Rail Worker Killed Near Cisco Friday

DUBLIN (TNS) - Funeral who was killed Friday morning eight miles west of Cisco when he was struck by a Texas and Pacific freight train, will be he Sunday at 2 p.m. in Dublin.

Mr. Kunker, a resident of Si phenville for the past years, w killed when the engine of a freigh train struck a hand car trailer he was attempting to remove from the tracks. Witnesses said Mr. Kunkler, who was a member of a T&P section erew, was with the crew on a motor car and trailer. The crew saw the train approaching from the east and began removing the hand car and trailer from the track. They succeeded ! removing the car and got the trailer partly off. Seeing that they could not complete the job, the erew, with the exception of Mr. Kunkler, abandoned it and ran. The fatally injured man apparently was still trying to free the trailer when the engine struck him. He was reported killed in-

Mr. Kunkler was born in Duster May 10, 1899 and lived in Dublin most of his life. He moved to Stephenville from Putnam recently






