The Ranger Rotary Club met Wednesday, August 2, in the Ranger Junior College cafeteria.

Herman Cupp presided. The club voted on the following new directors: W. T. Eaton, Garlond Greenlee, Jess Weaver, and A. A. Sigmans. Each of the new directors gave a report on the service projects for the club year.

Mayor Morris Newham brought a program on "Problems of the City." One of the problems that he discussed was city finances. He said that income on water sales is off because of the cool weather and rain, which are good for grass and lawns, but bad for city finances.

Water sales, he reported, are one third less than at this time last year. He suggested that Ranger people take more baths and use more water in other ways to run up their water bills in order to help the city.

The swimming pool is showing a deficit at this time, also because of cool weather and rain. Mayor Newham encouraged use of the swimming pool's facilities more often, as a considerable amount of money has been spent this year on improvements at the pool.

He pointed out that the swimming pool is necessary to the community even though it is losing money, and he would like suggestions from Ranger people about ways to increase revenue at the pool. If people wanted the pool kept open later in the evening, they are asked to contact the city secretary.

## O. C. Warden Accepts County School Position

H. R. (Pop) Garrett, Eastland County School Superintendent, announced today that O. C. (Stubby) Warden of Ranger, has accepted the Supervisors position in both Ranger and Eastland Public Schools.

Warden was recommended for the supervisory position by G. B. Rush, superintendent of Ranger Schools and Wendell Siebert, Superintendent of Eastland Schools. He will work under Garrett with offices in the Court-house in Eastland. Warden was approved for the position by the State Board of Education in Austin.

Warden has 20 years of coaching and teaching experience in Texas Public School System. He has been a football coach, teacher and principal in the Ranger School System since 1946. In 1953 he coached the Ranger Bulldog team to the State Championship and during his coaching career his team won several district championships.

A Lieutenant in the U. S. Navy for four years, he served as athletic director at several Naval bases.

In 1939 Warden graduated from Texas A&M with a B. S. degree. He also holds a Master's degree from Hardin-Simmons University, graduating in 1952.

Warden and his wife and two children, Marilyn and Jerry Bob, will continue to make their home in Ranger.

# Ranger Bulldog Football Season to Open Sept. 1 With Rotan Yellowhammers

Ace Prescott, Ranger High School football coach, said today that he expects to have the answer to the question of who will fill the vacancies on the Bulldog football team created by the loss of eight starters and five squadmen on Sept. 1 when the Bulldogs play their first game with the Rotan Yellowhammers.

Thirty-one boys are listed for the football team at this time and if a few more sign up a "B" team will be organized with games scheduled. If a "B" team materializes, it will give every boy going out for football a chance to get valuable game experience.

Coach Prescott said that the coaching staff was building the team for the future and he hoped to give everyone a chance to get a taste of actual game experience, if possible. Also, he said, that if each boy will give his all to show that he has a degree to play and not be satisfied to just sit on the bench, he would be given the opportunity to play in actual games.

More boys are coming up from the Junior High team this year than ever before. "In the past it seems that too many boys were satisfied to play Junior High ball and when it came to playing high school ball, they decided they had rather do other things instead of playing football," Prescott said.

Continuing, he said that "some of these boys are going to turn out to be the largest boys in school, physically, and will be looked up to, but down upon because they won't help their school by making the many sacrifices that good athletes have to make."

The coach said that every boy in high school, especially freshmen and sophomores, are needed on the team and that he could almost guarantee that these boys would not be cut from the squad unless the boy himself asks to quit. He said that the coaching staff has one pet gripe—"We dislike the type of boy that just doesn't show up for practice after a few days, and then spends a week dodging the coaches in the hall at school until he figures we have forgotten he quit the team without notifying us, but we seldom forget."

Prospects are good this year for an outstanding young team. Most of the prospective team members have been working hard this summer on their weight program. Coach Prescott commented that most of the positions on the team are open and that very few old faces will be in the lineup on Sept. 1.

Five seniors three juniors and six sophomores will return from last year's team. To back up these regulars there will be eight freshmen, some of whom show excellent ability and they will be working hard to fill positions now held by the regulars.

In summing up the prospects for the coming season Coach Prescott made the following comments about his charges.

**Seniors**  
Joe Barker—Outstanding hard running back—the boy that the whole offense will be built around this year—very steady performer.

Richard Guest—One year letterman who has worked himself down to 187 pounds and we are expecting an outstanding job from him during his senior year.

David Lockwood—One year letterman who will be moved from his tackle position to center this year.

Alfonzo Vasquez—One year letterman who improved immensely last year. He will always do a good steady job and will start at guard this year.
