Consolidation Election Will Be Held March 17th

The consolidation election will be held Saturday, March 17th.

Court Judge John Hart called the election Wednesday, in compliance with the law, after having been petitioned by voters in six of the county's school districts.

Petitions, bearing 271 names, were presented to the judge on Feb. 6th.

Petitions asked that the Eastland, Ranger, Oidem, Carbon, Gorman and Desdemona district be consolidated into one district with one governing board.

Mrs. Joseph Perkins, chairman of the Better Education Committee, presented Judge Hart the request and the petitions asking for the election.

The proposal was sent to the Texas Education Commission for approval, and arrived back in Eastland last Friday afternoon, with the approving signature.

Voting will be held in each of the district and a majority of the voters will have to vote affirmatively for the measure in each district before it carries.

Qualified voters will be those holding valid poll tax receipts.

Election judges will be as follows:

Eastland—Herman Hassell; Ranger—Calvin Brown; Oidem—Mrs. O. H. Dick; Gorman—W. G. Baker; Carbon—H. M. Gilbert;

'Districts Involved' -- State

The drive in this county to consolidate schools has sparked some interesting issues—not the least of which is "who pays for the election?"

Since the county judge was petitioned to call the election, first general thoughts were that it would be a county-financed election.

"Not so," avowed citizens from the western part of the county—who are not affected by the election in that the schools in Cisco, Rising Star and Scranton are not involved in the consolidation proposal.

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Capt. R. G. Bell Returns From 17,000 Mile Tour

NELLIS AFB, NEV.—Captain Robert G. Bell, 31, son of Mrs. Harry L. Edwards of Graham Hospital, Cisco, has returned here following a tour of South and Central America as a member of the United States Air Force aerial demonstration team, the "Thunderbirds."

Captain Bell visited 16 countries, flying his F-100 Super Sabre over 17,000 miles, demonstrating to more than ten million of our Latin American neighbors the aerospace power for peace concept.

The captain received his B. S. degree from the United States Naval Academy. He and his wife, the former Jacqueline Rogers of 3301 Aberdeen Way Houston, have two children.

County officials sought and got a first-hand decision from the Attorney General late last week on this particular matter, and he assured them that the

Estimates are that the cost of the election will be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$500.

And sure enough, Attorney General decisions bear out that the districts involved must "pay the bill."





\$354,890,488 In Benefits

Veterans and their families totaling \$54,943,798 were made in Texas received a total of \$354,890,488 in cash benefits and services during the fiscal year of 1961, the Veterans Administration announced today.

Actual distribution of this sum is outlined in the 1961 annual report of the VA, now on sale at the Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.

In Texas, compensation for service-connected disabilities were paid to 162,912 living veterans in the amount of \$144,363,403.

Death compensation and pensions were paid to the dependents of 55,584 deceased veterans in the amount of \$56,038.



231 Civil, 42 Criminal Cases Tried In District Court In Eastland

There were 287 civil suits and 54 criminal cases filed in 91st District Court in Eastland last year.

This is about average for the court. District Clerk Roy Lane said. Lane released the court record figures this week.

Of the civil suits filed last year, there were 23 tax suits, 101 divorce suits, two annulment suits and 111 others.

There were two paper's oath trials, and the average cost for each civil suit was \$25.

Judge T. M. Collier's Court began 1961 with 247 civil suits and 27 criminal suits pending from the previous year.

During the year 213 civil suits were disposed of, average 42 criminal cases, with 271 civil suits and 109 criminal cases pending on Dec. 31st.






