22! Second Coldest Night Of Year Recorded Friday

Warmer Weather Expected

Skies cleared over Eastland County Saturday afternoon after frigid weather brought traces of sleet and rain to the area Friday and set the stage for the second coldest night of the year.

Temperatures fell to 22 Saturday night, coldest night of the year was recorded Feb. 11 when the temperature dropped to 16 after a high of 44 had been marked during the day.

Gradual warmup will begin today with temperatures predicted to rise up to the high 50's and then on to the mid-60's tomorrow. The temperature dropped to a low of 23 here last night.

The frigid air mass struck with a wintery thump Friday as it spread its tendrils into most parts of the state.

At 3:30 p.m. Friday the temperature was 22 degrees at Dalhart and 88 at Laredo. In the north portion of the state the mercury hung around the freezing mark. In the south it was in the 70's and 80's.

Temperatures dropped 12 degrees in five minutes when the norther hit San Antonio.

The front took on an air of urgency at 7 p.m. Friday when the Weather Bureau issued severe thunderstorm and tornado warnings for areas of East and South Texas, Central and East Texas was drenched by thunderstorms, but no strong winds were reported anywhere in the state.

The thunderstorm warning was posted for an area 100 miles east of Brownsville to 40 miles north of Shreveport, La. An inch of snow fell in Dalhart, and the reading there was eight degrees, the lowest in the state.

Light showers accompanied the front in most parts of the state but the Ranger area received only a light mist along with traces of sleet.

Wichita Falls weather station recorded .13 inches of frozen rain, Moran measured .50 of an inch, Breckenridge recorded .42 a n d Graham measured .60.

Other rain reports include, Weatherford, .35, Mineral Wells .01, Albany .12, Stephenville .65 and Stamford .14.

The front moved to the east and into the Rio Grande Valley Sunday and Sunday night but temperatures were not cold enough to add damage to their stricken vegetable crops.

Mrs. Nantz Is Transferred To Abilene Hospital

Mrs. Mose Nantz of Ranger, who was injured in an automobile accident near here Saturday afternoon, has been transferred to an Abilene hospital for treatment.

Mrs. Nantz received a broken collar bone and back injuries when the car she was driving and a pick-up truck driven by Melvin Crabtree of Eastland collided approximately one mile west of the Ranger city limits.

Also injured in the wreck was Norman Owen, also of Eastland. Owen received facial lacerations. He was treated and later dismissed at the Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Nantz was taken to a Ranger hospital following the accident and later transferred to Abilene.

A daily potential of 135 barrels of 41 gravity oil daily has been announced for the Eastland Oil Co. No. 1 Holcomb Heirs, formerly Rose E. Day No. 1 Holcomb, one and a half miles north-east of Eastland.

The well has been completed as a regular field producer. It's location is in Section 1, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Flow is through a 3-8 inch choke with 200 pounds on casing and 200 on tubing. Flow is from 75 perforations at 1,487-1,502 feet, where formation was ruptured. Casing was set at 1,515 feet, with total depth of 1,551 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 700-1.

Essay Contest Deadline Set For March 31

Senior high school students in Eastland County planning to enter the Texas State Federation of Labor's \$2,200 scholarship contest were reminded today that all entries must be submitted before March 31.

To County Livestock Show

Shorthorn Division Is Latest Addition

All animals to be exhibited at the annual Eastland County Livestock Show at the old Airport near Eastland March 25 and 26 must be entered and in their places by 11 a.m. on opening day, Luther Wilson, general show superintendent, said today.

Animals in the breeding classes must be representative of their breed although they do not need to be purebred or registered. The fat animals classes of steers, pigs and lambs is open only to 4-H Club boys and girls and to FFA members of the county, Wilson said.

All judging of the animals will be done on Saturday, March 26. No judging is expected to be done on opening day.

One change has been made in the beef cattle division of the show. The Shorthorn breed will have a division also for the first

time in a number of years and the classes will be the same as for the hereof and Angus.

One change in the dairy division calls for two bull classes such as bull calves from six months to one year and older. A grand champion dairy bull will be selected also. The dairy division of the catalogue had not included dairy bulls the past few years.

The sheep, goat and swine classes will remain as they have been for the past year or so.

Adult exhibitors will show for the ribbons only. The only cash prizes to be paid by the Livestock Raisers Association who annually sponsor will be to club boys and girls.

SAN MARCOS (Sp.) — Douglas McLendon, formerly of Eastland, is among the 308 new students enrolled for the spring semester at Southwest Texas State Teachers College.

Total enrollment at the college has reached 1770, the second highest figure for spring semester enrollment in the school's history. Highest enrollment was in 1949 when World War II veterans swelled the total to 2092. Third high was in 1951 when 1746 students attended the college.

A survey of this semester's enrollment shows that the men again outnumber the women on the campus as they did last term. The ratio is 1923 men to 747 women.

McLendon, son of Mrs. W. E. McLendon, of 912 W. Patterson, Eastland, is now living at 1213 Payne, Austin.

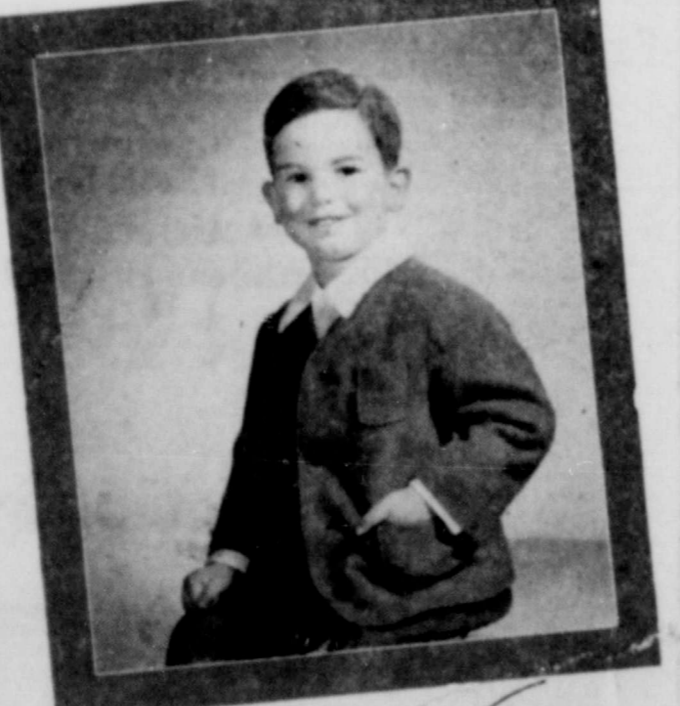

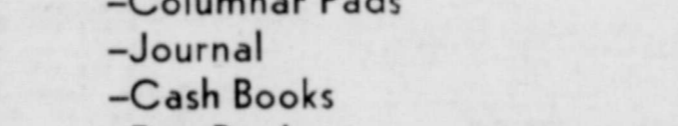

Vets Taking Farm Training Get Reminder

The nation's 16,000 World War II veterans taking GI Bill farm training were reminded today by the Veterans Administration that reports of their 1954 earnings are due at their VA Regional Offices no later than March 1, 1955. Failure to submit the reports by the deadline, VA warned, may result in discontinuance of GI subsistence payments until such time as the reports do reach VA.

Trainees who have not yet received the report forms may obtain them from their instructors. These yearly reports, VA emphasized, do not apply to veterans taking institutional on-farm training under the Korean GI Bill, since their monthly allowances are computed on a different basis.



Kitchen Moment



PLANTATION SUPPER

There's always a table laden with tasty dishes in the dining room of Southern plantation homes, for cooks of the deep South have a special way with food. Their "plantation supper" is a fine example of an old-fashioned Dixie-land treat.

(Six Servings)

1 1/2 cups sifted flour
3/4 cup yellow corn meal
2 tablespoons sugar
4 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup melted margarine
1 pound bulk pork sausage
2 1/2 pounds fresh asparagus OR 1 pkg. frozen asparagus spears
2 1/2 cups medium white sauce
6 pimiento strips, if desired

Make corn bread as follows: Into mixing bowl sift together flour, corn meal, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Beat egg, add milk and melted margarine. Mix well and pour all at one time into dry ingredients. Stir only until flour and meal are well-moistened. Batter will still be a bit lumpy. Spread into well-margarined 8x8-inch pan. Bake in moderately hot oven (425° F.) 25 to 30 minutes, or until golden brown.

While corn bread bakes, prepare other parts of dish.

Fry sausage in skillet over low heat, stirring with fork to break up larger pieces. Cook over low heat until done, seasoning with salt and pepper as desired. Cook asparagus in boiling salted water until just tender. Make cream sauce as follows: In saucepan melt 5 tablespoons margarine. Stir in 5 tablespoons flour, mixing until smooth. Gradually add 2 1/2 cups milk, stirring constantly until sauce boils and is thickened. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

When corn bread is done, cut it into squares. Split each square and place lower half on hot plate. Cover with cooked sausage, then with top of corn bread square. Arrange 3 or 4 stalks of asparagus on top of each bread, and pour cream sauce over. If desired, garnish each serving with a strip of pimiento or a dash of paprika. Serve hot.

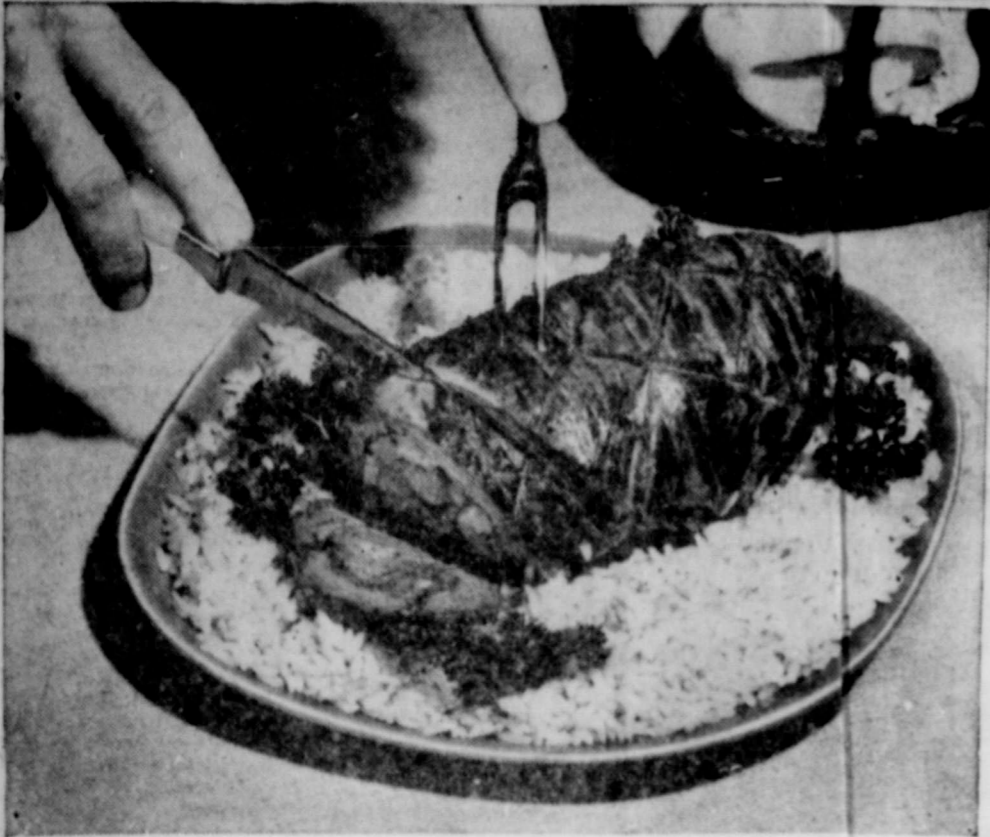

Surgery Much Improved In Just Few Years

NEW YORK, N. Y. — Surgery is much safer now than it was only a relatively few years ago. The mortality incidental to virtually all types of operations, even the most radical, has been materially reduced, according to the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company statisticians, who base their report on a study of various hospital experiences.

Surgical mortality in recent years is compared with that about a decade or more earlier for various types of major operations, including surgery for benign and malignant conditions of the di-

gestive tract, diabetic gangrene, and certain female disorders. In every one of the experiences reviewed surgical mortality was reduced by at least one half, and in several instances by more than four fifths. This record is all the more remarkable in view of the increase in the proportion of older patients.

Among the factors which have played a part in bringing about this progress, according to the statisticians, are the better training of surgeons, advances in surgical techniques, the wide use of the newer chemotherapeutic and antibiotic agents to control infection, and improved anesthetic substances and procedures. Increasing use of blood transfusion and the practice of getting patients out of bed as soon as possible after an operation are also credited with having made major contributions to the general progress.

The improved outlook for patients with surgical conditions is strikingly illustrated by the rapid decline in the mortality from appendicitis, the statisticians note. The death rate from appendicitis among the company's industrial policyholders dropped by three fourths in the past decade and by nine tenths in the past two decades.
