Thirteen Candidates Vie For Five Seats

One of the most politically turbulent eras in Ranger's history is now well underway.

Thirteen candidates have announced for the five seats on the City Council in the Tuesday election.

Three mayor candidates, all offering widely split platforms have moved into the center of the political spotlight. However, they are closely followed, interest-wise, by the four aspirants who have filed for election as Police and Fire Commissioners.

Candidates for mayor are Lee Dockery, formerly manager of the Community Public Service here, whose gas distribution facilities were recently absorbed by Lone Star Gas Company, O. G. Lanier, a private accountant and Twyn Hamel, administrator at Ranger General Hospital.

Falling in for the Fire and Police posts are George Robinson, Willis Clarke, Jr., Jim Ingram, who served as police chief here from 1927 until 1939, and Billy Ewing another former part-time member of the police force.

Paired off for the Finance Commissioners job are A. G. Koenig, city member of the present commission who will seek reelection, and H. M. Bagwell.

Seeking the Street Commissioner's post is Owen Bray and C. D. Ervin, while Norman Huffman and A. H. Williams complete the ballot for Water Commissioner.

Four Field Projects Set For County

Four new regular field projects have been staked in Eastland County.

Two of the projects will be drilled by Irish Drilling Co., Inc., both on the Hulemb lease two miles northeast of Eastland in Section 1, Block 4, H&C Survey. They are slated for 1,800 feet with rotary.

No. 2-A Holcomb spots 1,317 feet from the south and 475 feet from the east lines of the south-west quarter of Section 1, No. 3, A Holcomb spots 1,017 feet from the south and 840 feet from the east lines of the south-west quarter of Section 1.

Four and a half miles northeast of Eastland, Jack Chamberlain of Eastland staked No. 2 J. L. Dick as a 1,999-foot rotary project. Drillsite is 1,500 feet from the east lines of Warren Lyman Survey.

Flaga Petroleum Corp. of El Paso staked No. 2 A. O. Tindall as a 1,999-foot cable tool project one and a half miles northwest of Olden. Site is 1,950 feet from the east and 1,400 feet from the south of Section 1, Block 4, H&C Survey.

Jim Ingram, candidate for Police and Fire Commissioner, recalled his previous experience as a police chief here today in stating his qualifications for the position.

He said, "In 1927, I was appointed Chief of Police here and served in that capacity for 12 years, from May 1927 until May 1939 at which time I resigned and did guard duty in various camps, and I served for Police and Fire Commissioner, my motto will be for efficiency and economy."

"I was born in Eastland County near Ranger and have lived in and near Ranger all of my life, with the exception of six years during World War II, which was spent doing guard duty at various camps."

"At the end of the war, I came back to Ranger and went into business for myself. I own my home here and I am in business at present and expect to make this my home."

"I bought a home in Ranger in 1916, worked in the oil fields until 1919. In June 1919, I joined the Ranger police department and was a night patrolman during the oil boom until being appointed police chief in 1927."

"I am for a bigger and better Ranger. I feel that we have more to offer in regard to getting industry to come to our city than we have ever had before."

"We have an adequate supply of gas, electrical power, and water when our lake is filled. We have efficient railroad services. For shipping in and out materials. We have good highways through Ranger, which, all of these are good talking points to bring industry to our city. If all the citizens of Ranger will work together to that point there is no reason why we (Continued on Page 2)

Dust Storm Blankets Area

An intense dust storm blanketed Eastland County Friday, while gusts and strong winds boistered other portions of the state.

The cities dust storm Thursday was followed by partially cloudy and hazy skies with the temperatures growing slightly colder.

It was a day of varying weather. While the sand drifted over most of the state, some sections felt scattered twisters, rain and some snow.

As the dust clouds slowly rode southwest toward the Gulf, snow and rain fell in the Panhandle but the clouds skipped this area and drifted into East and Central Texas after depositing additional moisture.

A thunderstorm loaded with hail and a drenching rain fell in the northeastern portion of Dallas, unroofed one home, sheds and out buildings were toppled, power lines knocked down and uprooted trees, blocked city streets.

State highway patrolmen said a dense thunder cloud resembling a funnel was sighted about 15 miles northwest of Loriane and a few miles south of Waco, but it broke up without touching the ground.

The dust storm, acclaimed by some as the worst in history, poured into Texas after pounding through Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming and New Mexico.

At one time it stretched from Denver to San Angelo and from El Paso to Wichita, Kan.

As if the storm, with all its vanities, was not freakish enough Amarillo and Pampa reported snow replacing the dust late Thursday.

Sweetwater, probably Texas' sweetest place at the height of the storm, reported 3-4 mile visibility near noon Thursday and the sand was still thick at 5 p.m. with wind gusts up to 40 miles per hour.

In Grayson County, east of Gainesville and south of Sherman, a roaring wind storm that some called a tornado, brought a down-pour of rain with some hail. However, there were no injuries reported from the winds that brought considerable damage.

With Billy Graham Scotland, An Infant Among Giants May Spark Spiritual Awakening

GLASGOW, Scotland — "And a little child shall lead them." There are definite indications that tiny Scotland, a lively infant among ponderous giants, may be the nation which will spark civilization's spiritual awakening — a situation seen by religious and secular leaders, everywhere as the only hope of a world doomed by confusion, frustration and atomic destruction.

Sir Winston Churchill has said: "Our problems have gotten quite beyond us. The human mind is not capable of solving the problems that face the world."

President Dwight Eisenhower has stated that a return to God is the only hope for peace.

Church leaders throughout the land have warned — "we must persevere or perish."

The Bible says: "If my people which are called by name shall humble themselves, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land."

Evangelist Billy Graham, now in the second week of an All-Scotland Crusade, told the writer:

"The people of Scotland are coming closer to meeting God's demands for a real religious revival than any I have ever seen. This could be the spark that will flame around the world."

Here are some of the indications in Scotland, a nation of great religious heritage and tremendous Christian influence.

The advance build-up for the All-Scotland Crusade reached a point unprecedented in history. Radio and the press bombarded the people with news about Billy Graham. Not all of the comments were favorable but all had an effect. For months before the young American arrived in Glasgow, he was the subject of conversation throughout Great Britain. Amazing results of the crusade are now flowing through these channels to Europe, Australia, New Zealand, Africa and the United States. The man on the street is talking about Jesus Christ.

During the first four meetings at Kelvin Hall in Glasgow, Graham spoke to capacity crowds totaling about 75,000 and saw approximately 1,500 decisions for Christ — more decisions for a corresponding period than he had ever seen in any campaign. For the last several weeks of the crusade, through the facilities of the British Broadcasting Company and a special relay network, he will address over 1,000,000 people each night.

The sun never sets on the prayer meetings now being held for Glasgow. People around the world, on New York's Fifth Avenue, in the industrial boom of Detroit, in remote missionary posts of darkest Africa, are praying that God will begin a religious awakening in Glasgow that will circle the earth.

"Certain it is that the ministers are supporting, and, indeed, throwing themselves into this mission as never before in living memory. "They are men who served in the Navy, Army and Air Force during the war, who, knowing well that it has no material prizes to offer, have entered the ministry, because they have found in Christ the answer not only to their own problems, but to the world's need. . . . Scientific achievement has somehow created a situation that is out of human control, and the country, let alone the world, is not fit for heroes, or indeed anyone else to live."

Added the Rev. Neville Davidson, minister of Glasgow Cathedral:

"Reverence for the book is engrained in Scottish character. Still the great majority of men and women think of the Bible as the Word of God, and will listen to a man who obviously preaches with continual reference to its authority and with a passionate conviction of its truth. . . . Billy Graham has been clearly raised up for a special work in our time." (The official motto of this city is "Let Glasgow flourish by the preaching of the word.")

During a meeting in which he addressed several hundred ministers of Scotland, Graham said: "I live in a little town (Montreat) in North Carolina, which has a population of about 500. There are high mountains almost everywhere you look. Before leaving for Scotland, I went out almost every day and climbed one of these mountains, partly for the exercise, but mostly because I wanted to be alone on a mountain-top with God.

"I often fell to my knees and prayed that God would set Scotland aflame. Moments of fear and trembling came as I knelt there before God and dedicated my life all over again.

"Great floods of expectancy came into my soul and I felt strongly that the harvest was about to come in. Let us have faith to believe what God can do in Scotland.

"All the elements for revival are here. Glasgow is the most prayed for city in the history of the Christian church. It will not be a miracle if we have a miracle. It will be a miracle if we don't have a revival.

"And the church must lead the way. Do you ever remember a time in history when the world leaders admitted their failure and said the world was doomed unless a spiritual awakening occurred. "I don't!"

"It's Just a Little Thing— . . . but it may become a very important one when you fail to file your legal documents at the time they are executed. When you get ready to sell out, lease or mortgage these missing instruments will not show up in your abstract. Failure to file promptly may not only cloud your title but cause you extra expense and inconvenience in getting new ones, in case of loss, and maybe from those who have long since moved away or from heirs of some who have died.

An Open Letter to the Voters of Ranger

Dear Voter:
One of my opponents, Mr. Lee Dockery, is making flowery and impossible to fulfill promises to the voters about how he is going, if elected, to save the taxpayers thousands of dollars through efficient and economical operation of the City's affairs.

On May 1st, 1947, the day Mr. Dockery took office as Mayor, the City had cash on hand and in the bank \$26,540.27, and only owed in current debts \$1,593.53, which simply means that the City had in cash and in the bank \$24,946.74 more money than was owed. On May 1st, 1949, the day he went out of office just two short years later we find that the City had cash on hand and in the bank the total of \$858.41, they owed in current bills \$4,594.55, they owed a bank note of \$10,000.00, and because Mr. Dockery had failed to put the amount required by Federal Court decree into the Sinking Fund, they owed that account \$7,226.83, making a grand total currently owed of \$21,821.38, or in simple terms they owed \$20,962.97 more than they had. Now, if you add together the money they had when Mr. Dockery entered the office of Mayor to the money they didn't have when he left office you get the startling amount of \$45,909.71 which Mr. Dockery's "efficient and economical" operation had cost the taxpayers in just two short years.

Another item that Mr. Dockery is making a big issue out of is the amount of salaries paid by the City, so lets take a look at HIS record in that regard. During the month of April, 1949, the last month Mr. Dockery held the office of Mayor the total sum paid out for salaries to regular employees was \$4,623.80, and for the month of February this year the amount paid out for salaries was \$4,568.34, in other words Mr. Dockery actually paid out more monthly for salaries than is being paid at present.

Another part of the record I should like to call to the voters attention is the fact that Mr. Dockery is not now, nor has he ever owned his home in Ranger, he has never paid any real estate taxes in Ranger. He did, however, after deciding to run for Mayor in 1947, go to the City Hall and pay delinquent personal property taxes on his car covering a nine year period. The amount he paid was \$67.75, covered by delinquent receipt No. 4250 and 790, AND he paid them on March 3, 1947, after filing for Mayor on February 28, 1947, just three days earlier.

Mr. Dockery has in the past, in attempting to explain how he took over the affairs of your City with money and savings bonds totaling \$26,540.27, and in two years went out of office leaving the City in the hole to the tune of \$20,962.97, by stating that "We went through a water shortage during that period which necessitated the expenditure of extra money". However, the only person in Ranger that got any benefit from money spent in that connection was a member and cohort in his own City Council who got the best stock tank in the County built absolutely free to him on his ranch which is out of the city limits.

Voters in view of the facts presented here can you place any confidence in a platform purporting to be based upon an efficient and economical administration by Mr. Dockery? I think not. And can you, after allying ourselves with the Lone Star Gas Company, a Company whose pledged support to Ranger in gaining new industry could very well be a determining factor in our effort to progress, place at the head of your City Government a man who is antagonistic toward the Company? I believe that you will agree that would not be good business.

I have not, and do not intend to make my campaign on the basis of my opponents disqualifications, but fellow citizens these are facts, and I believe that the voters of Ranger are entitled to the facts. If I am elected to the office of Mayor I promise to diligently and faithfully conduct the affairs of the City to the limit of my ability, and I know that I am qualified, through education and actual experience with City business, to give you an honest, capable and progressive administration.
