snacks, thermos, flashlight, wash cloth, sewing kit, etc.

Put your shopping list on a shipping tag and tie to purse or shopping bag for easy reference.

When you're baking ham, try a mixture of honey with half as much orange marmalade to give it an elegant glaze.

A wedding breakfast suggestion is fresh fruit cup with lemon sherbet, chicken a la king served on shortcake hot out of the oven, with asparagus tips, diced buttered carrots, wedding cake and coffee.

Dried or candied ginger makes a crunchy dessert topping. Put through a pepper grinder and sprinkle sparingly on fresh or frozen fruit.

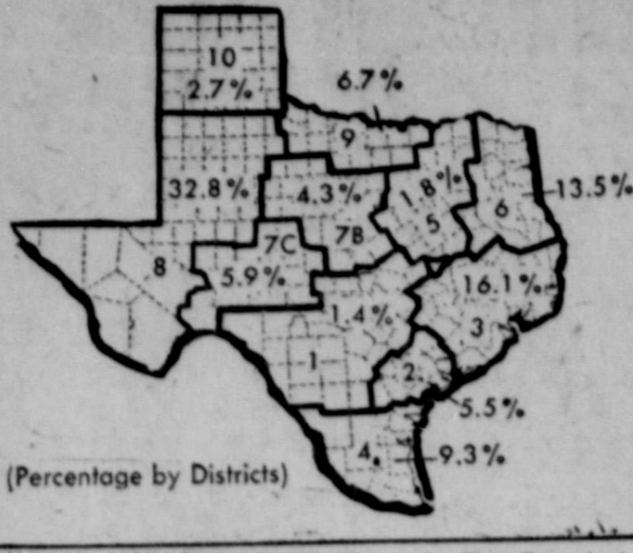


Dr. C. Aubrey Hearne

A minus \$129 million was listed for home owners and tenants in 1952. The 1953 estimate was a minus \$123 million and the 1954 estimate a minus \$132 million.

Expenses for aids and special services to veterans totaled \$4,710 million in 1952. In 1953 the estimate was \$4,411 million and in 1954 \$4,445 million.

International aids totaled \$4,596 million in 1952; \$5,616 million in 1953 and \$7,344 million in 1954.

Other aids and special services combined totaled \$1,364 million in 1952; \$1,530 million in 1953; and \$1,533 million in 1954.

Myrick explained that current expenses predominantly for the benefit of farmers consist chiefly of losses realized on the price support program, expenses of the International Wheat Agreement, Sugar Act payments, payments for removal of surplus commodities and administrative expenses of loan programs and other aids to farmers.

The major types of current Federal expenditures primarily benefiting business enterprises are the portions of the postal deficits arising from airmail and second, third and fourth-class mail, maritime operating subsidies and navigation and other aids to the shipping industry, various aids to air navigation and the net losses accruing on defense production aids.

The largest Federal expenditure in the field of aids to labor is for the Federal - State program of unemployment insurance.

In 1954, more than half of the current expenditures for aids to veterans are for compensation and pensions.

And all except \$181 million of the \$7,344 million in expenditures for international aids in 1954 will be for the mutual security program.

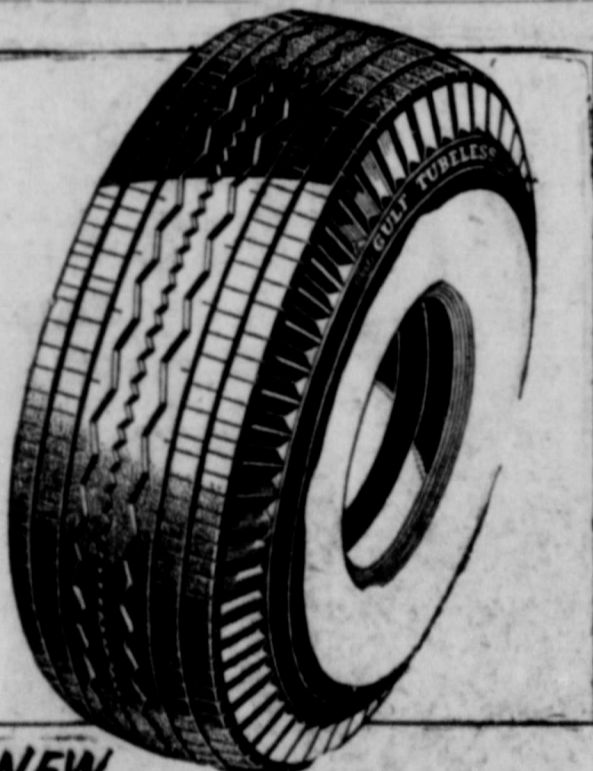

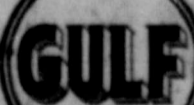
