TEXTBOOKS TALES

'School Books, Rule Books'; --Where They Come From

Ranger public school students are enjoying the holidays now, but there'll be textbooks facing them Tuesday.

Nationally there has been a lot written about the selections of texts for schools, so an inquiry into how books are picked for the local schools should appeal to parents as well as students.

Just who makes the selections and what steps are involved before a book finds its place in teachers' and students' hands?

At Ranger High School there is a text-book committee made up of teachers from the various departments—English, history, etc.

Selections of the brand-new text book are studied by local committees on or about January 1.

Local committees make their selections from a multiple-choice offering of not less than two nor more than five books in each approved course. The committee may select only one book or they may select two, three or more for supplementary references.

By March 1, local textbook selecting committees are to have completed their reports for submission to their school board. The report of the committee including estimates of needs for new books, is then due in the Textbook Division, Austin, not later than March 31.

In the next step, textbooks chosen by the approximately 1,200 local committees are certified by the Textbook Division to the publishers concerned so they may begin printing the books which must be ready for student use when schools open in September.

Although some criticism has been directed at the amount of time afforded to examine each

book offered, the complete process begins in May of one year and is completed in September of the following with its delivery to the local school for distribution to students.

Textbook selection begins annually in May with a call for bids from publishers who wish to supply the books needed in particular grades and or subjects.

Publishers submitting bids to print textbooks deal with State officials as it is legally, physically impossible to deal directly with each local and county school board under Texas Constitution a n d law.

Requesting the bid is the State Board of Education, a group of non-paid citizens who must not have any connections with textbook publishers or be engaged in the teaching profession. It is the State Board which has the final decision as to which books are included on the State's multiple-choice list.

State Board of Education members are elected, one from each of the 21 educational districts set up in 1949. The State Board appoints the 15 members of the State Textbook Committee district and all members are teachers, supervisors, or administrators in local school systems.

Each State Textbook Committee member, although unpaid, is a State official who takes the same oaths required of other State officials, including the noncommandment.

A 15-year-old Ranger youth has confessed to writing obscene letters and placing them in mail boxes in Ranger. The youth said that he had written two such letters and placed them in mail boxes.

Ranger Police Chief Bob Patterson a n d Patrolman Mac McGown picked the youth up after complaints from two Ranger citizens. After intensive questioning, the confession was made.

Information was also received from the youth which might lead to an arrest in connection with several break-ins that have occurred in Ranger during the past few months.

The youth will be turned over to Postal Authorities.

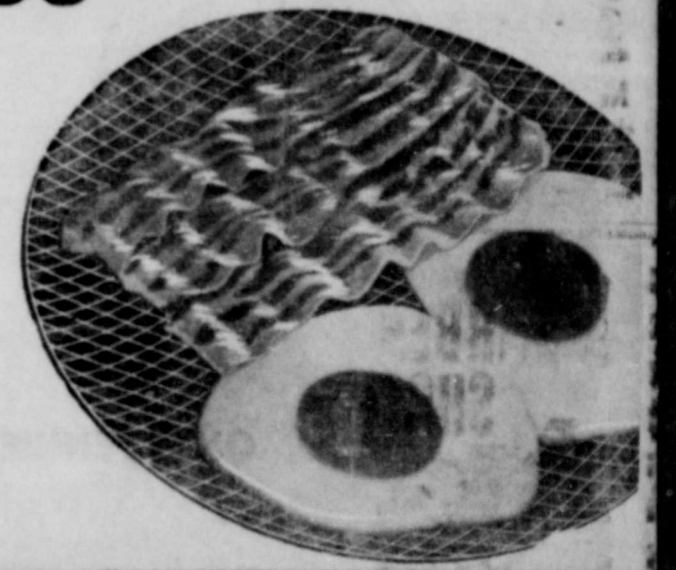

list oath. The period of service is for one year.

From the time bids are requested in May until July 1, the Commissioner of Education is receiving a list of textbooks offered by publishers. On July 10 a compilation thereof is mailed to all public schools and persons requesting it. Around the middle of October each year, the State Textbook Committee announces publicly the complete list of books recommended by the State Textbook Committee and mails copies of this list to all local schools.

September 1 until September 15 is set aside by members of the Textbook Committee to hear questions on any book up for adoption. At the same time, and from about June 1 to October 1, the Textbook Committee is conducting its own study of each book. Each member of the Committee is assisted by many lay citizens and educators who are considered to be specialists in particular fields of subject matter.

In the recent selection, the Committee was assisted by 781 official advisors, 392 teachers, and 389 lay people. The third and final multiple-choice list, that adopted by the State Board of Education, is mailed to local school officials. This year it was mailed in the latter part of November.

Books concerned with historical events are generally the ones questioned by groups of varying political or ideological viewpoints. A perfect, universally acceptable textbook has not yet been written. Difference of opinion will continue to exist on the merits of each book written. For this reason, each school district makes the final decision on local adoptions.

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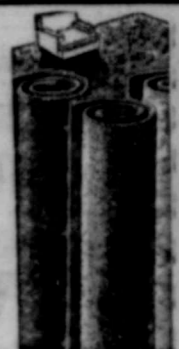

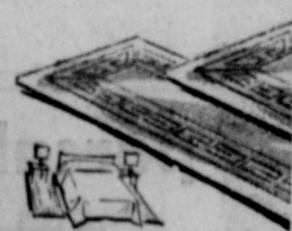

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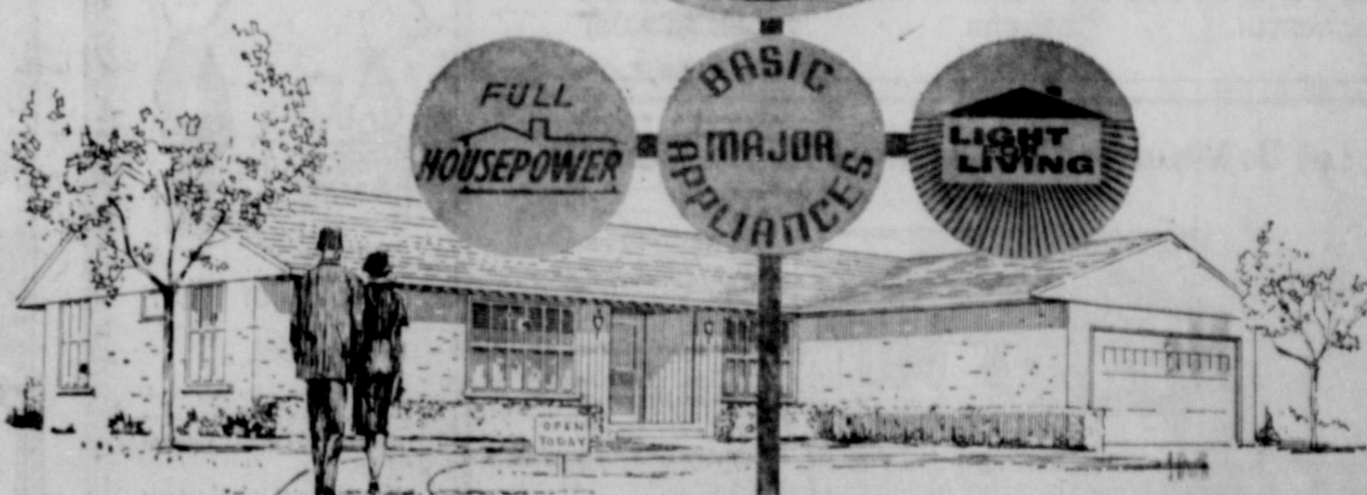

Honey, Grapefruit Are Plentiful Now

Farmers have a nice way of saying "Happy New Year." They do it by providing extra - large supplies of tasty foods at low prices, for January markets.

Fresh grapefruit and honey are two examples. They head the January list of plentiful foods, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

This year's grapefruit crop is estimated at 45.2 million boxes, 8 percent more than last year. Texas grapefruit are an especially good buy in this area. And bees in all parts of the nation have produced 276 million pounds of honey, an all-time record.

Also on the list of plentiful foods for January are broiler-fryers, apples, Irish potatoes, pecans, frozen and canned cherries, rice and dry beans.

The Agricultural Marketing Service, in cooperation with growers and the food trade, selected these items as being in supply that exceeds normal needs. There's a different list each month.

Food stores usually find it possible to offer plentiful items at special weekend features, at attractive prices. Consumers can take advantage of the abundance by serving plentiful foods often.

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2 Sweet Potato Trial Plantings Recommended

Centennial and Nuggett are two new varieties of sweet potatoes that have been grown and evaluated at four different sites by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Both varieties are recommended for trial commercial planting in the sweet potato growing areas of Texas.

A third new variety, Tanhoma, was also tested but it did not perform satisfactorily and cannot be recommended for planting in Texas.

In addition to the three new varieties, six established sweet potato breeding lines were grown at the test sites. These varieties were subjected to the same tests as were the new varieties.

In the tests to determine the highest marketable and total yields, Centennial and Nuggett were consistently high among the nine varieties.

Baking tests were carried out with the nine breeding lines after the potatoes had been cured and stored for 2 months. Color was

objectively measured, and the baked potatoes were submitted to a test panel for their evaluation. Results showed Centennial and B-6652 to be the most desirable for baking.

The results of these tests should provide commercial producers with valuable information on the best varieties for their areas. PR-2207 contains a full discussion of the tests. This publication may be obtained from the Agriculture Information Office, College Station, Texas.
