Ranger seems to have developed an overwhelming interest in baseball for the youth of the city. The Little League has been going great guns since its origin here one year ago and now plans are being studied for the development of a Pony League to supplement the Little League.

While the Little League limits its playing eligibility from eight to 13 years of age, the Pony League allows participation from boys 13 and 14 years of age.

Regular Field Project Spotted Near Eastland

A regular field project was spotted near Eastland this week.

Forster, Carr and Scott of Odessa No. 1 J. L. Dick, will be a regular field project three miles northeast of Eastland spotting 1-018 feet from the north and 1-099 feet from the east lines of Warren Lyman Survey. It is slated for 1,200 feet with rotary.

Irish Drilling Co., Inc., et al., of Cisco, No. 3 - A Holcomb will be an 1,800 foot rotary project two miles northeast of Eastland. Site is 1,035 feet from the south and 835 feet from the east lines of the southwest quarter of Section 1, Block 9, H&TC Survey.

Deadline for all entries closes at noon Thursday, April 28.

Playoff brackets for both boys and girls singles and doubles in each class will be prepared from the list of entries for that class.

Winners of each of the two-out-of-three sets, which is the standard match, will advance toward the finals. Playing times will be decided after brackets are drawn and failure of a player to meet at an agreed time results in a forfeit to the player present.

Playing and results of each match will be judged, reported, and posted to the bracket for that type and class of play by the players of that match until the finals of each bracket.

Little League Spring Training Opens Monday

.81 Inches Rain Falls In Area

High winds, hail and a short heavy downpour of rain dumped .81 inches of moisture on this area last night.

Approaching in the midst of a tornado warning which was lifted only after 9 Saturday morning, the cloud struck here at approximately 1 o'clock Saturday morning.

The high winds and severe lightning put some parts of the city without lights for some time and the hail stripped some trees of all their leaves.

Height of the storm lasted for only 15 minutes.

Cisco received minor damage from a hail storm that passed through that area at 6:15 p.m. Friday. Only .40 inches of rain was reported with the hailstones.

Possible scattered afternoon and evening thundershowers were forecast for Saturday with slight traces of dust.

The tornado warning was issued Friday night for an area running 40 miles on either side of a line running 30 miles north-northwest of Hobart, Okla., to 30 miles south, southwest of Ft. Worth.

Future Plans On Cisco Stock Show Mapped

There will be no public sale or auction at the one day registered beef calf show at Cisco on May 21, it was announced today by Satton Crofts of that city, president of the Cisco Livestock Show Association, sponsoring organization.

Calves entered for competition in the show may have been fed any way the breeder desired so long as the calf suckled its own dam and was not on a nurse cow it was said. All calves shown in pens of three of the same sex must have been dropped on or after September 1, 1954.

Preeders may enter individual animals of any age or sex for show purposes only and not for competition. Several have an (Continued On Page Two)

First Round Polio Vaccination Completed Here

A small group of first and second grade school children were given the Salk vaccine polio shots Thursday to complete the eligible list of students who were omitted earlier in the week.

The group vaccinated Thursday represented those who were absent or sick during the time that the first group was vaccinated Monday morning.

Those shots administered Thursday was a portion of the 20 cc shipment that was flown into Abilene Tuesday night upon the request of Dr. L. C. Brown, county health officer. They were delivered to Eastland by the Highway Patrolman stationed in Eastland.

City Health officer, Dr. W. P. Watkins said that the second round shots would be given May 10 if the vaccine is available. Third and final shots of the series are to be given by private physicians with each family bearing the cost of the final inoculation.

Dr. Watkins said that there had been no serious reactions from the shots reported anywhere in this area.

Pony League Will Complete Program

Newcomers to the Ranger Little League will begin spring training Monday afternoon, it was decided at an officers meeting Thursday night at the First Baptist Church.

All boys who have not previously played Little League ball here before and those who tried out last year but failed to make one of the teams will be eligible for the pre-season training.

Actual League play will begin May 30 with an 18 game schedule for each team. Play will end in the first week of August.

League officials have requested that National Headquarters consider last year as their trial year as the local teams followed all national regulations. There has been no definite decision announced by National Headquarters, however, from material received here, the request has undoubtedly received the sanction of the national group.

After spring training is completed May 13, managers will strengthen their teams at a player auction May 17 on a point system. Each team is allotted and has accumulated a number of points. Managers bid on individual players with their points exactly as major league clubs with points instead of money used.

Points are accumulated from season to season.

Exact schedule of playing dates will be decided at later business meetings. Games will be played on Monday and Thursday nights the officials decided however.

For the first time this year, a Minor League will be developed for competition among the boys who are not chosen on Little League teams. Their schedules, contests will be played before the regular Little League games.

Walter Arberburn, league secretary, specifically pointed out that those who did undergo spring training last year but were not chosen by one of the managers will again this year be eligible for spring training.

Cisco Country Club Prepared For Golf Meet

Everything is in readiness for the 20th annual Cisco Invitation Golf Tournament to be played at the Cisco Country Club Friday and Saturday, April 29 and 30, and Sunday, May 1, according to an announcement by Norman Huston, general chairman.

Qualifying rounds may be played anytime during the week of April 24 at the Club, Huston said. Those who expect to compete for medal honors must shoot their qualifying rounds on Friday, April 29, he added. Match play will begin Saturday morning with the two final rounds on Sunday.

Test Alert Basis For Guard Recruit Drive

Capt. Cecil C. Carr, commanding the Ranger National Guard, announced today that the unit is launching a recruiting campaign to bring it up to its full, authorized strength.

"We feel that our unit's participation in the recent National Guard nationwide test alert has made our fellow citizens in this area more aware of the services the Guard renders in peace as well as in war," he declared.

"There are many young men and veterans here who are eligible for Guard membership. We extend a cordial invitation to them to join the local unit and to serve with their friends and neighbors from their own home streets."

Capt. Carr pointed out there are many advantages in National Guard membership.

"There is, first of all," he said, "the great personal satisfaction and prestige of serving one's community, state and country in the nation's oldest military organization. All Guardsmen are volunteers and all are inspired to serve, primarily, by the highest patriotic motives," he added.

Other major advantages of Guard membership, Capt. Carr continued, are that Guardsmen receive the pay of Regular Army personnel of equivalent grade, and have many opportunities for promotion to non-commissioned officers and commissioned officers rank, retirement pay, service at home with friends and neighbors, and the opportunity to continue in normal occupations while belonging to the Guard.

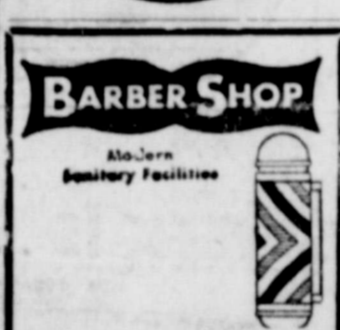

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Thursday Afternoon Club To Bring Albany's Fandangle Sampler To Eastland Free to the Public

The Fandangle Sampler, a miniature edition of Albany's summer show, The Fort Griffin Fandangle, will be presented in Eastland, free to the public, under sponsorship of the Thursday Afternoon Study Club, at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Eastland High School Gymnasium. It is expected to draw a minimum of 500 people to its Eastland performance.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle, of which the Sampler is a part, was first presented in 1938. Since that year there have been 10 productions, each different, though the theme of each show is based on the history of Fort Griffin, the army outpost established after the Civil War 18 miles north of Albany to protect early settlers from the Indians. The Sampler which will visit Eastland contains selections from the eleventh production now in preparation and will serve as a preview of next summer's show. The Thursday Afternoon Club has named the City Commissioners and Eastland school children as honored guests for the Eastland show.

The Sampler is just what its name implies, a sample of the Fandangle proper. It lasts about forty

minutes, contains songs and dances which give an idea of what the full length Fandangle is like.

About 80 people, high school students and adults, form the Sampler company. Under leadership of Robert Nail, Fandangle author and director, they are organized into a singing and dancing unit, take to the highways, giving free performances in neighboring towns.

The unit carries an electric organ, played by the Fandangle music director, Alice Reynolds, and its own lighting and sound equipment. The performers appear in costume.

Folk ballads and breakdowns compose most of the music in the Sampler, though this year's edition, Miss Reynolds says, also includes some original music. Fandangle dances are all based on the squares, schottisches, polkas and other dances of this area's pioneers.

The performers in the Fandangle are all natives of Albany. The cast is restricted to those who were born, at one time lived or now live in Albany. It is strictly a made-in-Albany product.

It is produced by the Fort Griffin Fandangle Association, a non-profit corporation without stockholders. All earnings from the big show are plowed back into the

With Billy Graham Speaker Reaches 30,000,000 Persons Nightly During Scottish Crusade

PERTH, Scotland — There's fire on the heather in Scotland. This expression, used for years by Scots to describe unusual religious moments, is being heard throughout the country again.

Evangelist Billy Graham's All-Scotland Crusade, now past the halfway point of its six-week schedule, has reached the cities, towns and remotest hamlets of the highlands.

The most popular topic of conversation — on the streets, in nightclubs, shipyards and civic luncheons — is Jesus Christ and Billy Graham. Members of the Scotch clergy have stated that such a situation has never existed in the present generation. A vast majority of the talk is favorable, but the loud minority, always present, seeks to keep the subject alive.

The 17,000 people who attend services each night in Kelvin Hall form only a small part of the crusade. With modern amplification and electronics, Billy is now addressing the entire nation each night on a special relay system.

Beginning next week the whole of England will join the system.

People gather in hundreds of halls and listen to the services from Kelvin. Without even seeing Billy Graham they make decisions for Christ by the thousands. Scores of Scottish pastors who had never in their ministry given an invitation for people to come forward at services are present at the relay points to give the invitations.

Long after Billy Graham has departed from Scotland these ministers will continue to give the invitation at their own churches. They have sensed the mood and hunger of the people.

Every medium of transmission has been opened to the popular American evangelist. Millions of people have been reached on radio and television. On one night Billy preached to an estimated 30,000,000, possibly more than Dwight L. Moody reached in his entire lifetime.

A young millionaire in the highland city of Inverness was stretched out on his bed on Sunday morning. Everything he touched had turned to gold. He later confided that he had everything and didn't need God. For no particular reason he reached over and flicked on the radio at the side of the bed. Billy was speaking over BBC and said, "among other things, 'What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul? You can take every dollar in the Bank of England and all the treasures of Europe, but God says they amount to nothing in comparison with one human soul.'

The young man got out of bed and dressed. A few minutes later he walked into church and took a seat in front of his brother. The brother tapped him on the shoulder and said, "John, I'm glad to see you here. I've been praying for you a long time." The man turned and said, "You're going to see me here a lot from now on. I realized while listening to a man on the radio a little while ago how futile my life has been."


A doctor was driving from Edinburgh to Glasgow and turned on his radio. Again Billy was speak-

800 covenanters were imprisoned there by Montrose after the Battle of Tulliburly. The Earl of Cornwall was slain before the high altar by his brother, King Edward III, in 1335.

Standing there knee-deep in history and tradition, Billy told the congregation, "You will never see the kingdom of Heaven unless you are born again through faith in Jesus Christ." Believest thou this?" And many believed.
