NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

On July 12, 1965 the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District enacted an ordinance effecting Lake Leon boating and fishing thereon. Notice is hereby given to the public that Section 3 of the ordinance passed by the directors will have additional rules and regulations inserted regarding the licensing of boats on all rules and regulations inserted under the Rules and Regulations Governing Boats and Devices on Lake Leon. A copy of the new ordinance is herewith printed.

TENTATIVE TEXT OF NEW BOATING ORDINANCE OF LAKE LEON

No person shall place, operate or keep any boat or other craft on the waters of Lake Leon from and after the effective date of this ordinance, without such boat or other craft having been inspected by the Officers duly authorized by the General Manager of the Eastland County Water Supply District to make such inspection.

It shall be the duty of such Officer to inspect such boat or other craft with regard to the following safety requirements for operation of a boat or other craft upon said Lake Leon:

(1) It shall be determined whether said boat or craft is seaworthy for use by person or persons upon Lake Leon without danger to life or property. If said boat or other craft is found to be so constructed or in such condition that the inspector believes that the same is not safe for use and that the use thereof would endanger life or property, then the inspector shall advise the owner or the person requesting inspection thereof of the defects required to be corrected before a certificate of inspection will be issued. The inspector may require the boat or other craft to be launched on Lake Leon for purposes of such inspection.

(2) The owner or person requesting inspection of any boat or craft shall advise the inspector of the horsepower of the motor desired to be used with said boat, and the inspector shall determine that the size of motor proposed to be used with said boat does not exceed in horsepower the manufacturer's recommendation for the size of motor to be used with the respective craft or boat. The inspector shall note upon the certificate of inspection issued to the owner or person requesting inspection the maximum horsepower of any motor that may be used in said boat or craft, and said boat or craft shall not be operated on Lake Leon with any motor of a horsepower exceeding that for which the certificate of inspection is issued, and any such operation shall constitute a violation of this ordinance.

(3) The inspector shall determine the maximum number of persons that may occupy said boat or craft at any one time, and shall note upon the certificate of inspection the number of persons authorized to use said boat or craft at any time. The inspector shall not authorize the use or occupancy of the boat by a greater number of persons than the manufacturer's recommendation with reference to the capacity of such boat or craft. The use of any boat or craft occupied by more persons than the certificate of inspection shows to have been authorized shall constitute a violation of this ordinance.

(4) With respect to the provisions of this ordinance with reference to boats or other crafts that are not manufactured by a company setting forth in published material relative to said boat, the recommended horsepower of a motor to be used with said boat or the number of persons which the boat may be safely occupied, then the inspector may require the owner or the person requesting inspection of said boat or craft to launch said boat or craft upon said Lake Leon for tests with regard to the horsepower of motor to be used upon the same and the number of persons to occupy.

(5) The inspector shall determine the name of the owner of any boat or craft furnished for inspection and may require satisfaction

factory proof of the ownership of such boat or craft before issuance of an inspection certificate for that boat or craft.

(6) If the owner of any boat or craft presented for inspection shall have been found guilty of three or more violations of any of the rules and regulations governing the recreational use of the waters of Lake Leon in the two years immediately preceding such presentation for inspection the inspector may, at his discretion, refuse to issue a certificate of inspection for such boat or craft, such order being appealable to the Board of Directors.

(7) The inspection certificate to be issued under the terms of this ordinance shall expire in the next ensuing August 31 at 12 o'clock midnight after issuance and thereafter any boat or other craft shall not be placed, operated or maintained on Lake Leon without having been again inspected in accordance with the terms hereof and a satisfactory certificate is issued which shall be for a period ending at 12 o'clock midnight on the next ensuing August 31 after the date of issuance.

(8) Any officer authorized to make inspection under the terms of this ordinance by the General Manager of the District shall collect from the owner of said boat or craft or the person requesting inspection thereof, the sum of \$5.00 in advance for each inspection of each boat or craft, except for each commercial boat or craft, as defined in the 1955 Publication of the Laws, Rules and Regulations Governing Lake Leon, there shall be collected the sum of \$7.50 in advance before the first inspection thereof. Provided further that with respect to each commercial boat or craft the owner thereof shall not permit said boat or craft to be operated upon the waters of Lake Leon unless the inspection certificate for each such commercial boat or craft shall have been further validated by an additional inspection in accordance with the terms hereof during the last 15 days of the month of April after the issuance of the original inspection certificate. The original inspection certificate shall be tendered to the inspecting officer and such additional inspection shall be noted thereon.

(9) No inspector shall inspect any boat or craft owned by himself, but the same shall be inspected by some other authorized inspector.

(10) The inspection certificate, which shall be issued subsequent to the inspection hereinabove prescribed, shall be kept on or about the boat or craft for which it is being operated on the waters of Lake Leon.

This ordinance shall act as an amendment of the ordinances presently controlling the inspection and licensing of boats operating on the waters of Lake Leon and shall be a replacement of, and substitute for, any ordinance or rule presently in effect with which this shall conflict.

In the event that any section, sub-section, sentence, clause or phrase shall be declared or adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall in no manner affect any of the remainder

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Veterans and War Orphans Urged to Apply for Aid Now

Veterans planning to train under the Korean GI Bill this coming fall or children eligible for War Orphans Education were urged today by the Veterans Administration to get their applications in now, rather than wait until the last minute.

By filing an application now Stanley M. Cowan, acting manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas pointed out, all processing can be completed long before classes start.

The VA acting manager said that hundreds of young men and women between the ages of 18 and 23, and whose veteran-parent died of a wartime service-connected cause, will become eligible for War Orphans Education this fall. This includes up to 36 months of schooling with an allowance of \$710 a month for full-time schooling.

Also eligible are children of peacetime veterans whose death was caused by the actual performance of military duties or by extra-hazardous service, Cowan said.

The War Orphans bill primarily provides opportunities for college and university training, but training in a wide variety of schools below the college level is permitted—such as technical institutes, business school some vocational or trade schools, and medical and referring training in medical and related fields.

Cowan reminded living parents or guardians that young people eligible for War Orphans Education are required by law to receive VA counseling in the selection of courses. This is an added reason for early filing of applications, he said.

Applications for Korean GI Bill training or for War Orphans Education may be obtained at any VA office.



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

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

stitute food for human consumption. 19. Seeds, annual plants, fungicides, insecticides applied thereto, the products of which ordinarily constitute food for human consumption. 20. Fertilizer to be applied to land the products of which are used as food for human consumption. 21. Farm machinery or equipment exclusively used or employed on farms or ranches in the production of food for human consumption. 22. Electricity when used in industrial, manufacturing, mining, agricultural, dairy or poultry operations, or pumping water or for electrical processes such as electroplating or electrolysis. 23. Books consisting wholly of writing sacred to any religious faith. 24. Work clothes costing less than ten dollars and consisting of articles of outer wearing apparel.
Some products not considered foods as defined under exempt food products and hence subject to the sales tax are medicines, tonics, vitamins and medical preparations in any form; bottled mineral water, carbonated water, carbonated and non-carbonated packaged soft drinks and diluted juices where sold in liquid, frozen or dry-mix forms. Also to be taxed are meals served on or off the premises of the vendor or drinks or food furnished, prepared, or served for consumption at tables, chairs, or counters, or from trays, glasses, dishes, or other tableware provided by the vendor. (This means all cafe meals and items costing more than twenty-five cents served in eating places).

cate if the owner of a boat or craft presented for inspection shall have been found guilty of three or more violations of any of the rules or regulations governing the recreational use of Lake Leon in the two years preceding the inspection.
Inspection certificates issued under this ordinance will expire on the next ensuing Aug. 31 at 12 o'clock midnight. The inspection fee is \$5.00 in advance for each inspection, except for commercial boats or craft, the fee for which is \$7.50 in advance. The boat or craft of an inspector must be inspected by some other authorized inspector.
The inspection certificate issued is to be kept on or about the boat or craft at all times while it is being operated on the lake.
This ordinance supersedes any ordinance or rules presently in effect, the changes to become effective Aug. 31, 1961.
