

# Fort Worth Man Injured When Car Overtakes In City Limits

## Condition Reported As "Good"

Leonard Hamilton, 35, of Fort Worth was reported in "good condition" at Ranger General Hospital this morning after he received severe neck and facial lacerations, bruises and a slight concussion in an automobile accident within the Ranger City limits Friday afternoon.

Hamilton, on route back to Fort Worth Friday afternoon, after a visit to his mother, Mrs. Oram M. Hamilton, Rt. 1, Ranger, was injured when his car overtook several times slightly west of the National Guard Armory.

Witnesses said that the car hit loose gravel on the left side of the four lane highway and apparently out of control tore across the road where it overturned at "least two times" in a bar ditch.

The car was estimated to be a total loss. Hamilton's injuries also consisted of painful back and chest bruises, however, they are not serious.

## Former Staff, Ranger Pastor Dies At 78

Dr. Robert H. White, 78, pastor of the Nazarene Church in Alpine, formerly of Staff and Ranger, died April 10 in Van Horn of a heart attack suffered shortly after preaching at the Nazarene Church there Easter Sunday. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. D. T. White of Staff.

Dr. White and his wife, the former Miss Myrtle Mangum, retired from the teaching profession in California three years ago and came to Alpine to work with small churches unable to support regular pastors. During this period they worked about a year with the church in Las Vegas, N. M. Most of Dr. White's teaching had been as head of English departments in West Coast colleges.

Funeral services were held at the Nazarene Church, Alpine, April 14.

The Rev. R. C. Gunstead, Albuquerque, N. M., district superintendent of the Nazarene Church, officiated, assisted by Rev. Carl Lawson, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Alpine. Burial was in Elm Grove Cemetery, Alpine.

## The Pathfinder

"It's a shame the way some players grab all the glory; even the sportscasters help them out," said the young wife.

"How's that?" asked the puzzled husband.

"Why a fellow got a hit today and they didn't even mention his name," she said. "The only thing the sportscaster said was a guy that looked like Stan Musial won the game for the Cards."

"Looked like Stan Musial?" asked the perplexed husband.

"Yes," she replied. "The announcer said that Stan Musial's double won the game."

In each of these columns, we have more or less attempted to side-step any political issues, but what with a subject so common among city-lie here and the dark, rumbling cloud that is drifting toward City Hall, one can hardly keep from getting his feet wet.

This is quite an amusing position though, really.

A man makes brash statements full of promises that he can't possibly keep. Then sooner or later, you're in a position to recount his failures and make it a matter of public interest. The figure then plunges deeper into the nasty entanglements that often cling to regular mill-of-the-run politicians. He's on the way down now, using every filthy trick that he knows, maybe even committing bodily harm, then he's impeached—wiped out—blotted—mashed, morally and physically, and he's only a shadow among the skeletons of failure.

He can only cry, "Why?" "Why?" Only because of his unfulfilled promises, boasts and naïvetés he has ostracized from the purer portion of society which hopes its footing occasionally but never fails to return its rightfully won perch that commands the respect of justice, tolerance, and even bravery.

We have stressed from time to time that because we are living in a fairly remote area that we are not immune to disaster. How may we impress that even we are subject to such calamities?

Mrs. Grace M. Martin, Texas coordinator of women's activities in civil defense and disaster relief, in a message to 21,000 rural women's organizations wrote this week:

"While those living in rural areas are not likely to be hit by atomic or hydrogen weapons they are vulnerable to radioactive fallout and to fire and natural disasters such as tornadoes.

"She urged that rural women organize to learn the effects of nuclear, chemical, and biological warfare; to teach their families self-protection measures to prepare them against enemy attacks, accidental bombings and natural disasters; and to study first-aid, home nursing and fire prevention and control.

These are some of the things she said rural women must be prepared for if an attack comes:

Assure a food supply for the nation, guard against disease among livestock, maintain basic self-protection systems against fire, stay ready to receive the injured and homeless from the cities, and assist stricken services and loans of equipment such as trucks, two-way radios, bulldozers, portable lights and power systems.

## Thundershowers Possible Here Over Weekend

While Eastland County was basking in 94 degree weather Friday afternoon, some sections of the state were drenched with downpours from thundershowers.

Rains of up to 3 1/2 inches were reported in northern Haskell County. Rochester gauged 1 1/2 inches.

Students at O'Brien School led teachers and students to spend 40 minutes in storm cellars near the school. The town has been tornado conscious since the storm struck there in 1953. No storm materialized Friday however.

Long range weather forecasters said that the 30-day outlook calls for temperatures to average below seasonal normals west of the continental divide, along the Atlantic seaboard and the northern plains. Above normal temperatures are predicted over the remainder of the nation with the greatest departure over Texas and adjacent states.

Forecast for the weekend calls for widely scattered thundershowers which are possible over the entire state, with temperatures again ranging up into the 90's.

### Eastland County Gains Location For Wildcat

Location for a new 3,600-foot cable tool wildcat was staked in Eastland County five miles southwest of Carbon this week.

It will be Sinclair Oil and Gas Co. No. 1 W. G. Elliott, spotting 350 feet from the north and west lines of Section 50, John Owings Survey, Abstract 400.

In the regular field, Frank Love and Co. of Wichita Falls staked No. 5 Robert Fox as a 1,300-foot rotary project six miles south of Ranger.

Drill site is 1,500 feet from the south and 2,350 feet from the east lines of Subdivision 30, McLennan CSL Survey 2.

Completed as a regular field producer was Jack Chamberlain of Eastland No. 2 J. L. Dick, 4 1/2 miles northeast of Eastland in Warren Lyman Survey.

## Is Veal To Be Police Chief?

The city law forces will be run by a group of deputy constables from the time the new commission takes over Saturday afternoon until the next regular meeting night of the City Council, a reliable source told a Times reporter here Friday.

While evidently the plan has not been approved by the entire commission, a portion of the commission members have taken steps to have two policemen sworn in as deputy constables by Ralph Veal, constable of Precinct 1.

The move would remove all present policemen from the rolls of the police department with the exception of Joe Faircloth. Bill Duncan is to be added with Veal and Faircloth as the deputy constables until Tuesday night when the regular commission is supposed to accept them as policemen with Veal as chief.

Some observers have asked with what funds will the three constables be paid while performing city duties. Theoretically the duties of a constable are financed through county funds and possibly no outlet of city funds would be set aside for payment of county duties.

Also, these same observers can see no way in which the city's police patrol car could legally be commandeered by county law officers.

The information source, even though nearly complete dismissal of the present police force is expected, said that no changes among other city employees was anticipated.

## College Math Head Attends Abilene Meet

Judson R. Hardy, head of the mathematics department of Ranger Junior College, attended the annual meeting of the Texas Section of The American Mathematical Association in Abilene on April 22 and 23.

Several papers were discussed by outstanding mathematicians of Texas universities. The high point of the meeting was Friday afternoon when Prof. W. L. Duren, of Tulane University and also President of the American Mathematical Association, spoke on the revisions in the curriculum of the first two years of college mathematics.

Although the survey work on the revisions is not complete, it was pointed out by Prof. Duren, there is a definite demand for a universal mathematics which would bypass much of the non-essential mathematics taught in our colleges and universities today.

## 4-H Boys Total 250 In County; Ten Chapters

Two hundred and fifty boys, representing ten schools, in Eastland County are engaged in 4-H work. It was learned today from R. E. Higgins, assistant county agricultural agent.

Projects in which they engage include calves, chickens, turkeys, pigs, field crops, vegetable gardens and dairy cattle.

The crops include peanuts and cotton, in the main, along with a small amount of grain, such as maize and milo.

Asked if this induces boys to stay on the farm, he said: "To some degree. It especially induces them to go into the agricultural fields such as teaching and 4-H services, like extension and soil conservation."

Of future interest, Mr. Higgins said: "There will be a Sears pig distribution to the 4-Hers soon."

## Further Polio Serum Delay Is Anticipated

### Polio Shots To Continue After Delay

"Second round polio vaccine shots will be given here on schedule," Dr. W. P. Watkins, city health officer, said today.

The health officer indicated that those in the medical profession had not taken a dim view on the vaccine after more than 50 children over the nation who had taken the shots, had been stricken by polio.

Dr. Watkins said, "It certainly hasn't been proved that the vaccine caused the polio."

He also urged that all eligible first and second graders here take the second shot. He said, "Immunity cannot be accomplished with only one shot."

Dr. Watkins said that there was definitely none of the Cutter vaccine, which has caused the controversy over the nation, given as free vaccine in the state and that there had been none made by that pharmaceutical house anywhere in Ranger.

He added that the vaccine is most effective four weeks after the second shot.

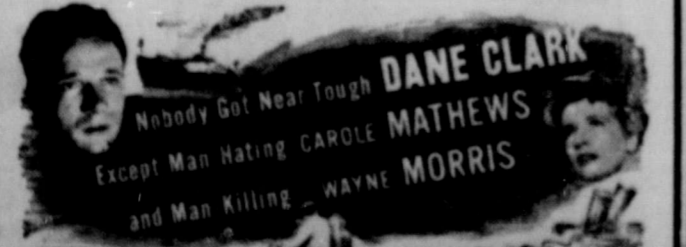

### With Billy Graham Glasgow's Kelvin Hall Unable To Hold Crusade Crowds In Last Week

GLASGOW — With the successful All-Scotland Crusade of Evangelist Billy Graham now in its last week, Glasgow's Kelvin Hall is no longer able to hold the crowds, and little revivals are breaking out in churches all over the country.

"There is a tremendous religious revival sweeping the northeast of Scotland," Billy said in an address at Kelvin Hall, where 18,000 sat inside and 7,000 stood outside. Billy went out and spoke for a few minutes to those who had been unable to gain entrance, gave an invitation, and 35 responded.

Numerous reports have been received of revivals under way in churches where pastors are giving the first invitations of their ministry for worshippers to accept Christ and love Him seven days a week.

On the two final days of the campaign in Glasgow Billy will speak to over 200,000 persons at Ibrox and Hampden stadiums. Next Monday & Tuesday he will hold giant rallies in the north of Scotland.

# Beauty And Convenience Combine In New First Methodist Kitchen

 Extensive remodeling and redecorating is now being completed in the basement of the First Methodist Church in accordance with the building program, which will eventually include the entire basement section.

An unused room has been converted into a nursery for the church's day camp. Several playpens and a number of educational toys have been purchased under the direction of Miss Mary Kehler, Mrs. Leonard Pounds and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Deaton.

The Nursery class room walls and ceiling have been painted

bright yellow and the floor has been covered with bright linoleum. The Kindergarten class room also has yellow walls and ceiling, enhanced with green printed cafe style curtains. The chairs and tables have been enameled in east-egg colors. Meses. A. J. Ratliff, Willis Clarke, Jr., and C. E. May, Jr., assisted with the work.

The Primary and Junior class rooms are to be redecorated in the near future, and an office constructed for the Children's Division secretary. Fourteen folding serving tables and a new speaker's stand have been purchased for general use in the basement.

The pride and joy of the women

of the church at the present moment is the brand new kitchen, completed just in time for use during the recent revival. The rooms occupied by the nursery class, the old kitchen and part of the hall have been remodeled into a large, sunny, beautiful kitchen equipped with almost every imaginable convenience.

Beauty and convenience are combined in the color scheme of pale green, dark red and dark green. The walls and ceiling are pale green and the floor is covered with a light vari-colored spatter linoleum. The room is accented with modern fluorescent lighting.

The natural finish cabinets extend around two walls and the counter tops are of dark red formica with chrome trim. The cabinets feature a special section for trays. Electric molding with outlets every three feet extend the entire length of the counter top. Each door and drawer in the cabinets have been labeled with decals to indicate its contents.

Two oversize divided sinks are equipped with red rubber accessories, including sink liners, dish drainers and mats.

A large, round brass plaque hangs over the new 11 1/2 foot Frigidaire, which is the latest model with pale green interior and gold colored fixtures.

The windows are covered with white venetian blinds. The cafe-style curtains are fashioned with a dark green chintz valance at the top. The lower section is a provincial print, carrying out the color scheme of the room.

Two Tappan gas ranges with a total of twelve burners and a huge oven, insure convenient cooking for a large crowd.

One of the main features is a large formica-top serving table, which was designed to fit across the double doors into the dining room, allowing for easy buffet serving.

Adding to the kitchen's conveniences are a drying rack for dish towels, a large-size disposal can, red step stool, two electric diplopilers, two other coffee urns, a three-tiered wooden serving cart, a stainless steel serving cart, new cooking utensils, wall can opener and two racks holding wax paper, foil and paper towels. Some of these were donated by individual members.

All Home Demonstration Clubs belong to the Texas Home Demonstration Association which is a federation of home demonstration clubs. (Continued From Page One) worm emerges from the egg, feeds on the young pecan buds and then enters the small nut. Normally, this will take place sometime between April 20 and May 15, depending on temperature and other climatic conditions, he said. Proper time of the spraying is essential, Mr. Cooper said, but equally important is the proper spraying of the trees.

"The success with any spray treatment for control of case-bearers depends on the thorough wetting of each nut cluster on the tree," Cooper said.

Nearly 100 persons, representing eight West Central Texas counties attended the Pecan Field Day. Pecan growers from San Saba, Brown, Comanche, Erath, Eastland, Haskell, Parker, Callahan and Stephens counties heard four experts discuss almost every phase of pecan growing. They stressed the importance of pecan insect control.

The speakers were B. G. Hancock, horticulturist of the Texas Extension Service; J. L. Rainey, Richard Springs and San Angelo nurseryman and pecan grower; L. G. Romberg, Brownwood, U. S. Pecan Experiment Station; and J. W. Foster Jr., Weatherford, entomologist.

At noon the group partook of a picnic lunch. Coffee and cold

drinks were furnished by the pecan growers.

In the afternoon, Mr. Hancock discussed "Cover Crop and Fertilization Program for Cultivated Pecan Orchards"; Mr. Rainey talked on "Opportunities of Pecan Growing in Sandy Soils"; Mr. Romberg discussed "Pecan Varieties Which Do Best in Central West Texas"; and Mr. Foster demonstrated and discussed new insecticides and methods of application.
