Veterans and War Orphans Urged to Apply for Aid Now

planning to train unfall or children eligible for War today by the Veterans Administration to get their application

The VA acting manager said that hundreds of young men and women between the ages of 18 and 23, and whose veteran-par-ent died of a wartime serviceconnected cause, will become eligi-ble for War Orphans Education this fall. This includes up to 36 months of schooling with an al-lowance of \$f10 a month for full-

ime schooling. Also eligible are children of peacetime veterans whose death was caused by the actual perfor-mance of military duties or by extra-hazardous service, Cowan provides opportunities for college and university training, but trainbelow the college level is permitted —such as technical institutes, trade schools, and medical and re-

Cowan reminded living parents ration to get their appications in how, rather than wait until the last minute.

By filing an application now Stanley M. Cowan, acting manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas pointed out, all processing can be completed long before clastes a start.

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

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
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


Table top electric water heater provides extra work space in kitchen

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
