As Battery Commander of the Texas National Guard in Ranger, I would like to express on behalf of each member of the unit, our sincere appreciation for the support and cooperation rendered this organization by all of the local supporters and citizens. The Texas National Guard has long since given primary interest to the citizens of Texas in times of emergency and distress. Capt. Bill E. Caffee, Mineral Wells, commanding officer of the Ranger Service Battery, a unit of the 49th Armored Division, and four enlisted men are making speedy preparations to move the Ranger Unit to Camp Polk, La., sometime after Oct. 15.

Men now on active duty with the Ranger Unit are: Capt. Caffee, Sp. 4 Clarence Mayers, Eastland; Sgt. Leonard Rose, Wench; Sgt. Billy G. Weatherby, San Angelo; and Sp. 5 Paul E. Gordon Jr., San Angelo. First Sgt. Charles Arnett, Ranger, is also assisting with the many details involved. He will not go on active duty until Oct. 15.

Twenty-four men of the Ranger Unit will report to Camp Polk, La. on Sunday, for physical examinations. Other members of the unit have already completed their physicals.

Capt. Caffee reports that the men are resolved about going and that spirits are a lot higher than would be expected. He said that anything in the way of encouragement extended to the men would be of great benefit. "Some will report for active duty for the first time, but for the majority it will be a combination of training received in the past," Caffee said.

Official word received from headquarters indicated that members of the unit that are still attending high school will not be required to report for active duty. Three members of the Ranger Unit are attending Strawn High School.

Sgt. Arnett reports that eight men have made applications for physical and if they pass the physical they will probably be accepted for active duty with the Ranger Unit.

Members of Battery C of Cisco, will leave their physical examinations in Abilene. A date has not been set at this time, but they must be completed before Oct. 1. The Cisco Battery Commander will notify the men as to when they are to report to Abilene.

### Administrative Approval Given Watershed Plan

Congressman Omar Burleson has announced that Administrative approval has been given the Northeast Tributaries of the Leon River Watershed Plan. This is a watershed protection, flood prevention project embracing 202,880 acres in Comanche, Erath and Eastland Counties, in the areas of Cow, Armstrong and Resley Creeks, tributaries to the Leon River.

In accordance with Public Law 566, the Secretary of Agriculture has submitted the Plan to the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives for final consideration and approval. In view of adjournment, it will be the first of the next Session before the Committee will be able to take it up.

The estimated total cost of the project is \$3,025,952. Of this amount federal money in the sum of \$2,365,831.00 is provided, with the balance of \$660,121 to come from local and other funds.
