Look twice before choosing 'antiques'

By IRENE KEATING

Perhaps you'll be traveling rub off easily. and doing some antique hunting this summer. Here are some area of wear one where the obpointers on spotting genuine ject would have shown wear

ALWAYS examine pieces in a good strong light.

As wood ages its color does teristic. also, therefore, if an underside or interior area of an "antique" is scraped, it will show at once how the surface has aged if it is authentic.

Certain decorative markings show age and approximate years of construction. Crude dovetails on heavy drawers of bureaus and chests signify the early 1600's.

Look for signs of alteration: NEW SCREWS - Prior to 1850 screws did not taper and the slot in the head was hand-cut. Modern screws are machine cut and upon close observation one can see the uniformity of their shape. VENEERS - antique veneers were hand sawn and thick, approximately 1/8 inch. Modern veneers are much thin-

LOOK FOR areas of lightness which may mean acid or bleaching agents were used in an attempt to give the piece authenticity.

Be wary of carved pieces, especially mahogany. Examine every detail carefully. As a rule in fakes the carving has been well rubbed down. In an authentic antique the carving sharpness is still definable.

Beware of oak antiques. Oak is often disguised as an antique. Examine carefully.

The upturn in the Japanese economy has sparked heavy cotton buying by that country in order to keep the Japanese textile industry busy.

Pakistan, a major supplier of cotton to the Far East, will have a much smaller crop this year and the price of cotton from the source has jumped sharply. Russia and Mexico are also large cotton suppliers. Both are reporting smaller crops this year and will have little cotton if any to export. Russia had earthquakes which damaged an already small crop and Mexican cotton farmers were told to cut back in favor of food production.

US farmers planted about 11.2 million acres this spring, up 12% over last year. About 100,000 acres of that crop was hailed out May 23. Another 250,000 acres in West Texas will probably not produce much due to drought and the unusually cool weather in the Mississippi valley may reduce output there.

A SMALLER than normal US crop could spell real trouble. If the American production doesn't go over 10.5 million bales for the 1976-77 year; the price of cotton would be expected to go nearly \$1 per lb. with foreign demand strong. The only other time cotton hit that price was in 1973. However, history may not repeat itself.

DEPENDENTS of service personnel missing in action, captured, interned or forcibly detained in line of duty by a foreign power for more than 90 days may also qualify for the VA education benefits.

Unless extended under certain conditions, a child's VA educational eligibility ends on his 26th birthday, plus any time period after his 18th birthday required to process the application.

The eligibility of a spouse ends on Nov. 30, 1978, or 10 years from the date the veteran was found to have a total and permanent service-connected disability, or 10 years from the date of his death, whichever is later.

Spouses of service personnel declared missing in action, captured or detained in line of duty, are eligible for education benefits until Dec. 24, 1980, or for 10 years from the date the listing was made, whichever is later.

For a spouse intending to take apprenticeship, on-the-job or correspondence training, eligibility is based on the 10year period or Oct. 24, 1982, whichever is later.

A child's marriage is not a barrier to the education benefits, but the remarriage of a spouse ends his or her eligibility unless that marriage is terminated by death or divorce.

The VA benefits provide up to 36 months of schooling, or the equivalent of 36 months if the student is enrolled on a part-time basis.






