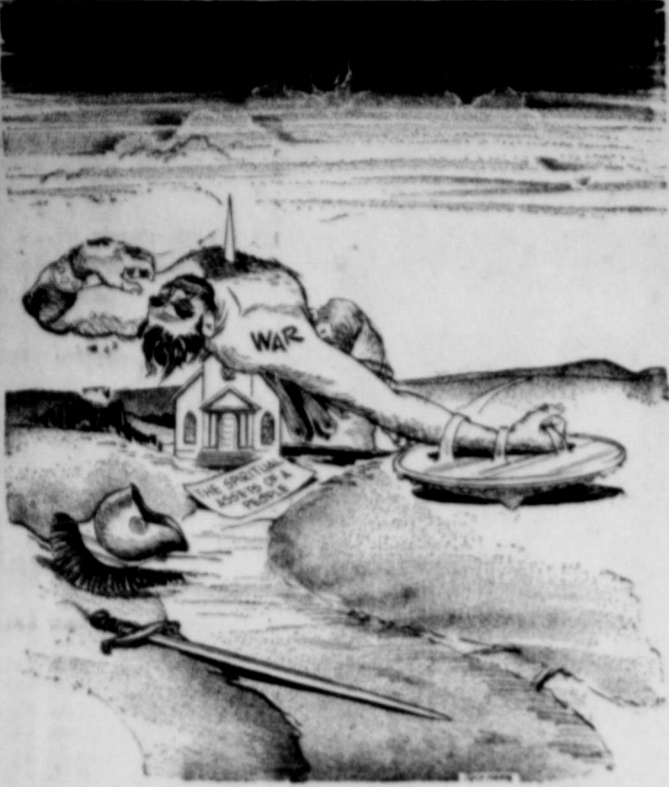

 - 2 cups milk
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon sage
- Combine meat, salt, pepper, parsley and mayonnaise. Spread 4 slices bread with butter or margarine, cover with meat mixture and top with slices of bread. Place sandwiches in greased shallow casserole dish. Combine eggs, milk, salt and sage and mix well. Pour over sandwiches and let stand in refrigerator at least an hour before baking. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F) about 45 minutes until brown and puffed. Makes 4 servings.

And they're really lovely. Tweed is literally going places — from shopping to dance spots — from country to town!

Here's a good tip for using beef stew meat. When you see an extra good buy on beef stew meat, buy several pounds — enough to last for two or three days — and make up a basic stew, omitting the vegetables. Store in the refrigerator and serve every other day during the week, cooking different vegetables with the meat each time. If you do not care for so many steaks in one week, freeze several batches of the stewed beef to use within a few weeks.

If your hairdresser accidentally spills some of that hair coloring solution on your favorite washable fabric dress here's the simplest and best way to remove the stain: Just soak the garment for several minutes in a solution of detergent suds to which one tablespoon of hydrogen peroxide has been added.
