Pancake Supper To Be Served By Garden Club

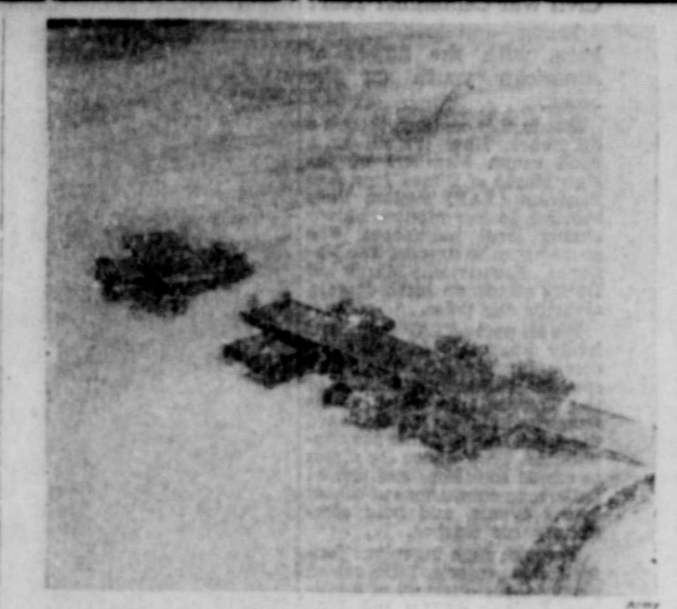

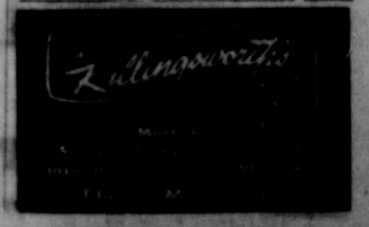

Teen-Agers Add Lively Lift To New March of Dimes Drive

Slave auctions in this Civil War Centennial Year? It can—and does—happen here, with the flower of American youth on the block.

But in this century, there's a difference. Now it's all in a good cause. Members of the New March of Dimes Teen Age Program (TAP) auction their services to the highest bidder among local merchants. The money goes to support the National Foundation March of Dimes attack on birth defects, arthritis and polio.

It's all part of TAP members' lively approach to volunteer community service. They also sponsor walkathons (shades of the Thirties!) in which teams from rival schools move toward the finish line as dimes are contributed. They dance for dimes at casual sock hops and formal balls, man concessions at school sports events, and hold community car washes.

Through such ingenious fun-for-funds projects, TAPs raised nearly three-quarters of a million dollars during the 1961 March of Dimes.

For the 1962 New March of Dimes in January, tens of thousands of the youthful volunteers are literally "on TAP." In more than 75 per cent of The National Foundation's 3,100 local county chapters, active TAP committees are determined to hit new highs in fun as well as funds.

Adult advisors who work with TAPs point out that underlying the outward frivolity of the teen-age projects is a deep awareness of the need for increased research and progress in the fight against crippling birth defects, arthritis and polio. During the year, many youngsters assist in local patient services by reading to disabled children, writing letters for severely crippled arthritis or working as hospital aides.

A prime year-round responsibility of TAP members is distribution of information about the National Foundation Health Scholarships to students in high schools and colleges. Each year, more than 500 four-year scholarships with a full value of \$2,000 apiece are offered for study in medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy and medical social work. TAP members know the shortage of manpower in the health professions by encour-

aging students to undertake careers in these fields.

Leader of the Teen Age Program for the 1962 New March of Dimes is national chairman Katherine Anne Keith, 18, of Columbia, Mo. Blonde, brainy and born to be busy, Katie will handle her major responsibilities as top TAP while she pursues an ambitious freshman schedule at the University of Missouri.

On the basis of past performance, juggling scholarship and volunteer service won't intimidate Katie. She was 1961 Missouri state TAP chairman during her strenuous senior year in high school. Under her leadership, Missouri TAPs showed record gains in membership, services to chapters and funds raised for the March of Dimes.

At the same time, Katie maintained grades that ranked her third in her graduating class of almost 300 students. She was a National Merit Scholarship finalist and received the Kiwanis Good Citizenship

award. She was business manager—and occasional sports-writer—for the school paper, treasurer of the National Honor Society, queen of the major social function of the school year, had a lead role in the school play, "Teahouse of the August Moon," and actively participated in math, history, English and French clubs.

She also teaches a Sunday School class at Missouri Methodist Church in Columbia.

After a summer in Europe, including study at the Sorbonne in Paris, the energetic Katie began to plan for a banner year of TAP activity for the March of Dimes.

"Teenagers who are looking for a sense of satisfaction along with fun and friendship are missing a bet if they don't check TAP activities in their local March of Dimes chapters," she said. "A TAP committee isn't just another youth organization—it's not merely a club to serve youth. Instead, it gives us an opportunity to serve our communities."

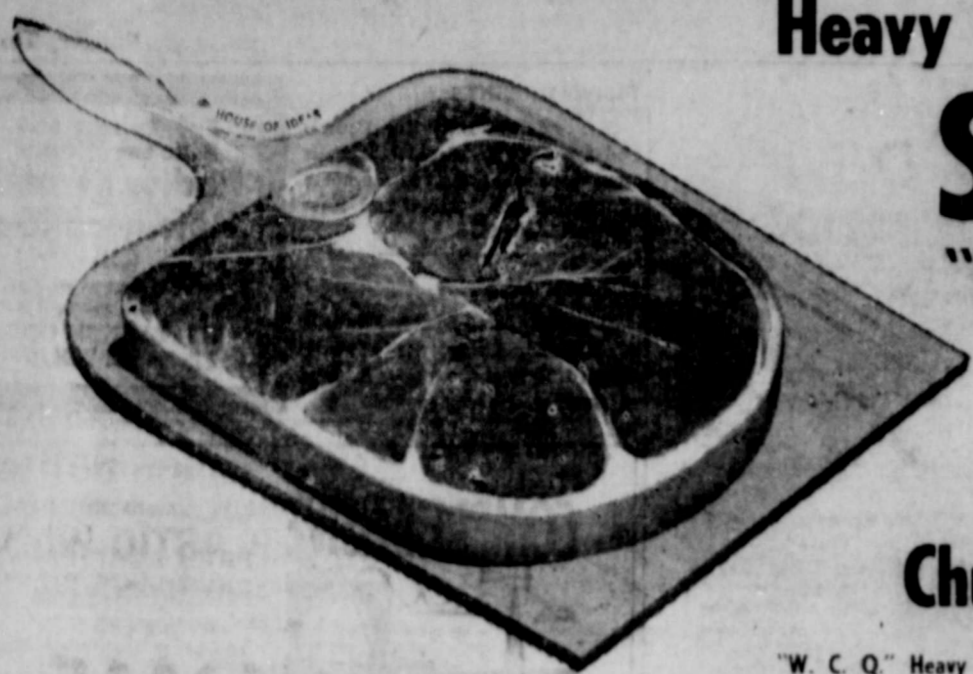

I Give You Texas

Life as editor of a small daily in a West Texas town in the 1920's had its lighter side. After working up into the night Saturday, in order to get out the Sunday issue of the Eastland Daily Oil Belt News, there was the luxury of sleeping late and then having as the first meal of the day the six-course dinner (seventy-five cents) at 1 o'clock at the Majestic Cafe.

After consuming the feast in leisurely fashion, I would walk to Connellee Park in the edge of town to see a baseball game. Our town had a good team, made up mainly of oil field workers, with a sprinkling of players who had professional experience, though now slowed down from age.

The star slugger was "Big Boy" Davis, owner of a bakery; and the ace pitcher was Rawley Fairbairn, electrical shop proprietor. Fairbairn was a "slippery elm" (pronounced "el-um") pitcher and when he moistened the ball, neither batter nor catcher and, for that matter, not even the pitcher himself, had any idea where the ball would go.

There was a leather-lunged Eastland fan who was good at "riding" players on the visiting team. He carried a baseball bat, which had the effect of discouraging others from taking a swing at him and when anyone tried to make a retort, he thumped the bat on the floor and drowned out the other's words.

The summer sunlight was dazzling and the heat was intense in the day-time but it was cool at night. It was in late September that I made an acquaintance with a Texas "Norther". Attired in a summer suit, I was watching a baseball game with great enjoyment when, all at once, I realized I was freezing. The temperature had tumbled thirty degrees in fewer minutes than that and we fans built bonfires and shiveringly watched the last four innings. Chilled though we were, it never occurred to us to leave.

Eastland had a country club which, besides a semi-annual tournament, also was the scene of many dances, the music usually furnished by an out-of-town orchestra—from Ranger. (When Ranger gave a dance, the orchestra usually was brought in from Eastland.)

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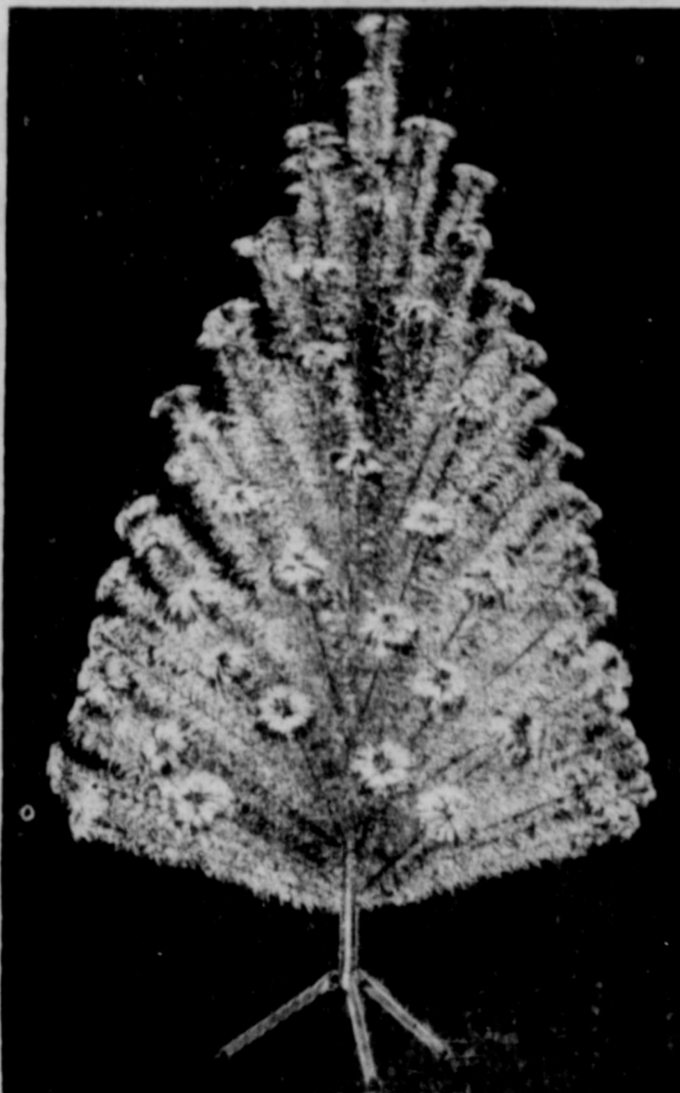
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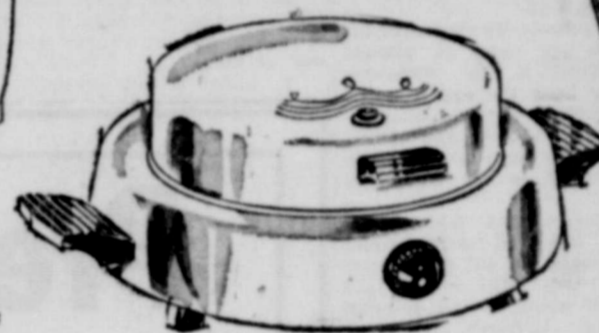
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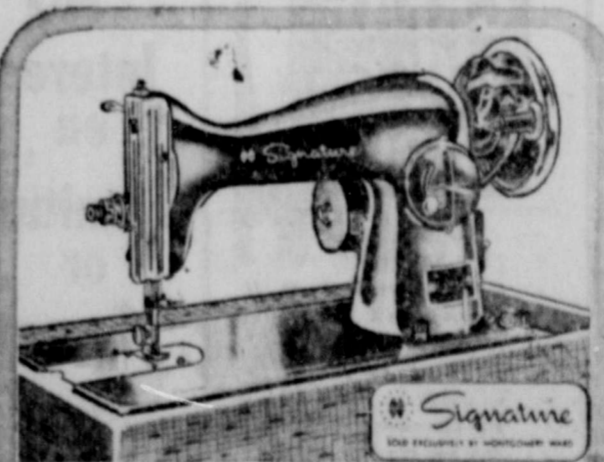


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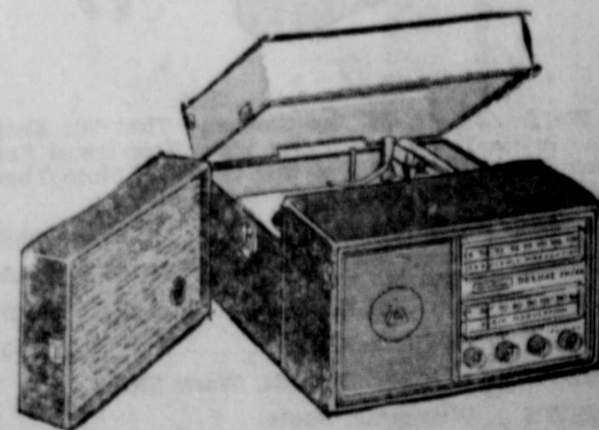
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Consolidation 'Plan' Set Forth

The Eastland Rotary Club heard a report Monday in which a leading state educator proposed that the people of Carbon, Desdemona, Eastland, Gorman, Olden and Ranger Independent School Districts create a new school district embracing the territory now contained in these present districts.

Bill Crocker, an Eastland attorney, reviewed the report written by Dr. Bascom B. Hayes a professor for the past 18 months at the University of Texas, and for many years a Texas school administrator.

During his 30 years as an administrator he was connected with the consolidation of districts at Edna, a primarily rural area, and at Brazosport, an industrial area.

In the report, Dr. Hayes proposes that the new district provide:

1. Six elementary schools teaching pupils in grades one through six, located in each of the former districts;
2. Two junior high schools teaching pupils in grades seven through nine;
3. One junior high school would be located in Ranger with an enrollment of approximately 217 students, and the other would be part of the combination junior-senior high school located near Olden with an enrollment of approximately 406 students.

Dr. Hayes justified the proposal in terms of the pupils to be served, the strengthening of the curriculum, provisions for a better balanced instructional program and staff, adequate finance and pupil transportation services.

Cost of the proposed junior-senior high school is estimated at \$800,000, according to the report.

A copy of the report is to be mailed to each of the school board members in the six districts.

Excerpts from the report by Dr. Hayes:

"More than 300,000 boys and girls in Texas are not getting their fair share of educational requirements. Because of this, they are handicapped in meeting the exacting demands of production, family life, and citizenship in our modern society."

"In even the largest senior high schools in some of the 160 counties, only skeleton programs can be offered. They cost much more per pupil than larger schools but they have too few teachers to make possible a well-balanced program."

"How much worse it must be in schools which have less than 100 pupils in the upper six grades! No doubt in these small high schools, the boy who wants to farm, the girl headed toward office work, the boy preparing for medicine all have the same program."

"Typically, there is little or no music or art, physical education is meager, the guidance program exists only on paper, and vocational preparation is extremely limited. Where agriculture is offered boys are often forced to take it in order to fill their programs, whether it meets their needs or not."

"Often it is necessary to assign teachers to work for which they are not prepared. Rarely are such small high schools good in more than one or two aspects of the program."

"Few of the very small schools do a good job even of teaching the three R's. There are no supervisors or guidance workers to whom teachers can refer problem cases. Principals are so busy 'counting the lunch money' that they have no time for instructional leadership. The equipment is meager. Libraries and librarians are practically non-existent. Makeshift laboratories and shops offer small stimulation to either gifted or slow pupils."

"As a consequence of limited programs, poorly prepared teachers lack of special services, and meager equipment, the drop-out rate is generally high in such schools."

"Why have we failed to reorganize? If the foregoing statements are accurate, (ample research is available to back them up), why have our people failed to do something about it?"

"Many factors have delayed the formation of school districts of adequate size. These are a few of them:

1. Local school administration...

"Not a single high school in 160 Texas counties could meet this criterion in the 1960-61 school year. In fact 220 school systems enrolled less than 100 in grades 7-12."

"Such schools are expensive for the cost per pupil is always high. Even if the taxpayers willingly bear the expense, the tax burden is unfairly distributed. Teachers' time and talents only partially used and the level of education in the county is lowered."

"If there was no teacher shortage and good teachers could be employed for all these little schools they still would lack much of giving a well-rounded education. Children and youth need the experience of working and playing with others of their own age. They need experience in art, music, industrial arts, as well as the three R's and citizenship in our modern society."

other fields which the small school cannot provide.

"This skimpy educational program results in part from attempting to buy at cut-rate prices. But another prevalent cause is poor organization for implementing education."

"Texas is among the states that need to take a good hard look at the school district organization responsible for channeling education to the people."

"In approximately 160 Texas counties, and particularly in the 132 counties that lost population in the last ten years, is this an imperative for the boys and girls attending school in more than 1,000 school districts which do not meet reasonable standards of adequacy."

"No less an authority than Dr. James Bryant Conant, president emeritus, Harvard University, and former U. S. Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany, with a long career as a scientist, educator and statesman, has said that unless a high school has a graduating class of at least 100, that school is too small to offer a sufficiently diversified curriculum to meet the needs of all its pupils and the needs of our nation. Citizens should face this situation realistically and resolutely."

"The small high school should be eliminated by district reorganization. When persons say that geography will not allow consolidation of high schools, we should be sure that it is not human nature that is the prohibiting agent."

high school permits the joint use of such facilities as auditoriums, gymnasiums, lunchrooms, libraries, shops, laboratories and trained personnel.

"2. Politically ambitious local school trustees have been unwilling to be displaced."

"3. False local pride, community acceptance of the status quo, and resistance to change have combined to block reorganization."

"4. Misconceptions of what a reorganized district would mean fears."

"5. Cumbersome legal procedures for reorganization have obstructed efforts to form larger districts."

"6. State and local finance programs have favored small districts."

"What are the earmarks of an adequate school district? A satisfactory school district meets the educational needs of all the school-age groups within its boundaries. To do this it:

1. Brings all children into the school at age six;
2. Holds at least 90 per cent of its pupils until high school graduation.

"The reorganized district would contain four small and two large community elementary schools. Most authorities in the field of school administration justify small elementary schools, even though they may be expensive to operate, on the ground:

- (1) that small children should be kept relatively close to home,
- (2) that elementary pupils are required to travel by bus not more than 45 minutes each way between home and school, and
- (3) that such schools promote local community interest in the schools.

"The two junior high schools each would have approximately 75 pupils minimum for each age or grade level. This would permit logical sectioning of pupils for instructional purposes. The fact that one of the junior high schools (Olden) would be a part of a combination junior-senior
