Season Low Of 16 Hits County Area

Eastland County began warming up Saturday morning after the years coldest night Thursday pushed the mercury down to 16.

Temperatures Saturday morning hit around 21 after the weatherman predicted colder weather than the previous night's low.

The temperature, in setting the scene for the year's coldest weather, began its plunge between 6:30 and 8:00 Thursday morning when it dropped 29 degrees in an hour and hit a low of about 39 near mid-afternoon then dropped steadily until Friday morning.

As the front passed through Eastland County, the threat of a killing-frost confronted the fruit and vegetable growers in the multi-million dollar Rio Grande Valley. A hard freeze was expected in most of the state last night with slowly rising temperatures following with clear skies today.

No rainfall in the entire state was reported with the freeze and none was predicted.

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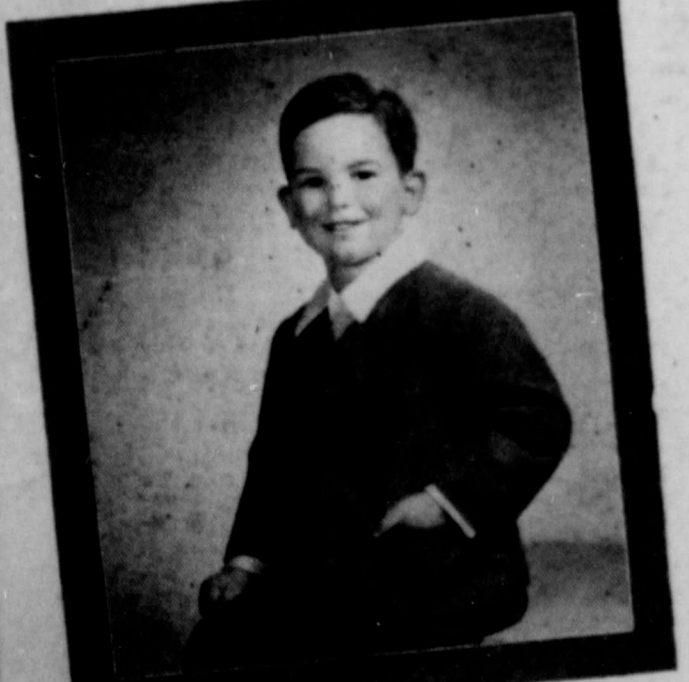
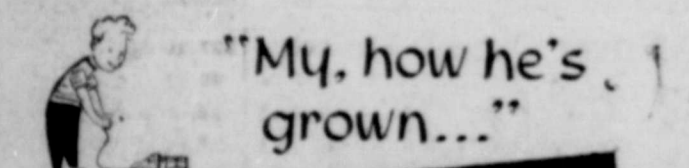

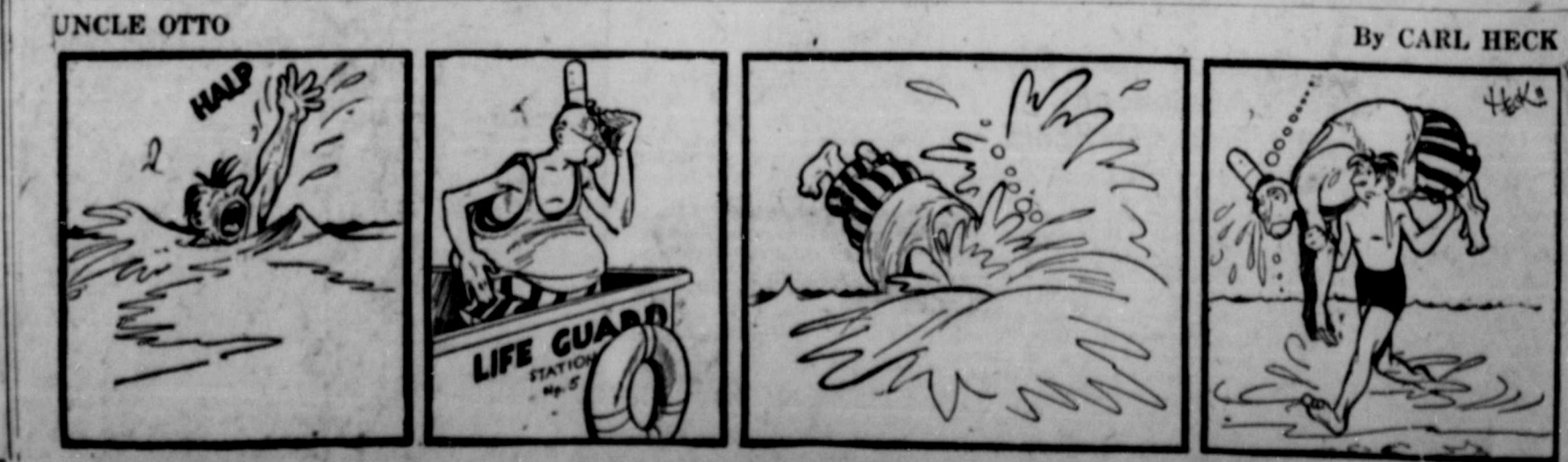
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Rebekahs Visit Eastland Lodge

DO YOU KNOW YOUR FLAG?

Q. What is the correct Staff-head? A.M.T. Omaha.

A. Primarily flagstaves were pikes or lances; their purpose to stick them in the enemy. Therefore the Spear is the correct staff-head for civilians' flagstaves.

Q. Are any nations' flags older than our U.S. Flag? O.N.W., Buffalo.

A. Yes, Denmark's and the Netherlands.

Q. When were the Stars and Stripes first flown in battle on land?

A. At the Battle of Bennington, Aug. 16, 1777. That Fort Stanwix flag was not a "Stars & Stripes", but a Continental flag.

Q. What is the proper salute when giving the Pledge of Allegiance?

A. Civilians remove hats and place right hand over the heart. Men in uniform, and on duty, are not allowed to remove headgear, so they touch the visor of their caps with their finger tips. As women never remove their hats, whether or not in uniform they place their ungloved right hand over the heart.

Mother Goose In Texas

As I went down to Silver Lake I met a little rattlesnake; He ate so much jelly cake It made his little belly ache.

Mother Goose went with the early pioneers and their offspring into the hills and valleys, the river towns, the farmsteads and ranches as they spread over the country, and she found subjects for child rhymes in endless variety. Many of these rhymes are far more amusing and interesting than those adapted from the Classic Mother Goose. Almost every critic known to the kids of pioneer days became a subject for child rhymes. Even the rattlesnake.

Along with the snake, the bull-frog, was a common subject for catchy and fantastic rhymes by Pioneer children. Here is a sample:

Snake baked a hoe-cake,
 Set the frog to mind it;
 Frog fell to noddin'
 And the lizard come and find it.

Even the lovely June-bug (more often "tumble-bug", in American vernacular) found his way into child lore, and into folksong as well:

Possum up a gum stump,
 Coonnie in the holler,
 Wake, snake! June-bug!
 Stole a half a dollar!
 Next: "Doodle Bugs".

Variants of these or other rhymes will be recorded in the permanent collection of Mother Goose in Texas if addressed to Ray Wood at Raywood, Texas.

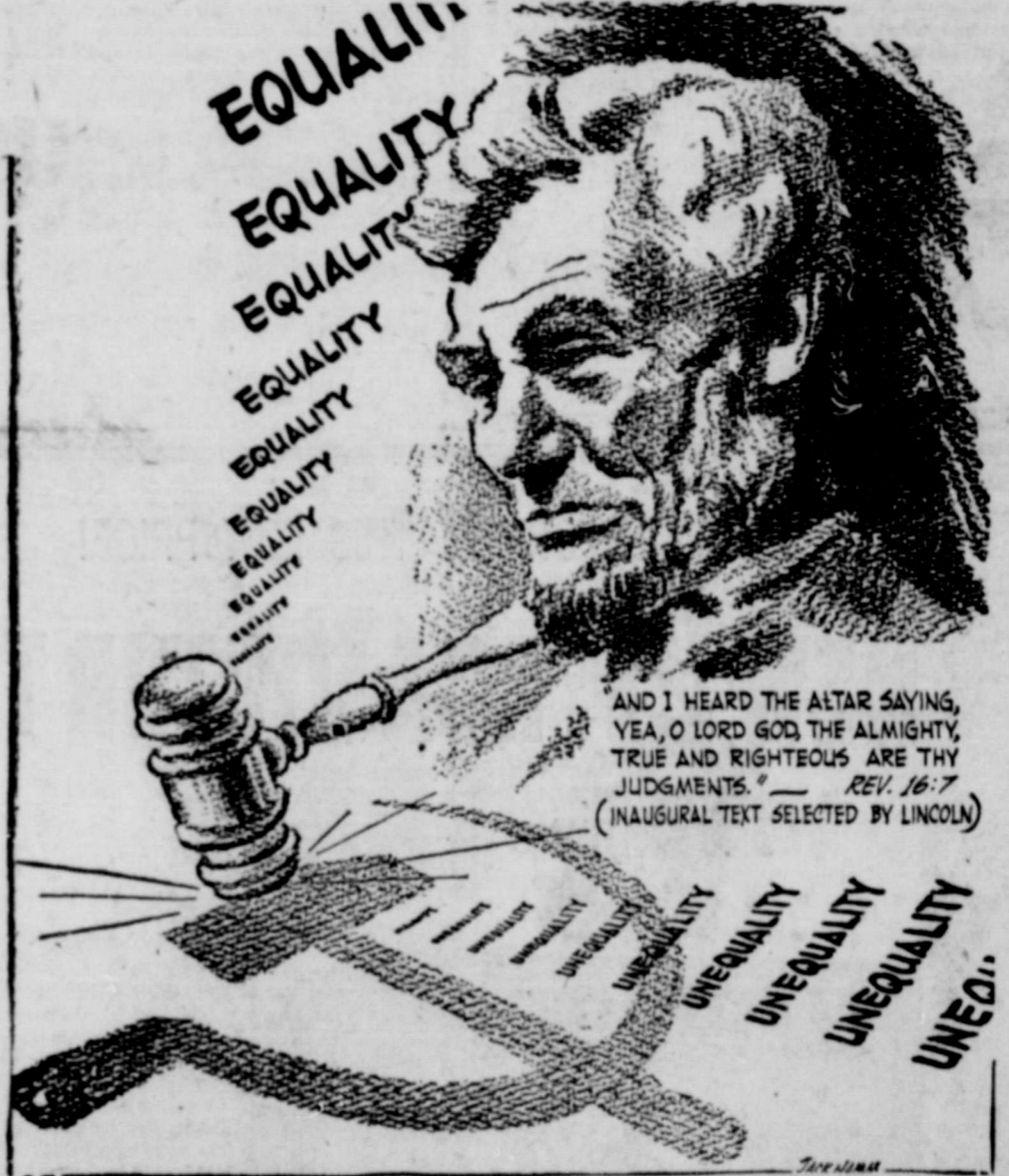

And now for some further details on the disability determination mentioned in one of our earlier articles in this series, the following is presented.

The amended act also provides for the preservation of the benefit rights of the totally disabled. Under this provision a worker's earnings record can be "frozen" and he won't suffer a reduction in or loss of his benefit rights because of an extended period of no earnings due to total and prolonged disability. To be eligible for a

"disability freeze" a worker must have acquired at least five years of covered work out of the ten years before the disability began, of which at least 1-2 years must have been in the 3-year period before his disability occurred. The disability must be medically determined by the State vocational rehabilitation agency or another appropriate state agency by agreement with the Secretary of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. No application for the "disability freeze" may be accepted by the Social Security Administration before January 1, 1955. Tuley emphasizes that this provision will not pay cash benefits during disability, before the worker attains age 65, but may increase the benefits payable after 65. The disability must have lasted at least six months before action can be taken to establish the period of the disability. While a period of disability ends for social security purposes at age 65, Tuley pointed out that disabled persons already over that age and now getting benefit payments may have their benefits refigured to exclude that portion of their periods of disability which occurred before age 65, if they meet the requirements given above. Increases in benefits under the disability provision become effective after June 1955.

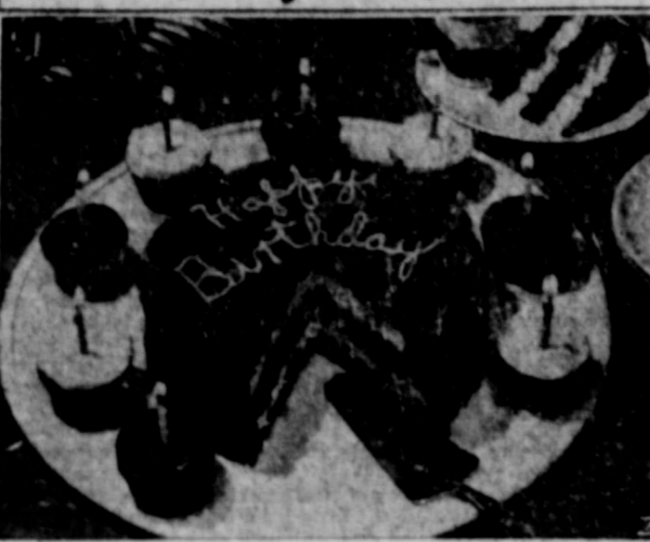

Cake of the Month



Happy for the modern homemaker, party cakes are speedily made with modern cake mixes. Speaking for itself is this special birthday cake accompanied by party cupcakes—all made with two packages of cake mix: one yellow and one devil's food. Top each frosted cupcake with a colorful candle to light the way to many, many more Happy Birthdays.

Marble Cake with Candle Cupcakes
1 package Swans Down Yellow Cake Mix
1 package Swans Down Devil's Food Mix
Chocolate Frosting
Butter Almond Frosting

Prepare cake mixes as directed on packages. Spoon half of the yellow batter into paper baking cups set in muffin pans. Use half of the devil's food batter in the same way.

Put large spoonfuls of the remaining yellow and chocolate batters alternately into two round 9-inch layer pans, which have been lined on bottoms with paper. With a knife, cut through batter in a wide zigzag course to marble. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 20 to 25 minutes for cupcakes and 25 to 30 minutes for layers. Cool cakes.

Spread Chocolate Frosting between layers, over top and sides of cake, and over tops of yellow cupcakes. Prepare Butter Almond Frosting. Put a little of this in a paper cornucopia to write "Happy Birthday" across top of cake. (If frosting is too soft to use in tube, add a little confectioners' sugar.) Spread rest of Butter Almond Frosting on chocolate cupcakes. Insert a candle in each cupcake.

Chocolate Frosting. Measure 5 cups sifted confectioners' sugar.

Butter Almond Frosting. You can bake the cake and cupcakes a month in advance, frost, and freeze. Just remember to put the frosted cakes in the freezer to set before wrapping in freezing paper; and to remove this paper as soon as the cakes come out of the freezer, before they begin to thaw.

Earn, Learn, Travel and Retire

Navy Recruiter Is Veteran Of Seventeen Years In U. S. Navy

Chief Petty Officer J. P. Tompkins, Navy enlistment officer, said the old adage of earn, learn, travel and retire are not a thing of the past in the modern U. S. Navy in an interview with a Telegram reporter during a visit here this week.

Tompkins, a veteran of 17 years in the Navy himself, should know. For he has earned himself a living for 17 years, learned a trade, traveled over most of the world and will be eligible for retirement in two and a half more years. That is quite an achievement for a man who is only 38 years of age.

Tompkins said many technical schools prepare a young man entering the service for his place in the fleet. Advancement through promotions is generally determined by the quality of work, examination grades and demonstrated abilities of the individual, he explained.

"The average person who applies himself and stays in the Navy may expect to reach the rate of

chief petty officer in approximately 14 years of service," Tompkins said. He, by the way, reached that rank in half that time, only seven years. The rank of chief petty officer is the highest non-commissioned rating in the Navy.

The Navy recruiter urged any young man desiring to join the service to "start today, learn and work tomorrow and be off to an exciting career in the U. S. Navy."

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
