Tuesday is the last day for making reservations to attend the Ranger Garden Club's Hawaiian Luau which is held October 13, at Lone Cedar Country Club.



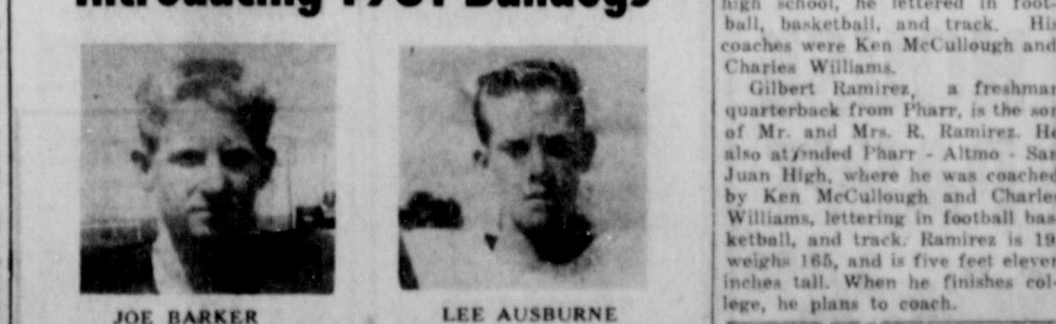

stressed during Fire Prevention Week this year.

Fire Prevention Week always falls in the week containing October 9, for it was on that day in 1871 that the Great Chicago Fire broke out. The Great Chicago Fire, in addition to being tragic and costly, had one constructive facet—it made America fire conscious.

Eventually it brought recognition of the need for a concerted national fire prevention effort. On October 9, 1911, the 40th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire, the first Fire Prevention Day was observed. In 1920 President Woodrow Wilson issued the first Presidential Proclamation of Fire Prevention Day.

In 1925, President Warren G. Harding proclaimed the first Fire Prevention Week. And each year since then the President of the United States has proclaimed Fire Prevention Week.

Fires last year took the lives of 11,350 persons. And fire losses in the United States have exceeded \$1 billion for four years in a row.

It is to the interest of all to rededicate ourselves to care with fire at this time.

Farm fires caused losses estimated at \$165 million in the nation last year.

Building losses accounted for about 65 percent of the total loss payments by companies for property which a breakdown by property class was available. Almost three-fourths of the building losses were on main buildings, homes and barns.

Now is the time for neighbors to attack this problem of fires, and suggested that special emphasis be placed on fire prevention during National Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 9-14.

This period is just ahead of the month when farm fires take their greatest toll.

November was the peak month last year. Four-fifths of all 1960 farm fires and 84 percent of the lives lost occurred during the six months from October through March.

President John F. Kennedy in his proclamation designating the special week said, "Our communities and the Nation can ill afford this inexcusable waste of our resources."

Family training in fire hazard removal and fire fighting and drills for establishing escape routes in case of fire were suggested by the engineer as things families and neighbors could work on together. Farm families, in particular, he added, must rely on their own fire safety training fire prevention check-ups and fire protection measures to safe-guard property.
