What Happens To You When You're Asleep?

Ever wonder exactly what happens to you when you crawl into bed for your nightly slumber?

Sleep, the psychologists say, is "a halfway state between consciousness and unconsciousness." You don't lapse into unconsciousness as you may have thought, for your brain and sense organs are still sufficiently alert to respond to danger signals.

During the course of a night's rest, periods of deep and shallow sleep usually alternate. If you go to bed at a normal hour, you rapidly enter a phase of deep slumber which gradually becomes lighter until about 3 or 4 a.m.

At this point, sleep may become so shallow that you almost regain consciousness. You may even awaken momentarily, although the chances are that you won't remember it in the morning. Sleep then deepens again gradually until about 6 a.m., after which it lightens until you awaken spontaneously or are aroused by some slight disturbance.

Trying to snatch a few extra moments of sleep after the alarm rings sometimes has a boomerang effect. Often, you feel more drowsy when you wake up the second time than you would have if you hadn't indulged yourself with a doze. The reason is that you slip into the sleep cycle again and return to the first phase of deep sleep rather than the slight degree of somnolence from which you originally awoke.

Contrary to popular opinion, the deepest sleep, which occurs in the first hour or two, isn't necessarily the most refreshing. The hours of shallow sleep are equally important for the recuperation process.

BETTI'S BUDGET OF HELPFUL HINTS

News for kitchen or bathroom floors: a decorative, new-type mat of foam rubber and plastic coated fiber. The mat, which measures 20 by 33 inches and is skid-proof, comes in seven patterns and plain colors. It's an eye-catcher and temper-aver for the household's vulnerable spots since grime, splatters, and footmarks can be washed off in an instant with a sudsy sponge.

Here's the recipe for chef salad bowl: Salad greens as lettuce, celery leaves, water cross, parsley, (enough to make 2 quarts chopped), 1 clove garlic, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon whole black pepper, 1 tablespoon Tarragon or Mint vinegar or lemon juice, 1-4 cup salad oil. Cut tiny checker-board pattern across top of garlic clove. Cut in thin slices directly into salad bowl. Add salt and pepper. Mash seasonings together. Add vinegar or lemon juice and salad oil. Mix well. Add salad dressing to crisp chopped vegetables. Toss until each leaf is coated but not dripping with dressing. Arrange over the top of salad bowl 6 slices of luncheon meat, sliced, 1-4 pound Swiss or Cheddar cheese sliced, 2 slices hard cooked eggs, 1-2 cup sliced cucumber, 2 coarsely grated carrots or 1-2 cup sliced radishes, and 1 sliced onion. Serves 4.

Crib and carriage pads need frequent laundering. You'll actually like the job when you achieve sparkling white results — and that's easy as can be. Just make it a habit to use hot water, an all-purpose soap or syndet, and the bluing that comes in bead form. Be thorough about rinsing — be sure of real cleanliness.

Here's the recipe for that Nib-bait everyone is talking about: 1-2 box bite-size shredded rice biscuits, 12 box bite-size shredded wheat biscuits, 1-2 box ready-to-eat cereal, 1-2 box pretzel sticks, 1 can salted peanuts, 1-2 lb. butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 2 teaspoons celery salt, 1 teaspoon garlic salt, 2 teaspoons seasoned salt. Mix cereals, pretzel sticks and peanuts in large shallow pan. Melt butter or margarine with Worcestershire sauce and pour mixture. Toast in slow oven, 250 degrees F., 30 minutes, stirring often. Combine salts, sprinkle over cereal mixture, blending well. When cool, store in tin boxes or cans.

Crisp, juicy red apples are now abundant on the market. Because they're thrifty in season, and tasty eating anytime, you'll want to include this fruit often on your fall menus. Apples make a really different sandwich just right for perking up school lunches. Cut cinnamon bread in thin slices. Create margarine or butter and spread lightly on bread. Pare apple, core and cut in thin slices. Arrange on a slice of bread and cover with a second slice. Accompany with wedges of snappy cheese.

THIS fall, slickers for teenagers have taken on a brand-new look in a black-and-white herringbone tweed effect. Same waterproof oilskin, same complete rainy weather protection, but now the coat's pretty enough to wear on fair days, too.

Budget-priced so that it can be paid for from a teen's allowance, the new slicker is worn with a matching head-hugging cloche. It's done in a lightweight cloth that supplies supple texture and strength without weight. Color is in the coating, which is applied many times to make the fine percale sheeting completely waterproof.

This year, the slicker comes in classic yellow, bright red, pastel pink, sky blue and navy and includes sizes for everyone in the family.

Trim is in form of brass hook-and-eye fasteners plus a black corduroy-lined collar.

In the 1920's, the well-loved slicker cracked and became tacky in no time at all. The 1954 slicker won't do this because machine oiling creates a uniform coating that keeps the fabric pliable and soft.
