Rangers Play Strong Allen Team Saturday

The fighting Rangers of the Ranger Junior College, pack up baggage and take a trip to Bryan Saturday, where they will meet the Allen Academy Ramblers on its home field in a football engagement scheduled for 2:30 p.m.

Head Coach Dick Henderson, assistants, Sam Aills and Pat Thomas and the squad of Rangers are scheduled to board a bus at 5:30 a.m. Saturday for the jaunt to Bryan and a game which may test the high flying Rangers.

Both Henderson and Coach Doyle Walker of Allen had made preseason predictions that each would have one of the best teams ever fielded. The Saturday game will be the test.

The upset victory of last Saturday over the Wharton County Pioneers have put the Rangers in the spotlight during the past week.

The Ramblers are an unknown quantity at the present as the coming game will be their season debut and how superior the Rangers may or may not be is yet to be determined. Without exceptions, reports from Bryan have indicated that Allen has a strong team. It is possible that the Rangers, with the advantage of a game

behind them, will have the edge on the Ramblers.

The comparative ease with which Ranger pushed the Wharton team aside last week, despite noticeable rough spots, and ragged edges, should send them into the game Saturday as favorites. During sessions this week the Ranger coaches have had an opportunity to work on the obvious weaknesses which appeared in the first game of the season, and the Rangers should be in better condition to battle it out with the Ramblers.

After scouting the Rangers-Pioneers game last Saturday, the Allen coach was not so optimistic, and said, "We could have our best club and still lose to Ranger by five touchdowns."

Except for those who play benches, the Dallas Morning News, staff writer, Buster Haas, says the Rangers should be favorites.

Waller's early season optimism of Allen's strength was based on twelve returning letter men.

Among the freshmen who have impressed Waller and may earn a starting berth are Halfback Rucky Whitehead of Jasper, Quarterback David Williams of Sour Lake, Tackle Jim Hawk of Cameron and Center Arthur Simmons of Newton.

Charles Gray, a 200-pound returning letter man who led the

team in rushing last season, is expected to open this season at fullback with 190-pound Stan Bullock, also a returning letter man, in reserve.

Tackles Gerard Losack, 205, of Orchard and Arlen Moye, 190, of Saratoga; Guards Gean Gilbert, 185, of Jasper and Tom Rape, 165, of St. Louis, Mo., and End John Louviere, 185, of Sour Lake, all returning letter men, along with all-conference Bobby Bishop, 165, of Cameron, are expected to land starting berths on basis of performances so far.

Henderson said that as a whole the team is in good condition physically and Herold Merryfield, the fleet-footed back from Ballinger, should be ready to start against Allen.

Coach Dick Henderson said early this afternoon that 33 players, three coaches and one team manager would make the trip to Bryan.

The tentative starting lineup for the Rangers was listed as follows:

Glitsrap and Smith, ends; Bleeker and Scott, tackles; Gibbs and Reed, guards; Hawkins, center; Wood, quarterback; Merryfield and Parrott, halfbacks and Lennomond, fullback.

Ranger Youths Escape Serious Injury Tuesday

Four youths, students at the junior college, narrowly escaped serious injury about 9:45 p.m. Tuesday when the car in which they were riding overturned and rolled down an embankment, coming to rest in a ditch about 20 feet below the level of paving on Lakeside Drive.

Most seriously injured was Miss Bobbie Fox, 18, who was badly bruised and suffered a broken left ankle. She was pinned in the car and remained there at least 20 minutes before she could be removed. She was rushed to the Ranger General Hospital in a Killingsworth ambulance, where she was still a patient this morning. It was reported that her condition is not serious.

Other passengers in the car were, Miss Delores Hagar, 19; Harold Roberts, 18 and Bill Spears, 19. Roberts was driving. Both Miss Hagar and Roberts were treated at the Ranger General Hospital but were released, after treatment of minor injuries. Spears escaped without injury.

Roberts, who was driving, told Ranger Patrolman John Shook, who investigated the accident, that he was driving down Lakeside Drive, toward Willows Park. As he rounded a curve, the right wheels of the car went off the pavement onto loose gravel and he lost control.

The car appeared to have left the street and went over an embankment and completely overturned and came to rest on the right side.

It was a 1951 Ford coach, owned by W. T. Hager, father of one of the passengers, and has been estimated as a total loss.

Bulldogs Are Ready For Visiting Bears

For their first game of the season on the home field the Ranger High Bulldogs will entertain a reportedly improved team of Brewer High Bears from Fort Worth at Bulldog Stadium on Friday night. Game time is 8 p.m.

Coach Boone Yarbrough said this morning that prospects of the Bulldogs had shown considerable improvement since the disaster at Colorado City last Friday night.

"Wednesday's workout," he said, "was the best we have had this year, and the boys actually looked greatly improved over all past performances. If we can pickup where we left off at the end of yesterday's practice, we will be ready for the Bears."

The work of Charles Bonney at guard was a standout in Wednesday's practice, Yarbrough stated.

Reported from the Fort Worth camp of the Brewer Bears indicate that the Bulldogs have their work cut out for them Friday night and it will be anything but a breather.

The Bears, rated low before the beginning of the season, in District 10-AA, apparently was the sensational team of that district last week. The soundly trounced a highly rated eleven from Granbury by a 27 to 0 score.

"Brewer owns probably the toughest line in District 10-AA, the kind that can open up big holes and let you score," is the opinion of Jerre Todd of the Fort Worth Press.

Standout on the Brewer eleven is a boy by the name of Stafford

Reeves. He is a senior and his weight is listed at only 156. For the past two seasons he has turned in a good job at right end, but this year has been shifted to fullback. In the game against Granbury he carried the ball 11 times for a total yardage of 134, or an average of 12.1 yards per try. He accounted for three of the Brewer touchdowns.

Stabby Warden, who scouted the Brewer game, has confirmed the glowing reports of sports writers regarding the hard charging runs Reeves reeled off on the offense. He is also a powerhouse on the defense. He divides time defensively either at end or line backer positions, depending upon the type of defense being used.

The star of the Brewer Bears is also a Golden Gloves boxing champion.

This is the third year for football at the suburban high school of Fort Worth. They had won only one game at the end of their first two years of play. The game last week was the second time a Bear team had come out victor.

Bear Coach John Bray is reported to have said, "We want to change that record, and Stafford Reeves is going to help us do it."

Coaches Yarbrough and Warden have this week been concentrating on a defense pattern designed to lottle up the hard charging fullback from Brewer, and the skill practice sessions on defense have been centered in that direction.

Whether or not they have succeeded in mapping a defense is yet to be seen, but the Bulldogs will enter the game aware of the fact that this is going to be a game that will not be easy.

Yarbrough said a number of the boys on the squad are rapidly showing improvement and will develop into good players before many more games.

Injury list for the Bulldogs still included Pennie Robinson, halfback, who is suffering from an injured ankle. Yarbrough does not plan to use him any more than necessary until it has a chance to improve. Scott Forney, quarterback is still suffering from a bad wrist, but will likely start the game.

Dan Cruise, who has been showing great promise at a guard position is out with a broken collar bone. Just how long he will be out was not known today.

In listing a probable line-up for the Friday night affair, Yarbrough said there would be some "ifs and auds." If John-Rush should start at center, Ronald Push will probably be used as a starter at right end. Final decision is yet to be made for a left tackle starter, either Pete Jameson or Archie Robinson, and the same is true on the right guard spot, where it may be either Charles Bonney or Gary Patterson.

John D. Wheat Now Professor At Kansas State

A former Ranger man, John D. Wheat, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. L. Wheat of the Morton Valley community, has been appointed an assistant professor of animal husbandry at Kansas State College, Manhattan. The announcement was made from the office of James A. McCain, college president. Wheat will teach and do research in genetics.

He received his B. S. degree from Texas A&M in 1942, and his M. S. degree from the same institution in 1951. He expects to receive a Ph.D. degree from the Iowa State College in December.

Wheat was an officer in the medical administrative corps of the Army from 1942 to 1946, and served two years overseas in the Pacific theatre. He is married to the former Margaret Burton, and they have two children, Mary Jeanette, age 2, and John David, Jr., age 1.

Polio Victims Being Sent To Warm Springs

Late reports on the condition of both Robert and Mary Jane Maddux, children of Mrs. C. S. Maddux, who were stricken with polio and have been in Hendricks Memorial Hospital since early in August, indicate they are improved.

Mrs. Maddux states that they are to be taken to the Gonzales Warm Springs, near Gonzales, Texas, on Sept. 20. Enroute to Gonzales, they will stop at their home in Ranger over the weekend.

Both Robert and Mary Jane have been showing some improvement, although it has been slow. They have been able to sit in wheel chairs a part of the time for several days.

Transport Spills New Cars On Hill

After an auto transport truck jack-knifed on Highway 80 as the driver attempted to make it up Ranger Hill shortly before midnight Wednesday, new Oldsmobiles were strewn over the highway. Traffic was blocked for some time until Highway Patrolmen unscrambled the jam.

Patrolmen, upon making an investigation of the accident, arrested W. L. Watson, the driver, who gave an address of Gunter, Texas, and placed him in the Ranger city jail. He was carried to Eastland today where charges were filed against him.

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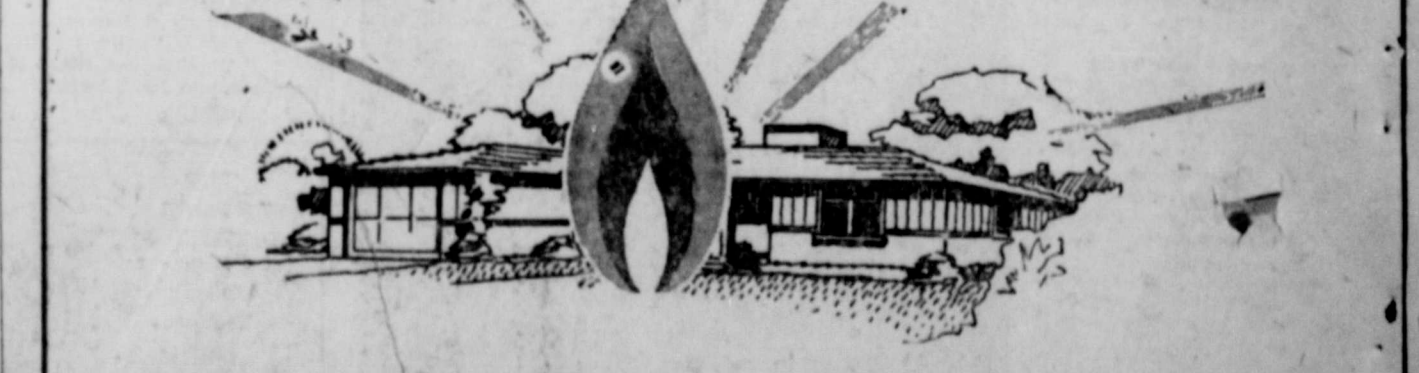

Bible Comment: Ideal Of Church-Home Still Lives

For Sept. 19

When we look back on the origins of the Christian church, we are reminded that the churches, in various places where the missionary journeys of Paul and others led to their establishment, were in the homes of the disciples.

Saint Paul, in greeting Priscilla and Aquila, says, "Likewise greet the church that is in the house."

A church could not very well be maintained in a home without the family being a part of it, and family religion is strongly exemplified in the experiences of these early Christians.

The home and family, therefore, were of great importance in the beginnings of the Christian church. Their status suggests very clearly what ought to be the relationship between the church and the home, between Christian belief and practice and family life, at all times, and in all places.

However, one must realize without any undue pessimism that in most, if not in all, communities today the facts and conditions regarding church and home are very different from those that the New Testament records.

In the great multitude of cases, such strictly Christian homes are perhaps the exception, even where there is profession of Christian faith. To mention one example: For good or bad, the rule of parents in the home is no longer what it was in those early Christian homes.

And present-day conditions create new difficulties, as families are not often together as they once were.

But the ideal, implicit in Christian faith and teaching, and in the close association of home and church in the days of early Christianity, still remains.
