Ford Expansion Program Told By Henry Ford II

Henry Ford II has disclosed that Ford Motor Company will spend an additional \$625,000,000 during the next three years on new plants and equipment, boosting to \$2,325,000,000 the amount spent since 1946 to expand and modernize Ford facilities.

Mr. Ford, president of Ford Motor Company, spoke at the annual dinner of Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers Association at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

Mr. Ford also urged both management and labor to help maintain the nation's current prosperity, said this prosperity would be impossible without technological progress, and referred to "automation" as a "grossly-inflated issue."

Further, he assails "reactionary" and "stereotyped" thinking on both sides of the labor-management table, asserting:

"I'm all for chasing the sacred cows out of the stable of business."

With regard to the new expansion program, Mr. Ford said his company found it necessary to earmark an additional \$625,000,000 for new facilities because a previous post war expansion outlay of \$1,700,000,000 still has not given the company enough production capacity to keep up with demand.

Breakfast Is The Key To Successful Weight Reduction



A doctor recently accused a bride of six months "of killing her husband with kindness." Her husband had gained an excessive amount of weight. The wife, in her desire to feed her husband adequately and to demonstrate her cooking ability, simply had fed her husband too well.

The doctor explained that overweight could become a serious concern. It could affect appearance, vitality, emotions, personal and public relations and life expectancy. Overweight is due to overeating—the result of eating more calories than can be used.

The couple asked the doctor's help in working out a reducing plan. The doctor outlined the total caloric intake that could be eaten each day. He stressed the importance of three meals nutritionally adequate except for calories. Breakfast, he pointed out, is the key to any successful reducing diet. Research has shown that skipping breakfast is a strain on the body, promotes unnecessary fatigue, slows down reactions and reduces work output.

A reducing diet breakfast follows a basic breakfast pattern recommended by doctors and dietitians. It should provide one-fourth of the total daily requirements. A basic breakfast pattern includes fruit, cereal, milk, bread and butter. The 400 calorie breakfast pictured above shows that our bride not only could prepare attractive breakfasts but ones that fit a basic pattern—even on restricted calories.

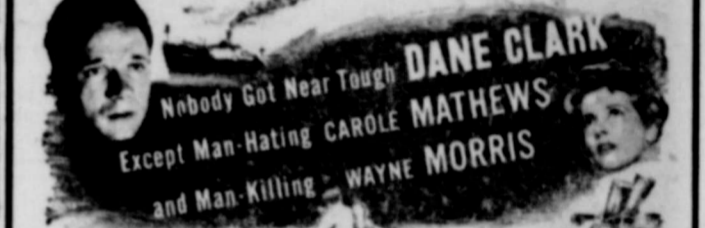

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

A sumptuous frosting for a just-out-of-the-oven cake—that's what folks love. And it's a praline topping made this way: mix together 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, two tablespoons cake flour, 1-4 cup melted butter, two tablespoons water, and 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts. Spread carefully, a little at a time, over your cake. Return to the oven and bake five minutes more.

You don't need a brush to clean combs. Just put them into hot soapsuds, pour a few drops of ammonia up and down the combs, and the dirt will float right out. Rinse, dry, and the combs are clean.

A broiled sandwich made of cheese and bacon topped with tomato and quickly placed under the broiler, makes an easy meal. With the hot tasty sandwich, try serving crisp raw vegetables, a glass of cold milk, cookies and ice cream for dessert.

Studies by the water heater division of the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association show that soaking clothes longer than 10 or 15 minutes permits the water to cool and hinders the cleansing action of soap. Hot water opens the fabric mesh in most materials, permitting soapsuds to circulate and loosen dirt, at the same time helping the soap to emulsify oil and grease.

Looking for something unusual and extra good for breakfast? Hollow out some firm tart apples. Stuff the centers with ground ham, dot with butter, and sprinkle with brown sugar. Place in pan and bake in the oven of your range until tender, but not too soft. Serve these with waffles or hot cakes.

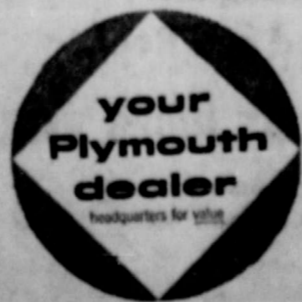

DECORATIVE SHELVES



A few decorative plastic shelves such as these in your bathroom offer needed storage space for feminine beauty aids or men's shaving supplies. The smart-looking shelves, known as Selfix, stick firmly to tile, wood, plaster, or glass walls without nails or screws. Just moisten the adhesive-coated backplates, work the adhesive into a gluey consistency, and press the shelf into position against the wall. CONTRACTS MAY BE FORMAL OR INFORMAL

The word "contract" ordinarily brings to mind a formal, written document signed with pomp and ceremony. The use of that word to describe our daily transactions with the grocer, the plumber, the newspaperboy or the baby sitter would seldom occur to any of us. Yet, most contracts arise out of such daily transactions and only a small percentage of the contracts made are even written.

What then is a contract? It is merely an agreement in which two or more persons (or companies or organizations) bind themselves to do or not to do certain acts. Each acquires a right to have the other person keep his promises.

For example, the boy next door asks if he may cut your grass for a dollar. You say, "All right, go ahead."

The two of you have entered into a contract whereby he promises to cut your grass and in return you promise to pay him a dollar.

The signing of a sales slip, ordering goods on a charge account in a downtown store, is the formation of a contract, though we seldom refer to it as such.

A few contracts, however, by state law must be in writing in order to bind the parties. For instance, contracts for the transfer of real estate.

It would be impractical for you to require that every contract you enter into be drawn up in written form. However, whenever you are engaged in business transactions of any importance you should insist that all the terms of the agreement be put in writing and signed, because it is often most difficult to prove unwritten agreements.

You will often be requested to sign written contracts, all of parts of which have been prepared by the other party. There are two cardinal rules to apply in such cases:

First, do not sign a contract until you have read and completely understand all of its terms and provisions. Of course, you should never sign a contract on a form which is not completely filled out. Be careful of the person who tries to convince you that these precautions are unnecessary or that there isn't enough time.

Second, before you sign be sure that every important promise or provision to which you have agreed is included. Do not be misled into leaving something out by a wave of the hand and a statement that "Oh, we needn't put that in, it is understood."

Failure to insert some important provision may make the entire contract unenforceable because of vagueness. It may mean that you may not be permitted to prove or enforce that particular important provision not inserted. Or it may mean that the law will imply an agreement on this point contrary to the one actually agreed upon but left out of the contract.
