#### Guard Vehicles Log 1200 Miles On Sunday Trip

## EDITORIAL

### (In Recognition of Education Week)

It has often been said that the public schools belong to all the people. This statement implies that the people have both rights and responsibilities toward their schools. On one hand, they have the right to determine the policies governing such things as the curriculum, the employment of teachers, and the construction of new schools. On the other hand, they are responsible for providing the public schools with the necessary financial and moral support.

The people of a community exercise these rights and carry out their responsibilities through their local schoolboards. These local officers should be the most carefully selected of all public officials. They should be the best qualified persons available and should be genuinely interested in improving public education.

The local school board stands between the school personnel and the people. Therefore, the board has the obligation of keeping the people informed not only of the needs of the public schools, but also of the good work that the schools are doing. The board has the obligation of finding out from the people what kind of school they want and need.

The actual operation of the public schools is a responsibility of the school personnel—their job is to carry out the sincere desires of the people, but not to be told how to teach fractions, for example. All three—the people, the school board, and the school personnel—should understand and respect one another's roles in public education.

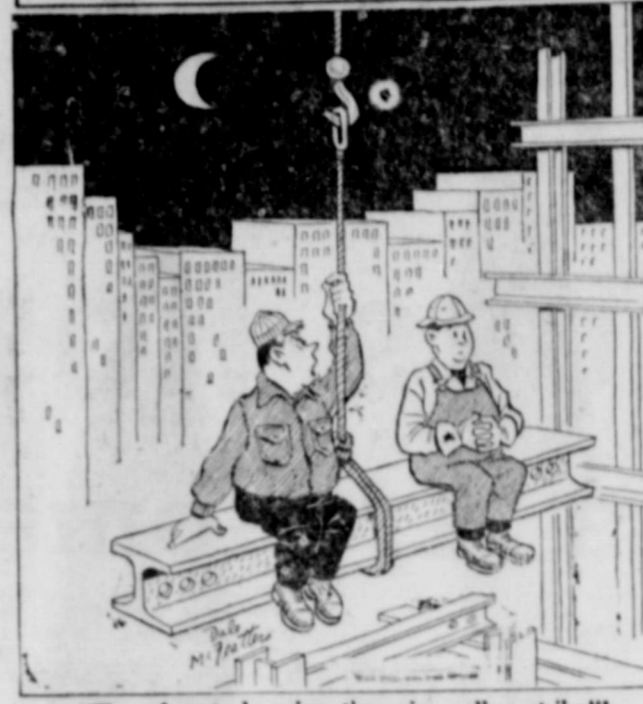

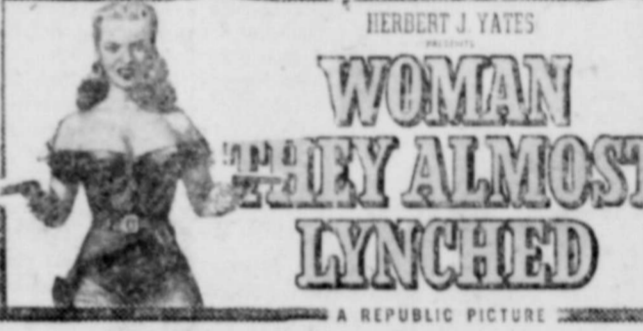

### Quarter Million Set For Big Game

AUSTIN — Reports to the Game and Fish Commission head quarters indicate that an army of about a quarter of a million deer hunters is ready for the annual fall venison derby.

The executive secretary of the Commission said indications point to "a very good season considering the ravages of the long drought," and estimated the combined bag will be "about 40,000 bucks."

The statewide season in areas covered by the General State Law ranges from November 16 through December 31. The twenty-eight county regulatory Panhandle area has a ten-day season beginning November 14. The West of the Pecos regulatory area, comprising nine counties, starts from November 20 through November 25 inclusive. A nine-county Possum Kingdom group hunts from November 16 through November 30, inclusive.

There are so many local county seasons that the Executive Secretary advises hunters to study a Game Law Digest, available through license dealers, or contact their local Game Wardens, or both. Two buck deer may be taken under the General State Law but the other periods provide for only one male deer per person per season. A legal buck deer is described as one "with a pronged horn."

Hunters were cautioned to know their horns since late reports from the Hill Country, which comprises the main deer area, show an unusual population of spike bucks, or one year olds, running to as high as 40 per cent of the entire deer herds in most areas.

A feature of this year's overall deer harvest will be the taking of more than 2,000 antlerless deer in Mason, Gillespie and Llano counties in a move to reduce overpopulation and the herd dieoff caused by shortage of food from the drought. Dates for this hunt are December 1 to 15, inclusive. Special permits are required. Interested hunters should write the Chamber of Commerce at Fredericksburg, Mason or Llano.

Another innovation will be the harvest of fifty surplus buck deer on the Kerr Wildlife Management Area near Kerrville. A drawing was held to determine eligible hunters for this free shoot from November 16 through November 29, inclusive. The Executive Secretary said landowners and ranchers reported "a normal interest" in deer leases. He urged hunters to observe the law requiring tags attached to their licenses to be affixed to their bucks.

Coinciding with the deer shoot, is the wild turkey season under the General State Law and under assorted county laws. The General State Law limit is three gobblers. The limit varies under regional and county laws. Deep South Texas reported the best turkey population.

### Fall Season Brings Whooping Cough Increase

AUSTIN, November 11, 1954.— This is the time of the year that usually marks an increase in the incidence of whooping cough. Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, said today that strenuous efforts should be made to control the spread of this debilitating childhood disease.

"The only source from which whooping cough may be contracted is another case of whooping cough, and isolation of cases must be universally practiced to prevent its spread," Dr. Holle stated. "The infectious agent or germ of whooping cough is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing, or speaking," he declared. "The discharges from the nose and throat are dangerous; the need for early recognition and careful isolation of whooping cough is obvious."

"The first sign of this disease is usually a dry cough, which persists night and day and tends to become increasingly severe. The disease is fully developed when vomiting of food and whooping accompany the paroxysm of cough. Dr. Holle stressed the fact that children who have whooping cough should not attend school or come in contact with other children, until three weeks after the appearance of typical signs of the disease.

"Prevention and control of whooping cough, especially among infants and small children, may be accomplished through use of approved vaccine and convalescent serum," Dr. Holle asserted, "and it is important that such measures be taken to protect them. Neglecting to do so may seriously impair the child's health."

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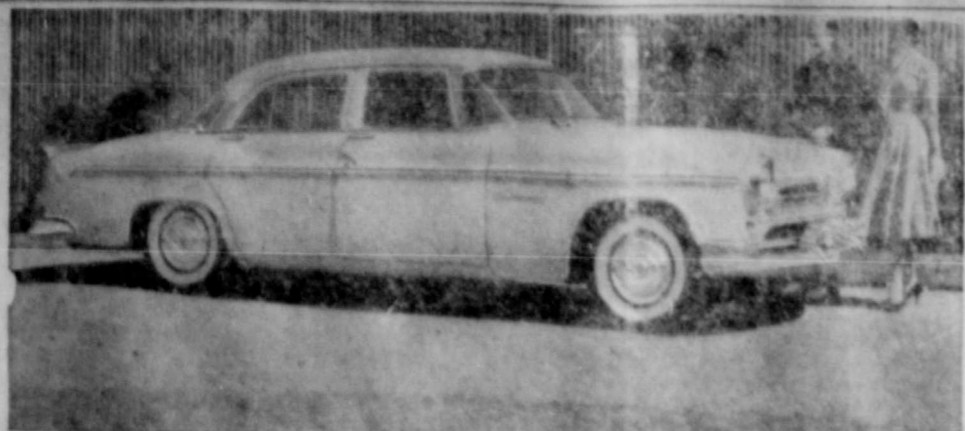

### Mother Goose In Texas

I had a little dog, his name was Buff,

I sent him to the shop for a hap'orth of snuff. He broke the bag and spilt the snuff; So take one cuff, and that's enough.

The "little dog" was a common subject for rhyme in the old World Mother Goose lore, being represented by numerous rhymes, only a few of which ever became known in this country. To say that the rhyme quoted above or similar rhymes in the classic inspired pioneer kids in America to make rhymes about their "little dogs," as well as the "houn' dog," would be just guessing. It would have been strange if they had not done so.

Best known of all "little dog" rhymes in American childlore is: I had a little dog, his name was Rover; When he died he died all over; All but his tail and it turned over; Over and over and ten times over.

The little dog, like the houn' dog, was generally a subject for ridicule, being always affectionate, loyal and somewhat stupid, as well as being often more than a little of a nuisance. This rhyme seems of recent origin.

I had a little dog, his name was Tim; I put him in the tub to see could he swim. He dranked all the water and et all the soap, And he blame near died with a bubble in his throat.

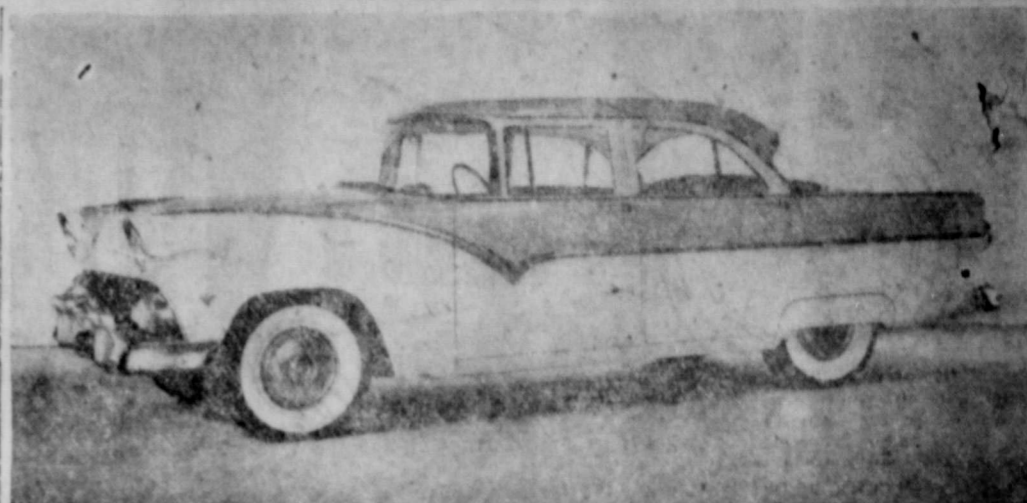

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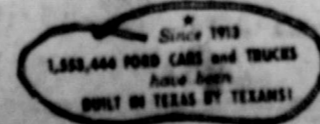

## 'New Sign of Life' To Appear On Highway With Inception of Radar

A new "sign of life" will appear on many of the highways of Texas this month. It's a new highway traffic sign and, like most of the others which are familiar roadside markers to motorists, it is designed to prevent costly motor vehicle accidents and save human lives.

These new signs will read "Speed Limits Radar Enforced" and the Texas Highway Department has slated their early construction in order that they will be in place by mid-November when the Texas Department of Public Safety is expected to begin the operation of Radar equipped patrol cars on the principal traffic arteries throughout the State.

Texas will thus join 31 other states and 50 cities which are currently employing Radar as a device for lowering the traffic accident rate due to excessive speed.

During the past several months the Texas Department of Public Safety has conducted an educational demonstration program of the Radar units in each of the 16 Texas Highway Patrol Districts within the State. Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the DPS, says that these demonstrations have been staged for the benefit of members of the press, radio and TV as well as for public officials, including judges and prosecutors, in order to acquaint them with the operation and the accuracy of the devices.

"We know of no instance," said Garrison, "in which those who

have witnessed these demonstrations have failed to acknowledge the accuracy and the fairness of this method of coping with fast drivers."

The Public Safety Director also pointed out that speed continues to be the principal contributing factor in the State's fatal traffic accident picture. He emphasized that Radar is no "cure-all" for the traffic problem and, in no way, replaces manpower in the enforcement of the speed laws.

"Rather," Garrison added, "we consider it only as another tool to be utilized in protecting the public against the consequences of the acts of the thoughtless, the careless and the indifferent drivers who constitute a menace to the public safety by driving too fast for conditions."

According to Garrison the "Speed Limits Radar Enforced" signs will be erected immediately outside the city limits of towns on the approach to stretches of highway where the mobil Radar units will be employed and just inside the state lines on those roadways where they will be in use. Additional signs will be placed, also, between the cities where it is deemed necessary to inform the public of the enforcement procedure being employed.

## Inspection Rush Expected After First of Year

Texans, individualists that they are, have already started a potential waiting line at the State's automobile inspection stations.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that the waiting line was shaping up now to precede the inspection deadline next April 15th.

The Public Safety Director based his conclusion on the fact that auto inspections at mid-October were running more than 100,000 behind the figure for the first month of the 1953 inspection period. He said that unless waiting to secure a check of their vehicles may be averted by motorists if they will visit one of the 4,000 inspection stations at an early date.

"None of the 4,000 stations are too rushed to give you prompt attention at this time," Garrison stated, "but if the figures for the first month's operation under the new inspection period are any indication, we can expect long lines at most of the stations in April. This situation can easily be averted if motorists will visit a station in the near future and secure the annual inspection."

Garrison pointed out that members of the Texas Highway Patrol "handled some 12,000 violations of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law" during the period from April 15th to September 1, 1954.
