Rangers Shatter Arlington From Unbeaten List 21 - 14

Last Period Counters End Rebels Bowl Bid

The Ranger Junior College, a group of opportunists, knocked the once-mighty Arlington State Rebels, the nation's number two junior college team, from the unbeaten ranks 21-14 Saturday night at Arlington.

Coach Dick Henderson's Rangers combined a stingy defense that allowed the Rebels only 122 yards rushing as compared to their 298 season average, and three last quarter touchdowns to hand the Rebels their first defeat of the season and break a 14 game winning streak that began last year.

The win marked the first time in three campaigns that Arlington has been defeated in Pioneer Conference play.

Tommy Woods and Charles Lenamond breathed fire into the Ranger squad as they entered the last quarter trailing 2-14, after Bobby Pharris had tackled an Arlington ball handler behind his goal line in the third stanza, for two points.

In the opening minutes of the final stanza, the Rangers took a punt on their 40-yard line. Utilizing the TCU spread that Rangers high school and college have employed so effectively in recent contests, Woods completed a 52-yard pass and run play to End Raymond Gilstrap that carried to the Arlington eight. Woods added three on a line blast. Lenamond added two and scored on his next effort from two yards out. The point after kick was blocked.

NEW 1955 FORD TRUCKS GO ON DISPLAY HERE FRIDAY

Twenty-four series, including 190 models of 1955 Ford trucks ranging from 30-ton tandem-axle "Big Jobs" down to F-100 pickups, all designed to make money for operators on every hauling job, will be introduced Friday in Ranger by Bagwell - Roberson Motors.

L. D. Cruse, Ford Motor Company vice president and general manager of Ford Division, in announcing the new truck models, said: "A truck should be bought with the same consideration for low cost operation as any machine tool. Actually a truck is a capital goods item and when we design them we think of them that way. All of our new trucks have greater durability, more gas economy and lower maintenance expense built into them."

Ford's five truck engines, built exclusively for the truck lines, include Six and V-8 engines. Three engines have increased horsepower and compression ratios.

The 1955 models have new larger parking lights and larger, shield-shaped tail lights adaptable to class "A" turn signals. They are manufactured in five lines and 24 series which include: nine conventional series, six cab forward series, four school bus chassis series, two tandem axle series, two parcel delivery chassis series and

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF RANGER, ON DECEMBER 4, 1954

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger that a special election will be held in the City of Ranger at the City Hall on December 4, 1954, as provided for in the following ordinance passed by the City Commission on November 2, 1954:

An ordinance providing for the submission to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger, Texas, of a certain amendment to the Charter of said City to be voted on at a Special Election to be held in said City on December 4, 1954.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ranger: That there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger at a special election on December 4, 1954, the following proposed amendment to the present charter of said City of Ranger:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

1. That Sections Two, Eight, and Nine, all of Article V of said Charter of the City of Ranger be so amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 2 — Term of Office: The Mayor and each Commissioner shall serve as follows:
Beginning in the year 1955 the Mayor and Commissioners of Places Two and four shall serve for a term of two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified, unless sooner removed from office as herein provided.
Beginning in the year 1955 the Commissioners of Places One and Three shall serve as follows:
For one year beginning with the 1955 term, and thereafter beginning with the 1956 term for two years; and until his successor is elected and qualified, unless sooner removed from office as herein provided."

"Section 8 — Election Day. The regular municipal elections of the City of Ranger shall be held on the first Tuesday in April in the year 1955, and on said first Tuesday in April every year thereafter."

"Section 9 — Election, Laws Controlling. All elections provided for in this Chapter, except the regular election held on the first Tuesday of April, 1955, and on said day every year thereafter shall be called special elections, and all elections shall be conducted and results canvassed and announced by the election authorities prescribed by the Election Code of the State of Texas, and said Election Code shall control in all municipal elections, except as otherwise herein provided."

2. That all parts of the existing city charter of the City of Ranger in conflict herewith, and especially Sections 2, 8, and 9, all of Article V, as the same now exist, are hereby repealed and said Sections 2, 8, and 9 of Article V, as the same herein read, be substituted therefor.

Why Business Hates War

PITTSBURGH—The Kremlin's accusation that the American business man is a war-monger is the greatest insult of the twentieth century, Clem D. Johnson, President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, pointed out in a recent address before the National Defense Transportation Congress here.

Actually, he said, a peaceful world is the greatest hope of the American business community.
"If we laid all other considerations aside," Mr. Johnson asserted, "logic alone would dictate our hope for peace. Our industry would be the prime target for attack in the event of another war — as every thinking person knows."
"In a third great war, there would be no dividing line between the battle front and the home front. Industry is the front line in a modern war."
"Further, war invites controls on business, and they are harder to get rid of than the seven-year itch. War kills or maims the men that business needs worst—the skilled and the talented. Nobody line in a modern war."

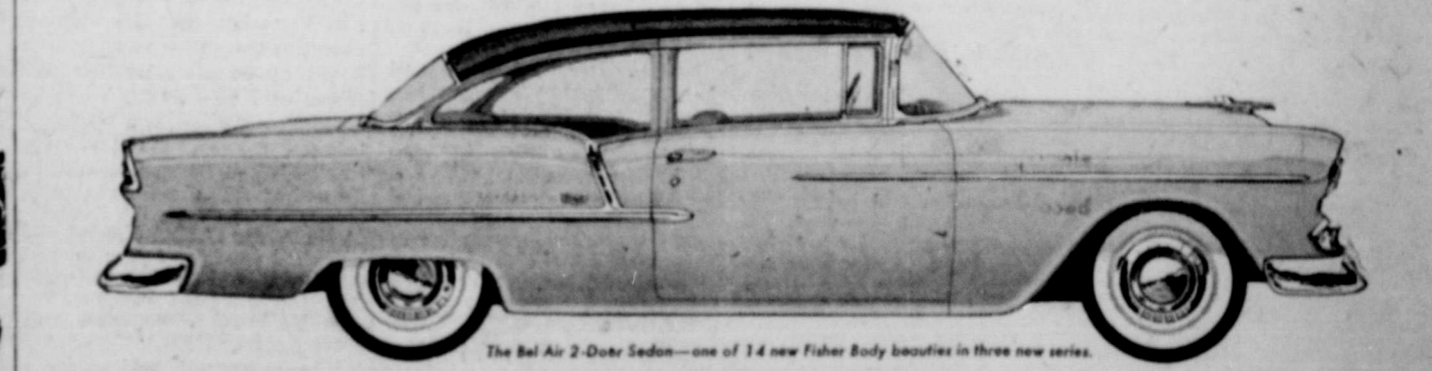

IT'S THE LAW

PATENTS AND COPYRIGHTS EXPLAINED

Alert observers frequently notice that some goods or articles are patented, whereas other seemingly similar items are copyrighted. The question accordingly arises as to what constitutes the difference between a patent and a copyright.

Patents are granted to inventors on new and useful articles of manufacture, compositions of matter, methods and processes, ornamental designs of articles of manufacture and certain types of plants.

Copyrights are granted to authors, composers or artists on works such as books (which includes not only bound volumes, but also pamphlets, leaflets and even single sheets), periodicals, speeches, plays, musical compositions, phonograph records, works of art, including sculptured works, maps, photographs and motion pictures.

The function of a patent or copyright is to give its owner the right to exclude all others from infringing the patent or copyright—that is, from practicing the invention or copying the copyrighted material. Patents give protection against any infringer who makes, uses, the invention, regardless of whether he is a copyist and regardless of whether he actually knew of the patent. Copyrights, on the other hand, give protection only against a copyist and not against one who independently does the same thing.

A patent runs for seventeen years and cannot be renewed. A copyright runs twenty-eight years and may be renewed once for an additional period of twenty-eight years.

An inventor or author may himself apply for a patent or copyright. However, only persons trained in such work should prepare and prosecute the necessary applications, since it often happens that an unskilled person, because of his lack of knowledge of the law and the procedure, will do irreparable damage to the rights to which the inventor or author was originally entitled. Sometimes

rights are forfeited completely through the mistakes of such unskilled persons.

Be Cautious With Cabbage; If Not Overcooked It's Delightful

Cook cabbage by all means now that it's plentiful and reasonable and good — but cook it easy! Of all vegetables, cabbage objects most strongly to overcooking. Handled gently — simmered only until tender and not a moment more — cabbage is a culinary delight. Its color is fresh, delicate, green, its flavor, mild and pleasant. Need it be mentioned that cabbage is often abused, and therefore much underrated?

Here are two recipes worthy of cabbage at its best — meaning, very fine eating indeed.

SCALLOPED CABBAGE WITH HAM
2 pounds (about 3 quarts) shredded fresh green cabbage
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
3 tablespoons flour
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-8 teaspoon pepper
1-2 cups milk
1-2 cups diced, cooked ham
2 cups corn flakes
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine

Cook cabbage in boiling salted water only until tender; drain well. Melt butter in saucepan; stir in flour and seasonings. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly; cook until thickened, stirring occasionally. Combine cabbage and ham in greased 2-quart casserole; cover with sauce. Crush corn flakes slightly; mix with melted butter. Sprinkle over sauce. Bake in moderately hot oven (400°F) about 15 minutes or until thoroughly heated.

Yield: 6 servings, about 1 cup each.

water to soften. Combine remaining ingredients in order given; mix well. Place spoonfuls of meat mixture on each of the cabbage leaves. Roll up and fasten with toothpicks. Place in kettle; pour on Tomato Sauce. Cover. Simmer about 30 minutes or until cabbage leaves are tender.

Yield: 6 servings.

TOMATO SAUCE
1-4 cup salad oil
1-2 teaspoon pepper
1-4 cup chopped onions
3 tablespoons tomato paste
1-2 cup water
2 cups cooked tomatoes
1 bay leaf
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon sugar

Heat salad oil with pepper in saucepan for 2 minutes. Add onions and simmer until tender. Combine tomato paste and water; add to oil and pepper mixture in three parts, letting mixture boil rapidly after each addition. Stir in tomatoes, bay leaf and salt; cook until thick. Stir in sugar; cook about 15 minutes longer, stirring frequently to prevent scorching. Pour over Cabbage Rolls.
