Classroom Visits Urged During School Week

Parents within the Ranger area have been extended a special invitation to visit in the various schools during Texas Public Schools Week, March 7-12. H. L. Coody, Ranger High School principal said today.

Reflecting the background of the free public schools in Texas, the Constitution of the Republic of Texas, adopted March 2, 1836 said, "It shall be the duty of Congress, as soon as circumstances will permit, to provide by law, a general system of education."

In 1845 the School Law provided for the first State Public School system of Texas. The State Constitution declares, "A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the state to establish and make suitable provisions for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools."

From this grew the public school system of Texas. "Education of the masses through these schools which are public schools has been the bulwark of the liberties of the people and the national freedom of the country."

Two Auto Crashes Bring \$750 In Damages Friday

Two separate automobile accidents caused approximately \$750 damage to four vehicles here Friday.

Most serious accident was a collision at the intersection of Blundell and Young Streets when a pickup truck driven by Frank Deaton collided with a county dump truck driven by Henry Hamilton.

Deaton was treated for minor injuries at Ranger General Hospital but released later in the afternoon.

Police estimated the damage at \$500 to both vehicles.

County Draws Two New Tries

The Frank Love and Co., Wichita Falls, No. 1 W. A. Cook is the deeper of the two tries. It is slated for 3,600 feet with rotary, and spots 300 feet from the south and 1,300 feet from the west lines of Lob 20, McLennan CSL Survey.

Four miles northwest of Rising Star, Trumeter Petroleum Corp. of Fort Worth No. 1 Pauline Roberts was staked as a 1,750-foot rotary wildcat.

Drill site is 1,122 feet from the south and 680 feet from the west lines of Section 26, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

W. H. (Bill) Hoffman of Eastland staked No. 4 Whittington as a new project four miles south of Eastland in the Harbin Field.

Location is 1,000 feet from the north and 2,400 feet from the west. Two Eastland County wildcats have been staked, and a new county producer has been announced. Lines of Section 27, Block 2, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 1,350 feet with cable.

A new regular field producer two miles north of Pioneer is Williams and Wagner Construction Co., Inc. of Dallas No. 1 Webb, George Click Survey 871.

Daily potential was 29 barrels of 43 gravity oil, plus 69 per cent water. It pumped from 56 perforations at 2,523-37 feet. Pay was washed with 5,000 gallons of acid. Casing was set on bottom at 2,600 feet.

These all-around students were selected by the faculty on qualities of leadership, scholarship, sportsmanship, school spirit, citizenship-cooperation and friendliness.

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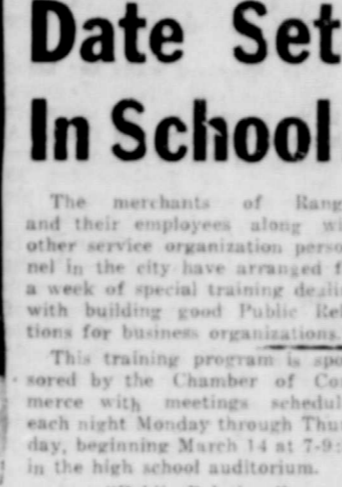
Former Ranger Resident Buried In Ft. Worth

The U.S. Weather Bureau predicted widely scattered showers or thunderstorms.

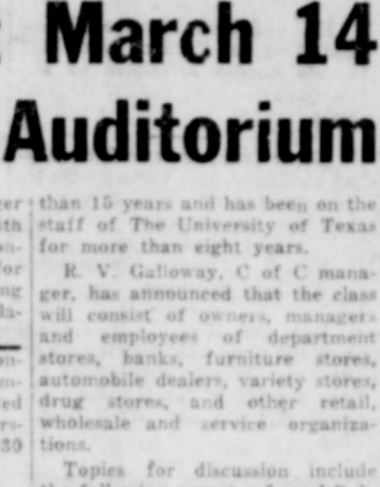
Much colder weather was expected for West Texas tonight as a second and much colder front was building up in Wyoming and the Dakotas.

News sources said the storm moving through northern Wyoming had generated winds up to 45 miles an hour. From Kansas north, cold wave warnings were out. The forecast called for readings as low as 5 above zero in northwestern Kansas by Saturday noon.

Eastland County weather will bring temperatures ranging from the middle 70's to the low 80's over the weekend.

Four points reported high of 91 degrees Friday as the state got some of the hottest March 4 weather on record. Laredo, Pecos, Mineral, Wells and Cotulla all had 91.

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Guilty Plea Made In Robbery Case

A surprise plea of guilty was entered by Bill Daniels in 91st District Court Thursday to a charge of robbery. Daniels made the plea after taking a lie-detector test in Austin. Judge Turner Collier delayed sentencing the Cisco man until Wednesday morning.

Daniels was charged with forcing Mrs. O. G. Phillips, 86-year-old County resident, to give him a check. Mrs. Phillips lives near Romney. When the trial came to court Monday, Daniels requested a lie-detector test. District Attorney Joe Nussle accompanied him to Austin where he took the test.

The case was reset for trial Thursday, and Daniels' attorney said his client was ready to plead guilty.

Another criminal case is due for hearing in District Court Thursday. It is the Travis Smith assault with intent to murder case. Smith is accused of shooting at a neighbor, J. Brown. Both Smith and Brown live near Gorman.

The exercise was an experiment in maintaining high training standards on a "shoe-string" budget. During the exercise, men of the combat team were attacked by an aggressor force which simulated raids and strikes at outposts.

Best Conservation Measure; Land Cover

"Land cover is our best known conservation measure," an Upper Leon Soil Conservation District spokesman said Saturday.

"Winter cover crops gave protection, adds soil fertilizer, improves soil condition and furnished green manure for our livestock," Jack Leaves of the Eastland Work Unit, explained.

"During the early Spring or blue season, winter cover crops blow away in prevention of wind erosion," Leeyes said. "The top growth of cover crops acts as a wind break to prevent the wind from blowing loose sandy soil. Leaving crop residue on or near the surface when preparing to plant peanuts following a cover crop will prevent wind erosion and

young peanuts from blowing out. "Mother nature needs from 100 to 300 years to form one inch of top soil, and land with no cover loses tons of this rich soil during one blowing season.

"The prevention of wind erosion and the loss of our rich top soil is just one of several reasons land cover is considered one of our best conservation measures.

"Winter cover crops add soil fertility by adding organic matter and nitrogen to the soil.

"We need to replace the organic matter and fertility taken out of our soil, and this can best be done by cover crops, which are left on the land or turned under to decay and add fertility and organic matter.

"Cover crops improve our soil condition by supplying organic matter which helps the soil soak up more of the rain we receive. Their mat of shallow and deep roots aid in breaking up our hard plow pans and clay sub-soil, giving us deeper water penetration.

"Upper Leon Soil Conservation District cooperators report 12,071 acres of vetch and rye, oats, vetch and other combinations of small grain and legumes, planted this year as winter cover crops.

"The benefits of winter cover crops can easily be seen in the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District from the green grazing furnished livestock and the prevention of wind erosion.

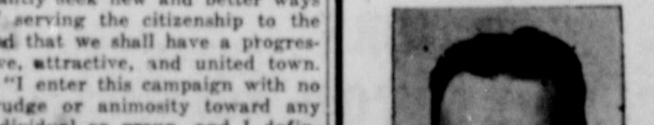

Lemon Barbecued Beef Loaves
Meat Loaf Mixture
1 1-2 pounds ground beef
1-4 cup lemon juice
1-2 cup water
1 egg, slightly beaten
4 slices stale bread, finely diced
1-4 cup finely chopped onion
2 teaspoons seasoning salt
Topping
1-2 cup catsup

1-3 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1-4 teaspoon ground cloves
1-4 teaspoon ground allspice
6 thin slices lemon

Combine all ingredients for meat loaves. Mix well and shape into 6 individual loaves in a greased oblong baking pan. Combine ingredients for the topping, with the exception of the lemon slices. Bake loaves at 35 degrees F. for 15 minutes, then cover with topping and place a lemon slice on each loaf. Continue baking for 30 minutes, basting occasionally with sauce around loaves. Serve with sauce spooned over loaves. 6 servings.
