### New Oil Discovery Well Flows From Mississippi Near Cisco

A new oil discovery well for the area seven miles northeast of Cisco has been completed and placed on production as a substantial producer, according to information here today. The well is the Low Drilling Co. et al No. 1 Henry Exall and Continental National Bank on the Gordan Woods place.

Producing from the Mississippian lime, the well flowed 141-98 barrels of 42 gravity oil through an 18-64-inch choke from perforations at 3,946 to 4,011 feet. The formation was treated with 600 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 800 to 1.

The Low company's partners in the well are J. H. Reynolds, W. N. Jarrell and Tex-Starr Oil & Gas Co., all of Dallas. They have about 1,800 acres in the block. Plans for further exploration have not been completed at this time it was understood.

Location for the new discovery well was given as 330 feet from the north and 500 feet from the east lines of Section 55, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Elsewhere in the area, L. A. Warren of Abilene has completed two new producing oil wells

in the Scranton area of southwest Eastland County. Both are pumpjacks with a daily potential of about 20 barrels each, producing from about 1,800 feet in the Strawn sand.

The two new wells are about two miles northwest of Scranton in a pool in which Mr. Warren has been active for a good many years.

Five miles west of Cisco, Trumpler Petroleum Corp. et al

of Fort Worth has spotted their No. 1 G. M. Waters as a wild-cat oil test. Location was given as 831 feet from the north and

1,747 feet from the east on Highway 80. It was understood that plans called for drilling operations to begin in the near future.

**New Federal Budget Expected To Cost Texans Four Billion**

ABILENE — Texas taxpayers will be required to pay out approximately \$3,940,500,000 in Federal taxes as their share of the cost of the Federal spending program of \$92.5 billion proposed by President Kennedy for the Federal fiscal year beginning July 1, 1962, according to an estimate today by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The estimate was based on the West Texas Chamber's calculations that the Texas taxpayers bear 4.25 per cent of all Federal taxes.

The West Texas Chamber pointed out that any change which Congress may make in this budget will reduce or increase the amount that Texas taxpayers will have to bear depending on whether Congress cuts or spends more.

The West Texas Chamber commented: "The \$92.5 billion expenditure total proposed by President Kennedy for the coming fiscal year is only a few billion dollars short of the spending totals at the height of World War II, 1944 and 1945, when defense spending alone was \$84 billion a year. In this 1962 budget, however, national security programs total \$52.7 billion and all other expenditures \$39.8 billion.

"Domestic nondefense expenditures, exclusive of interest, amount to \$28.1 billion. This represents an increase of \$1.5 billion over present estimates for the current year and \$5.0 billion over domestic nondefense spending in the last fiscal year when such spending was already accelerated as an anti-recession measure. In relation to fiscal 1960, these nondefense expenditures are up \$7.6 billion for a rise of 37 per cent in just three years. Obviously, this is a budget area which includes substantial opportunities for savings to the taxpayers if Congress will only consider it with that end in mind.

"While a half-billion dollars surplus is projected in the budget, there is slim assurance in the budget details that still another deficit will not be incurred in 1963. Receipts are estimated at almost \$11 billion more than in the current year and over \$15 billion more than in 1961. Clearly, the estimates for 1963 are based on most optimistic assumptions of personal income and corporate profits in the period ahead. Such estimates hardly warrant Congressional approval of the budget spending proposals in the expectation that they would be with in a balanced budget."
