Minutes After Alert

Machine Guns Protect City Water Supplies

Within the first minutes of "Operation Minuteman," the Ranger National Guard threw an armed force around the city's valuable water supply last night.

No sooner had the national alert been broadcast over radio and television, when guardsmen began arriving at the armory for their issue of weapons and to take assigned posts at Hagaman Lake and around the water tower in town.

Most heavily guarded site was

the tower where two machine guns commanded approaches to the site. Nearly ten guardsmen patrolled the area surrounding Lake Hagaman.

The great value of the National Guard to the community, state and nation was strikingly demonstrated during the alert.

Local residents watched with interest as officers and men of the unit were alerted and quickly assumed their assigned duties with the unit.

The excellence of their Guard training was shown in the efficient manner in which they assembled their arms, and were ready to operate in a remarkably short space of time.

Headquarters for the battalion as it rolled to strategic positions in full battle dress, was established in the armory building where coordination checks by the mobilized unit broke the hundred pace set by men who were preparing themselves for emergencies that could crop up in the time of disaster.

Precise radio contact was maintained with each of the patrol units, replacements and additional strength was poised to answer disaster signals as if the city was in the grip of some civil disaster or the danger of an atomic explosion.

No details were omitted and nothing was left unchecked.

Responding to praise from civil

officials and National Guard Commanders, Capt. Cecil C. Carr, commander of the local battalion, said that officers and the men of the unit appreciated the many fine comments on the ability of the battalion to mobilize quickly to be of any possible service to our community, state or county in peace or war.

"The fine cooperation of community officials and area residents

Being naturally inquisitive, we asked to what part of human anatomy this man belonged and how serious was the accident. The informer said that it was all simple. The ditch digger was mechanical and in an attempt to cross a ditch on the new home being constructed for Dr. W. P. Watkins, the machine dropped into the ditch and as he said before, "broke his hip."

Now in the minds of some of the citizens of one of our neighboring towns, Jess Cole, who contributed much to the success of the March of Dimes, is a fellow whose efficient and rapid operations are not entirely appreciated.

After the vaccine was delivered to Austin Saturday and prepared for distribution, some amount of discussion arose in the county as to what methods would be employed in bringing the serum here. After much delay, Jess advised the National Guard to fly it in.

The serum was delivered in the county before others had decided what mode of transportation would be used.

However, the fact remains that the serum has been delivered here in most cases already administered and if it can be 80 to 90 per cent effective in stamping out polio, then we see that no one has any legitimate complaints.

testants, Stafford Reeves and Bill Newberry may fill the end positions while Van Lloyd, weighing 176, tried for guard.

Other newcomers are Charles Scott, a 185 pound fullback from Rockwall and Bobby Bullard a 150 pound guard from Brownwood.

Willie Hawkins, center letterman, from last year, expects to see duty in the next season, and will receive assistance from Roger Dunlap.

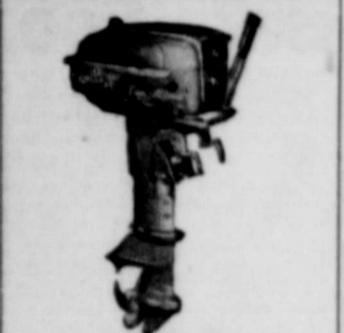

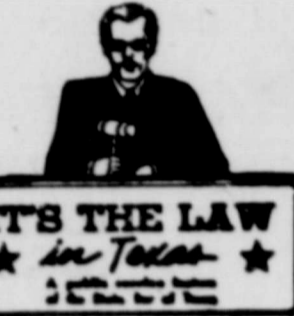

glanced at his watch, "Golly, it's almost 1 o'clock. Better get going."

But when they got back to the coat rack, Jean's fur coat was gone.

"I'm sorry, sir," said the manager, "but we are not responsible for lost articles. We put up the coat rack for the convenience of our patrons, but that sign you see makes you responsible for your own hat and coat. I'm awfully sorry, but we just can't watch everybody's possessions."

Sign Not Factor

The fact is that in the case of Jean's fur coat the restaurant would not have been responsible for its loss even if there had been no sign. One who takes off a garment and places it on a coat rack, as one would do in a restaurant, retains the power of surveillance and control over it himself. Ordinarily, under such circumstances, the operators of the restaurant have no responsibility toward the customer's belongings because they have not knowingly received the exclusive possession and dominion over them.

The case would be different, however, where the coat had been delivered to an employee in a checkroom. In such event, the management probably would be responsible. So, also, in the cases where a customer checks valuables with a bathing house proprietor, or with a hotel desk clerk, or leaves his automobile with the parking lot attendant to be parked and stored for him, those receiving possession of the customer's property have the duty to use proper care to see that the customer's property is returned.

When you purchase a new sewing machine, you're making a lifetime investment. Its selection should not be a spur-of-the-moment thing.

If you've been thinking of replacing your older machine, you will want to give careful consideration to buying one of the many new types.

For plain sewing, retching or mending, a straight sewing machine is satisfactory. This type is also

preferred for dress-making and tailoring, if no fancy effects are required.

Newer, "zig-zag" type machines are designed to handle specialty jobs like decorative stitching and embroidery. These machines cost more and also require a lot of practice to manipulate successfully.

Whether you choose a cabinet or portable machine might depend on the amount of space in your home, and the use to which you put your machine. If you choose a cabinet, for comfort, sturdiness and convenience. If space is limited or if you need to move the machine often, a portable may be the answer.

Specialists add a word of caution about buying second-hand or rebuilt machines. Knowing your dealer is of the utmost importance here. Many second-hand machines are of the foot-threaded type which have been motorized. Beware of the "bait" ads of fly-by-night concerns who seem to offer tremendous bargains. Often these machines do not stand up and repair service is not provided by the dealer.

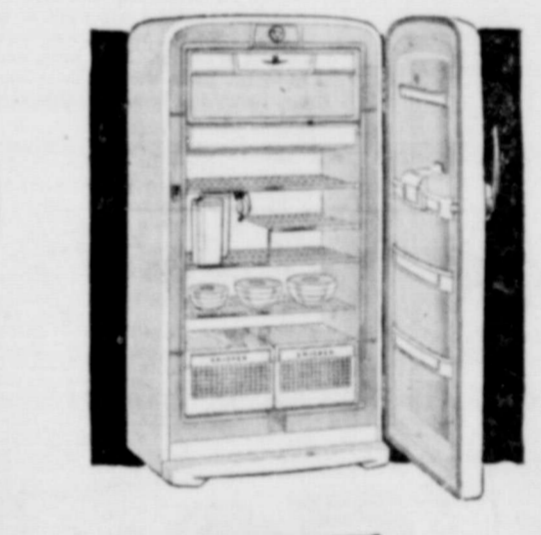

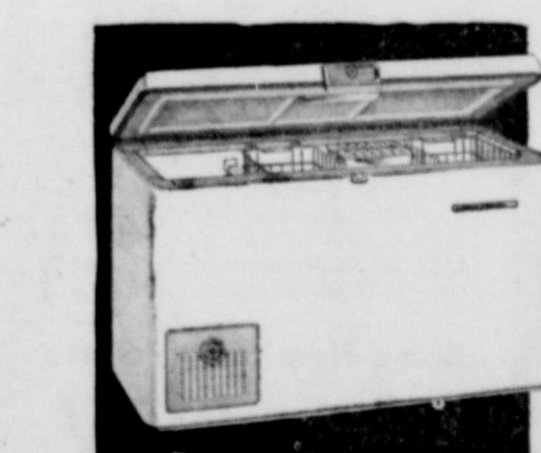

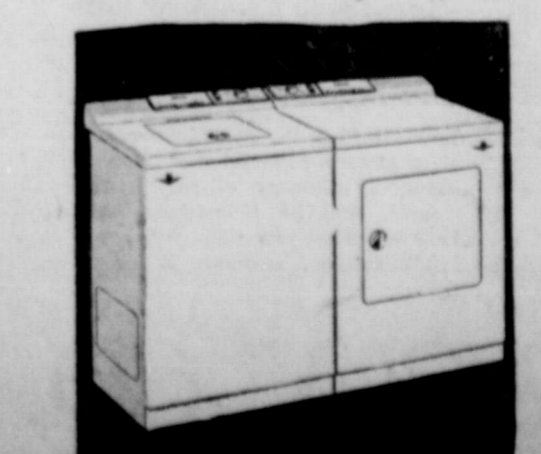

Arrangements About Notaries Are Announced

Secretary of State A. M. Muldrow has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the county clerk of their residence between June 1, 1955, and June 10, 1955. The law specifically requires county clerks to approve notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the county clerk acts thereon. Johnson Smith is county clerk of Eastland County.

Any person who has not heretofore been a notary public should apply to his county clerk between May 1, 1955 and May 23, 1955, if he desires to have his application given prompt attention to the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions, it was pointed out.

Secretary of State Muldrow said, "Each person applying for a commission as a notary public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the county clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."
