Their initial tally developed on a 12 yard pass play from Ed Cheek, the Cardinal workhorse, to End Jerry Tidmore. Cheek added the extra point.

83-Yard Pass  
The Rangers retaliated with the 83-yard run-pass play that later proved to be the winning score of the contest. Floyd Hacker standing on his own eight heaved an arching aerial downfield that was taken on the run by Raymond Gilstrap on about the 45. Gilstrap, behind the secondary, was overtaken at the two yard line but fell across as he was hit from behind, for the third Ranger score.

Later in the third frame, Hacker hi-jacked a Henderson pass on the opposition's 28 yard marker. Lenamond bounced into the end zone in five attempts to add to

the Rangers comfortable lead. Henderson followed suit on the first play after the kick when Cheek again hit Tidmore, his favorite target of the night, on a 63 yard scoring aerial. Cheek again added the point after.

William Hawkins climaxed the scoring late in the fourth period on a 42 yard runback with a pass interception.

### Last Rites Are Held Monday For R. H. Ball

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the First Presbyterian Church in Eastland for Robert Herschel Ball, 60, who died at Lamesa Saturday. Rev. Otto Marshall conducted the rites.

Graveside services were conducted by the Masonic Lodge, with burial in Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Ball was born July 18, 1894 at Dodge City. His early life was spent at Dodge City and in 1915 he moved to Breckenridge. From there he enlisted in the armed services in World War I. On returning from service in 1919 he was united in marriage to Una Wallace and to this union was born three children. His wife preceded him in death in 1934. In 1921 he moved to Eastland where he lived until 1936. He had lived in Lamesa only a short time when death took him.

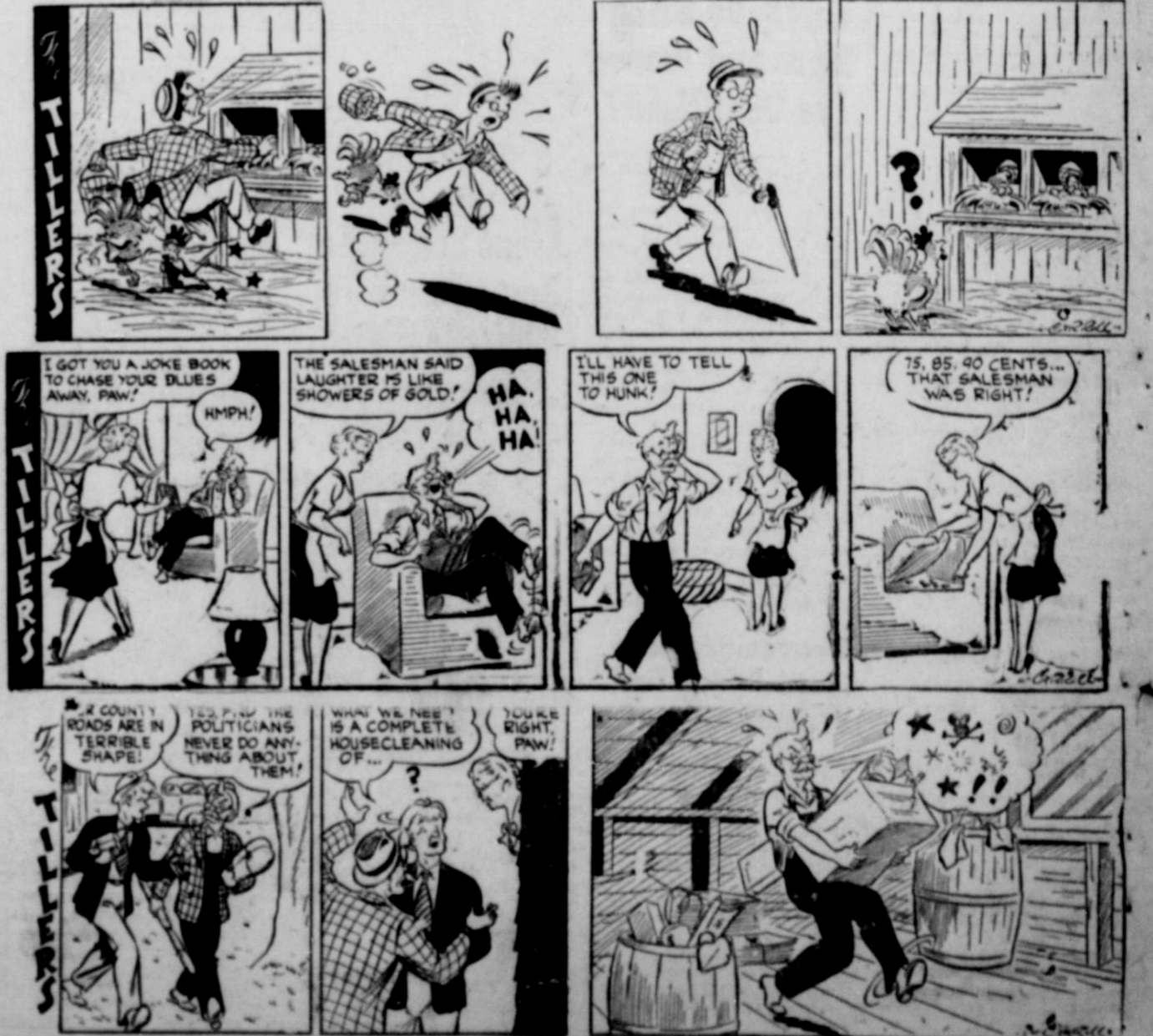

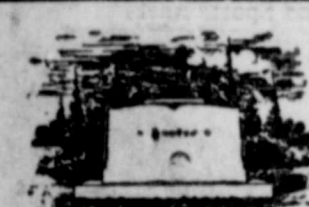

**INGREDIENTS:**  
 2 cups water  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 cup uncooked white rice  
 1-2 cup milk

3 slices fresh bread  
 1 pound ground beef  
 2 teaspoons grated onion  
 2 tablespoons grated green pepper  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1-8 teaspoon black pepper  
 1-4 (1-2 stick) butter or margarine  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 1 1-2 cups water  
 1-2 teaspoon salt  
 Dash of pepper  
 1 cup finely grated American cheese  
 (chill before grating)  
 1 teaspoon paprika

Method: Put the water, salt and rice in a 2 - quart saucepan. Bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover and leave over the heat 14 minutes. Turn the heat off. Leave lid on 10 minutes, while the rice is cooking, cut or tear the bread into small pieces. Pour the milk over the bread. Add the ground beef, onion, green pepper, salt and pepper. Mix well. Form into 12 beefballs approximately 1 1-2 in. diameter.

ameter. Melt the butter or margarine in a skillet. Add the beefballs and cook slowly until browned on all sides and done inside.

Remove the beefballs from the skillet. Keep hot by placing them on a pan in a warm oven. Turn the heat under the skillet very low. Put all the flour in the skillet. Gradually blend the fat into the flour until the mixture is smooth. Turn the heat up and cook until the mixture browns. Slowly stir the water into the fat and flour mixture. Blend until smooth. Add the salt and pepper. Cook until mixture thickens slightly.

Pour the hot rice on a platter. Sprinkle the cheese and paprika over the rice. Arrange the beefballs over the rice and pour some of the gravy over the beefballs. Serve the rest of the gravy in a separate dish. This recipe makes 6 generous servings.

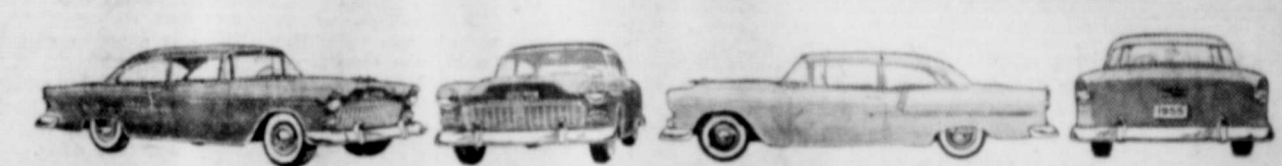

### BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

How about borrowing a real smart breakfast idea from our friends to the North? When hot cakes are served right from the griddle, pour "heated" maple-blended syrup over them...

A dash of lemon juice on slices of meat is a substitute for rich gravies, if you're counting calories. For people on salt-free diets, we offer this lemon mint sauce recipe to make fish, boiled beef and bland meals more palatable: 1 cup sugar dissolved in 1-2 cup lemon juice. Combine with 1-4 cup finely minced mint leaves or if unavailable, with a few drops of liquid mint flavoring.

If your banquet cloth has not been used in some time, you'll want to freshen it up before the Thanksgiving dinner. Run it through your washer in very hot water, for best results. Add your favorite soap powder or detergent, bleaching water and bluing to insure whiteness.

The day before Thanksgiving is your busy day, so make things as easy as possible for yourself by serving a "snap" dinner. Lean on frozen beef pies, which the family will consider a treat, and round out the main course with baked potatoes. Start baking the potatoes about 15 minutes before it's time to put the beef pies in the oven and they'll be ready to serve at the same time. Tomato juice for an appetizer and instant pudding for dessert (which one of the children can prepare), will make it a "cinch" to satisfy everyone.

To stretch two portions of leftover meat loaf into four, try this recipe: Dilute a can of vegetarian vegetable soup with 1 cup of water. Bring slowly to a boil in a skillet. Crumble or cube leftover meat loaf into soup mixture, sprinkle lightly with garlic powder; heat over a moderate flame, stirring occasionally until it reaches a boil, then reduce heat to low and let simmer five minutes more. Serve with mashed potatoes, a tossed green salad with French dressing, apple pie and coffee.

Did you know that pancakes won't stick if the griddle is rubbed with dry salt before heating? Using this method and an even cooking temperature, the pancakes turn out fluffy and golden brown.

Miniature baking sets complete with small boxes of packaged mixes are being shown as Christmas gifts for little girls. For your own small daughter invest in a sturdy stool on which she can safely stand up to the work surface in the kitchen to try her hand at baking.

Select a time for daughter's first baking venture when it's convenient for you to supervise the operation or, better still, when you're doing some baking yourself. You'll both enjoy the experience and it will be good training for your little one.

For Sunday night supper or a snack anytime try tuna buns made like this: Mix together 1-4 cup chopped pickles, 3 diced hard-cooked eggs, 1 can of your favorite tuna, 1 tablespoon chopped onions, 1-4 cup grated cheese and

mix in mayonnaise to make the combination moist and easy to spread. Use hamburger buns, buttered, cut in halves. Spread with tuna mixture. Bake in oven, 350 degrees F. for 8 to 10 minutes.

### Prunes and Dates Are Festive Companions For Holiday Turkey

Holiday cakes, cookies, and bread made with dried fruit are tasty companions for the Thanksgiving turkey.

Supplies of dates and prunes are larger this year than usual, and big supplies usually mean lower prices.

Here are some suggestions for Thanksgiving team-mates for turkey:

- CALIFORNIA PRUNE CAKE
- 1-3 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1-4 teaspoon allspice
- 1-4 teaspoon cloves
- 1-2 cup sweet milk
- 1 cup stewed prunes, stoned and finely cut.
- Cream the butter. Add the sug-

gradually and continue creaming until the mixture is light and fluffy. Beat the eggs until they are foamy. Add them to the creamed mixture and beat thoroughly. Sift the flour with the other dry ingredients.

Add the flour mixture alternately with the milk to the creamed mixture, combining the ingredients thoroughly. Fold in the prunes and bake in a loaf pan 50 minutes at 350 degrees.

When the cake is cool, cover it with a butter icing made of four tablespoons of butter, two cups of confectioner's sugar, one teaspoon of vanilla, and three tablespoons of cream.

To prepare the icing, cream the butter, add sugar, and cream thoroughly. Then add the vanilla. Stir in a small amount of cream at a time until the mixture is the desired consistency for spreading.

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### Duck Hunters Gain In Texas

AUSTIN — While Texans indulge in the annual fall waterfowl hunt, game management technicians are seeking the answer for the surge of interest which has sent the state to the top in the number of Federal duck stamps sold.

The United States Fish and Wildlife Service reports that Texas last year took the lead from California in the sale of duck stamps with a total of 230,391 stamps bought.

This represented an increase of 79,271 duck stamps sold to Texans and that is the figure that intrigues the wildlife people.

The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission suggested that the slump in native game population, such as quail, from the historic drought, might have converted many upland game hunters to hunting waterfowl.

W. S. Jennings, Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Commission, who has given special attention to waterfowl, said, "Recent waterfowl hatches have been above normal. Wide publicity has been given to this trend and what it means to the hunter. Perhaps the primary factor in the high hunter interest was the abundance of fresh water for the 1953 season. Ducks that normally would have migrated on through Texas to Mexico wintered on the Gulf Coast."

J. R. Singleton, Wildlife Biologist specializing in waterfowl, said "The Summers of 1952, 1953 and 1954 saw excellent hatches of waterfowl. This information was passed along to the public. Along the Texas Gulf Coast, in December 1953, the waterfowl population was more than 70 per cent greater than that for the preceding December. Distribution of the game was good. This was because of abundant water in areas which could not support sizeable waterfowl populations previously."

"Mr. Hunter became aware that something new had been added. Areas of the inland rice belt observed major flights of birds — more surface water in fallow fields and prairie potholes resulted in a wide choice of feeding grounds. So, hunters saw ducks and geese in many areas for the first time in many years, and took advantage of the good thing."

Thus, according to the Executive Secretary, increased surface water could provide the answer for last year. But the increase has not been maintained during dry 1954 and observers will watch to determine if the duck stamp sales fares accordingly.

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### Planning, Management and Rain Answer To Adequate Winter Pasture

Rain alone will not provide the grass needed for winter grazing. A. H. Walker, extension range specialist at College Station, says planning and management of the range may be just about as important as the supply of moisture in determining how much grass will be available for livestock feed during the winter period.

Walker points out that many areas of the state received heavy rains only a short time ago but because the soil was bare much of it was lost to run-off. Planning and management would have helped the situation.

Now that winter is at hand, the specialist says livestock producers should save all of the feed they possibly can as bundles, hay or silage. If feed must be purchased,

buy it now, he says. Plant annual grazing crops and here he points out that producers who dusted in small grains and legumes are far ahead of those who waited for rain.

He says pastures which have been deferred should not be grazed until after frost because livestock will graze off the seed heads before they have a chance to fall to the ground. He suggests that a protein supplement of one to two pounds for cattle and an eighth to a quarter pound for ewes be fed each day where the livestock is running on dry grass.

Finally, the specialist points out, droughts are not new to Texas and urges livestock producers to plan their operations and manage them to take care of the drought years.

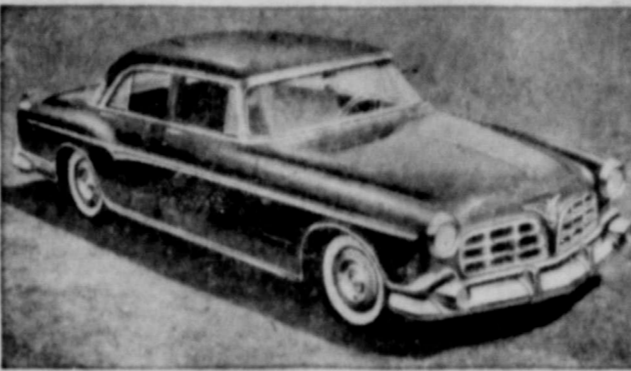

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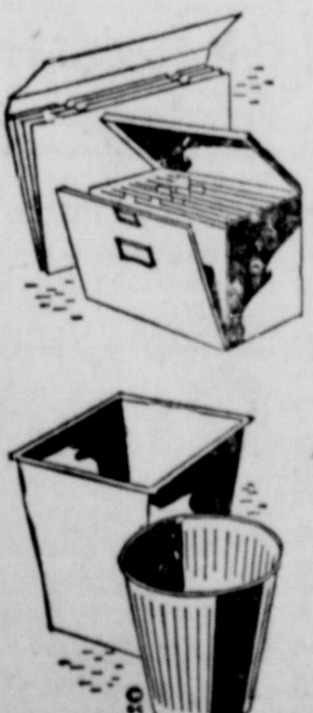

### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

A trade-mark identifies merchandise as being the product of a particular manufacturer or distributor. While a trade-mark is most often a word, it may also be an emblem, symbol, or device. The intended function of a trade-mark is to distinguish the goods of others in the market place. The expressions "trade-marks" and "brand name" are synonymous.

A trade-mark, which is actually marked upon goods or merchandise, is to be distinguished from a trade name, which is a name under which business is conducted. "American Tobacco Company" is a trade name; "Lucky Strike" is a trade mark. A trade name may also be marked upon merchandise and used as a trade mark, and may then be registered as a trade-mark, but a word used only as a trade name may be protected under the trade-mark laws. Trade names are protectable only under the law of unfair competition.

A person or company becomes the owner of common law rights in a trade-mark through adoption and use of the mark on goods. The law affords protection to the owner by prohibiting others in the field from appropriating the mark (or one so similar as to be likely to cause confusion) for use on goods of the same general type.

A distinctive and different trade-mark may be among the greatest and most valuable assets of a company, for it symbolizes the good will and reputation of the company. To choose a distinctive mark, it may be necessary to conduct a search of marks already in use.

When a word or symbol has been selected, it may then be properly used in connection with the goods before it becomes a valid trade-mark. A valid trade-mark may lose its legal protection because of improper use by its owner or by the public.

The Federal and most State governments including Texas, have by legislation, provided for the

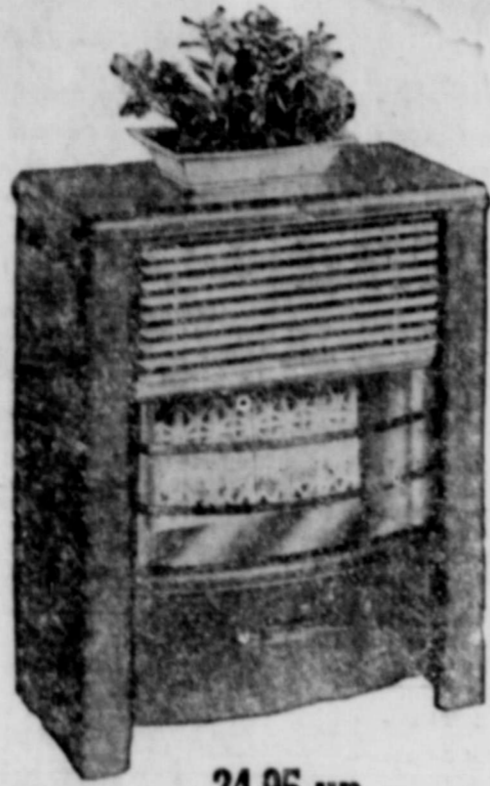
registration of trade-marks by their owners. While a trade-mark need not be registered to receive protection in the courts, such registration does afford substantial benefits to the trade-mark owners.
