## Warning Issued By Chief of Police Patterson

Chief of Police Bob Patterson said today that an immediate crackdown on persons owing parking fines would be put in effect by the police department.

He said that many persons have received tickets for overparking and have completely ignored the ticket. A small fine of 25 cents is charged if the ticket is paid within 24 hours. If it is not paid within that length of time, the price goes up.

Patterson emphasized the fact that if fines are not paid within the next few days, that warrants will be issued for the arrest of the offenders.

## Directors Elected By First Federal of Ranger

Stockholders of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ranger held their 27th annual stockholders meeting Wednesday, Jan. 17 at the Lone Cedar Country Club.

Purpose of the annual meeting is to elect new directors and conduct other business that might become before the meeting.

The terms of C. B. Pruet, Willard Swanney and Lester Crossley expired with the meeting Wednesday. All three were re-elected for three-year terms by a unanimous vote of stockholders.

L. R. Pearson, president of the board of directors, presided at the meeting. He gave a short history of the Association, saying that the institution was founded in October 1934 with a very limited capital of \$6,000 and a very few stockholders. Today the savings and loan institution has 1100 stockholders. Continuing, Pearson said that since 1934 a total of \$351,000 had been paid to stockholders as interest on their savings. The 1961 dividends received by stockholders totaled \$69,392.55.

Pearson said that he opened one of the first savings accounts with the Association in 1934 in the amount of \$100.00. He explained that the account has never been disturbed and that today the original \$100.00 has grown to a total of \$254.58.

Lester Crossley and C. B. Pruet were called on by Pearson to explain the year-end statement. It was brought out by the two directors that First Federal of Ranger not only serves citizens of Ranger, but the entire county.

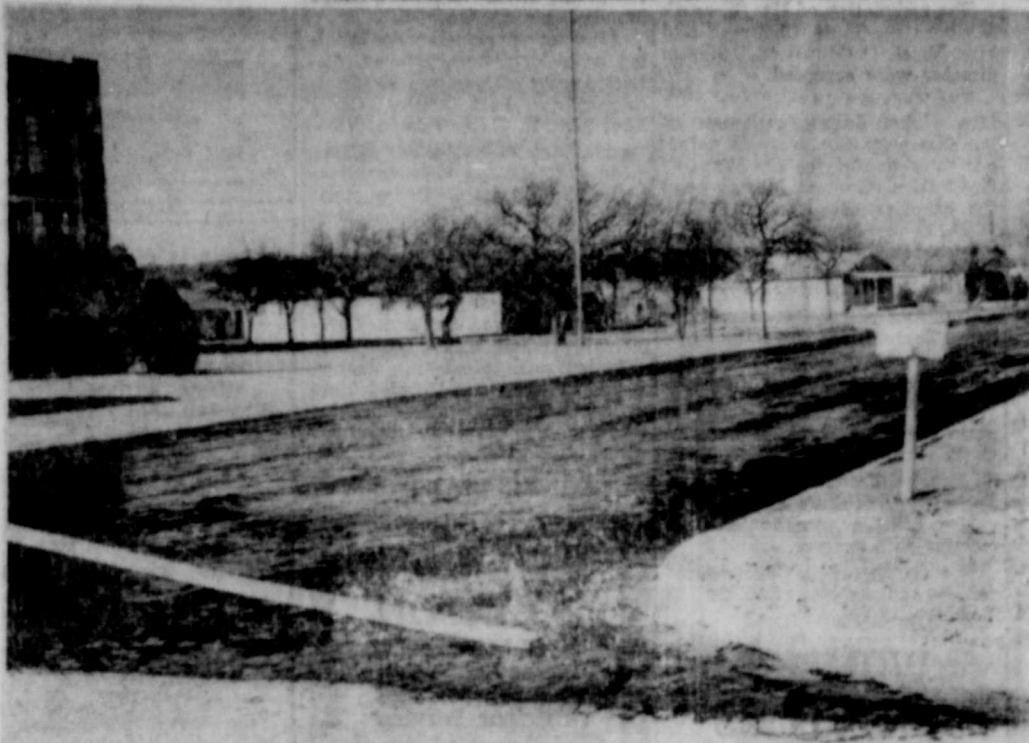
They reported that current dividend payment on savings is 4 1/2 percent. As of December 31, 1961, assets of the Association totaled \$2,066,392.22. This is a 28.9 percent gain from total assets reported in 1960, and a 127.69 percent gain from assets at the close of business in 1958.

The annual printed statement to members contained the following statement:

"All signs point to a favorable national economy in 1962, and since the directors of the association are successful business men and professional men long acquainted with the problems and opportunities offered by this community, we believe that 1962 can and will be an even greater year for First Federal. It is the intention of your directors to exploit every means to assist people of our community to own their homes and to participate in every undertaking for the betterment of our community and lending area, both financially and by individually taking part in all worthwhile projects of our area."

F. P. Brasler gave the invocation and benediction.

## Rangers Cerna and Rench Still In Region's Top Ten

Armando Cerna and Jerry Rench of the Ranger Junior College basketball team will rank in the top ten individual performers in basketball competition in Region V. On the basis of ten conference games played Cerna is fifth with a total of 292 points with a 21.3 point average, and Rench is tenth with 143 points to his credit and a 16.3 point average. The top total is 380 points with a 22.4 point average, made by Walter Carter of Howard County Junior College, Big Spring.

In team competition Ranger ranks sixth with a 5-5 record, a total of 767 points, and a 76.7 point average.

These statistics do not include the results of two other games that the Rangers won last week, the victory over Navarro and the one over Temple Junior College.

## Funeral Services for Car-Train Victims Held Here Saturday

Mrs. G. A. Townzen, 54, and her 15 year son, Robert (Bob) were killed instantly Thursday about 4:10 p.m. when their car was struck by a south-bound Texas and Pacific train at the Main Street Crossing in Ranger.

Double funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Pioneer First Methodist Church. Officiating were Rev. S. A. Williams, minister of First Baptist Church where Mrs. Townzen was a member, and the Rev. W. A. Fynn, minister of the First Methodist Church.

Burial was in Mount Marion Cemetery in Pecos under the direction of Killingsworth's Funeral Home.

The car, driven by Bob, was headed west after coming off U. S. Highway 80 onto Main St. It was reportedly damaged 2,577 feet before the train could stop.

The 1957 Studebaker was twisted so badly by the impact that the train had to back up and the remains of the auto pulled apart in order to remove Mrs. Townzen's body. The youth was pinned beneath the steering wheel of the car.

Ronald Rogers of 329 Walnut, Ranger, was an eyewitness to the accident. He was traveling behind the Townzen car and he stated that the signal lights were blishing at the time. Rogers went on to state that Bob slowed to approximately five miles an hour as though he was going to stop, and looked to the left, then drove into the path of the oncoming train. Rogers said that the engineer of the freight train apparently saw the car, since he started blowing the train horn, and that either upon contact with the car or immediately thereafter the engineer applied the brakes of the train.

Rogers said that he saw the train coming and he realized what was going to happen but could not do anything about it. He just froze.

Fred Bennett, another eyewitness to the accident was driving a pick-up on Commerce St., adjacent to the Main Street crossing. He said that he floor boarded his pick-up in order to try and stay up with the train, but was unable to do so. He was the second person to reach the accident.

Bennett is Bob's former Scout Master and presented him with his Eagle rank on July 22, 1961.

G. H. Witherspoon, conductor of the T&P freight train, reported the train was traveling approximately 40 miles per hour at the time of the crash. The engineer, J. M. Dean, refused to reveal his name or give any information concerning the crash, to a Ranger Times Reporter when questioned. Witherspoon supplied the engineer's name and the name of the fireman, V. R. White.

Mrs. Ida Mae Townzen was born Sept. 23, 1907 in Young County. She was married to G. A. Townzen Dec. 8, 1929 in Eastland and had lived in Ranger the past 25 years. She was a member of the Teen Town's Mother's Club, football mothers and P-T-A.

Mrs. Townzen is survived by her husband; four sons, Tom Otis of Anaheim, Calif., Jack E. and Billy E. of Midland, and James A. of Ranger; one daughter, Mrs. Jimmy Sanford of Odessa; two brothers, M. C. Baron of Graham and H. L. of Odessa; and three sisters, Mrs. S. R. Plummer of Odessa, Mrs. Herman Dauley of Bunnell and Mrs. M. H. of Pecos.

Born, Sept. 16, 1946, in Ranger Bob was a freeman in Ranger High School where he was a member of the Pioneer Badminton Club. He was also a member of Teen Town and was an Eagle Scout.

He is survived by his father one sister; four brothers, and his grandmother, Mrs. T. A. Townzen of Stephenville.

Mrs. Townzen's pallbearers were A. H. Powell, Dave Barney, Vern (Continued on Page 3)

## How Many More?

How many more will die before a more effective warning system is installed at the Main Street railroad crossing in Ranger?

Citizens of Ranger will never completely recover from the shock of losing Tommy Ford at this same crossing on Thursday, Feb. 16, 1960—And now the town has once again received a double shock—with the untimely death of Mrs. G. A. Townzen and her son, Bob, Thursday afternoon, Jan. 18 at 4:10 p.m.

The car, driven by Bob, was struck by a freight train that had such momentum that the car was carried 2577 feet down the track before the rain was brought to a halt. The front of the engine was driven almost half-way through the car and rested partially upon the lifeless body of Mrs. Townzen. It was necessary for the train to back up before the body of Mrs. Townzen could be removed. The body of her son was trapped under the steering wheel.

Let's be realistic about this—Your son, daughter, wife, husband or loved one could be next if steps are not taken to provide a more adequate warning system.

Ranger should not rest until something is done about this.

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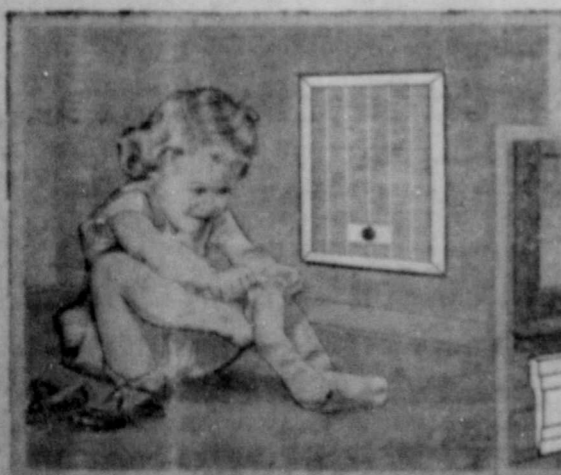

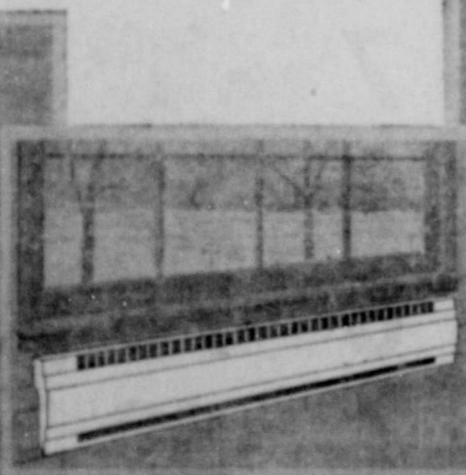

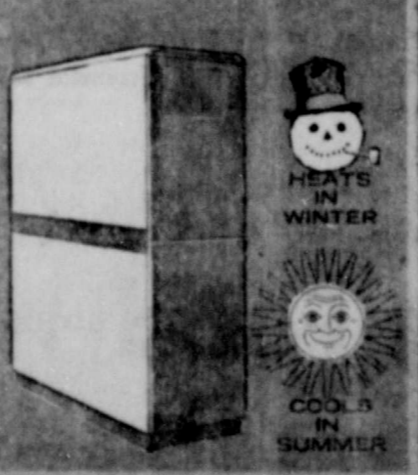
