Food Supply Source

This year many farm families in Texas have been growing soybeans for the first time. They are an important war crop with many chemurgic uses, too, and they rank higher in food value than other table beans.

Soybeans are a good source of protein, both in quantity and quality, says Miss Leila Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent. The fact is, they contain nearly two times as much protein and about 12 times as much fat as other kinds of dry beans. In addition they are a good source of calcium, phosphorus, and iron. And they contain valuable vitamins, includ-ing niacin which helps prevent

pellagra.

The light colored varieties are Petty. They should be soaked ov-ernight, then boiled two or three

Here are some recipes that you will want to try: Chile Con Carne With Soybean

2 cups cooked soybeans, ¼ lb. salt pork, diced; ¼ cup chopped onions: 1/4 lb. lean beef, ground; 2 cups tomatoes; 1 tablespoon chili powder. Fry the salt pork until crisp. Remove the pork and long way in protecting the land brown the onions. Add the beef. stir and cook slowly for five min utes. Then add the crisped pork and the remaining ingredients and heat to boiling.
