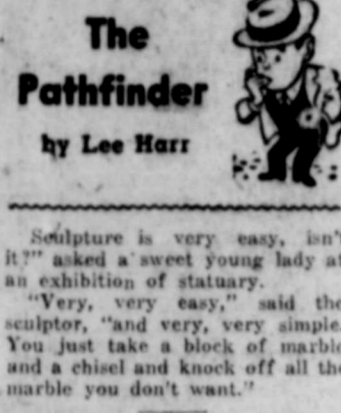

Acresage Allotments To Remain Same

Eastland County peanut farmers are still faced with a critical supply of seeds for spring planting.

The shortage is critical enough that some farmers are going to have to do without seeds, T. C. Wylie, owner of Ranger Peanut Co., said today.

Wylie said that shellers who were holding seed for future planting were selling their supply to confection and peanut butter buyers because of the prices that had been created by the demand.

This supply was visible at the time of last year's harvest and was expected to be held over for planting this spring when a seed shortage had already been predicted.

The sale of the seed supply only magnified the problem.

Wylie said that he expected seeds to go as high as 35 cents per pound.

Even with the shortage in nuts here, the government has flatly stated that acreage allotments will not be increased this year. However, the president last week issued a proclamation allowing the importation of 51 million pounds of nuts from foreign countries.

Insurance Coverage Okayed For Firemen

The City Commissioners approved an insurance policy Tuesday night at their regular weekly meeting to protect the volunteer and paid firemen here in case of accident or death going to or coming from or during a fire.

At a cost of \$168.25 a year to the city, the policy allows \$1000 in the event of death, a coverage of all medical expenses up to \$500 and a payment of \$55 a week per member for each week spent in a hospital and \$25 a week thereafter if disabled.

An oil discovery from the Mississippi has been potentiated seven miles northwest of Gorman in Eastland County. It is J. E. Connally & Earnestine Callihan of Abilene No. 2 S. L. Snider, B. F. Smith Survey, A-867.

Daily potential was 84.68 barrels of 43 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64 inch choke with 1,180 pounds casing and 1,095 pounds tubing pressures. Casing is set on bottom at 3,312 feet. Pay was topped at 3,019 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 22,103-1.
