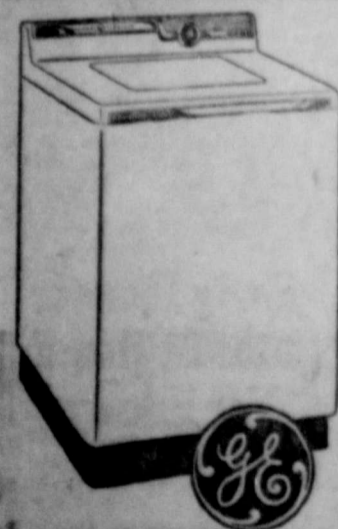

## LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF RANGER, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, AND THE ENVIRONS THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A FEE OR CHARGE FOR THE USE OF THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND PUBLIC WAYS, AND PROVIDING THAT IT SHALL BE IN LIEU OF OTHER FEES AND CHARGES, EXCEPTING AD VALOREM TAXES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the City of Ranger, Texas, hereinafter called "City," hereby grants to Lone Star Gas Company, hereinafter called "Company," its successors and assigns, consent to use and occupy the present and future streets, alleys, highways, public thoroughfares and grounds of City for the purpose of laying, maintaining, constructing, operating and replacing thereon and thereon pipelines and all other appurtenant equipment needed and necessary to deliver and sell gas to persons, firms and corporations, including all the general public, within the City's corporate limits and the environs thereof, said consent being granted for a term of twenty-five (25) years from and after the date of the final passage and approval of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. Company shall lay, maintain, construct, operate and replace its pipes, mains, laterals and other equipment so as to interfere as little as possible with traffic and shall promptly clean up and restore to an approximate original condition, at its cost, all thoroughfares and other surfaces which it may disturb. The location of all mains, pipes, laterals and other appurtenant equipment shall be fixed under the supervision of the Board of Commissioners or an authorized committee or agent appointed by said Board.

SECTION 3. When Company shall make or cause to be made excavations or shall place obstructions in any street, alley or other public place, the public shall be

protected by barriers and lights placed, erected and maintained by Company; and in the event of injury to any person or damage to any property by reason of the construction, operation or maintenance of the gas distributing plant or system of Company, Company shall indemnify and keep harmless City from any and all liability in connection therewith. Company shall repair, clean up and restore to an approximate original condition, all streets and alleys distributed during the construction and repair of its gas distributing system.

SECTION 4. Company may make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations in the conduct of its business and shall have the right to make a charge for labor and material furnished and services rendered in the installation of service pipes and the control of service pipes from the connection thereof with Company's main in the streets or alleys to and including the meter located on the consumer's premises. Service lines are defined as supply lines from Company's mains in the streets and alleys to and ending at consumer's property line.

SECTION 5. Company shall be required to extend mains on any street more than fifty (50) feet for any one consumer of gas. Nor shall Company be required to connect to intermediate or high-pressure lines.

SECTION 6. Company shall be entitled to require from each and every consumer of gas, before gas service is commenced, a deposit of twice the amount of an estimated average monthly bill, which said deposit may be retained by Company until service is discontinued and all bills therefor have been paid. Company shall then return said deposit to the consumer, together with six per cent (6%) interest thereon from the date of said deposit up to the date of discontinuance of service. Company shall be entitled to apply said deposit, with accrued interest, to any indebtedness owed Company by the consumer making the deposit.

SECTION 7. The rights, privileges and franchises granted by this ordinance are not to be considered exclusive, and City hereby expressly reserves the right to grant, at any time, like privileges, rights and franchises as it may see fit to any other person or corporation for the purpose of furnishing gas for light, heat and power to and for City and the inhabitants thereof.

SECTION 8. Company shall furnish reasonably adequate service to the public at reasonable rates and charges therefor; and Company shall maintain its property, equipment and appliances in good order and condition.

SECTION 9. Company, its successors and assigns, agrees to pay

thereof, such as schools, colleges, hospitals, eleemosynary institutions, army or training camps, airports, courthouse, city hall and other institutions of like or similar kind and character.

"Industrial users or consumers," as herein used, are those generally and commonly classified as such by Company.

The payment herein provided shall be for the period January 1 to December 31 of the respective year that the payment is made.

SECTION 10. Company shall file its written acceptance of this franchise ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by said City.

## LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE RATES AND CHARGES TO BE MADE FOR NATURAL GAS SOLD IN THE CITY OF RANGER, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, EXPRESSLY REPEALING ALL PRIOR ORDINANCES OR RESOLUTIONS HERETOFORE ENACTED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. From and after the effective date of this ordinance, there is hereby fixed and determined the following rates and charges which shall be made for gas sold for domestic and commercial purposes, to wit:

Minimum Monthly Bill — \$1.00  
First 600 cu. ft. at \$17 per c.e.f. gross; \$1.53 per c.e.f. net.  
All Over 600 cu. ft. at \$7.833 per m.c.f. gross; \$7.05 per m.c.f. net.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten (10) days from monthly billing date.

The above rates and charges are applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. All ordinances or resolutions heretofore enacted fixing and determining rates and charges for natural gas sold within the City which fix different rates or which fix rates for gas sold for purposes other than for domestic and commercial use or which otherwise in conflict with the aforesaid rates are hereby nullified and repealed and from and after the effective dates of this ordinance the only rates fixed and determined for gas sold within the City of Ranger shall be those provided for in section 1.

SECTION 3. The aforesaid rates shall apply to any person, firm or corporation engaged in the sale of natural gas within the city limits of Ranger, Texas.

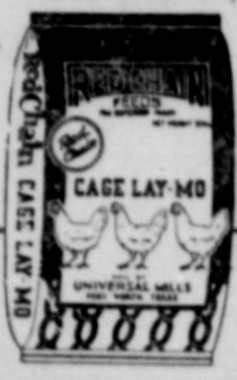

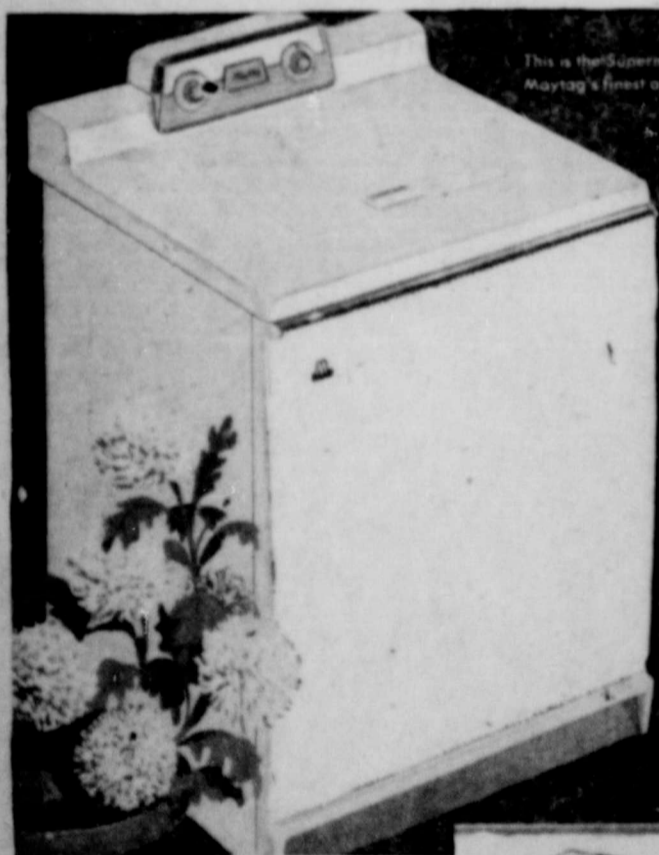
