



Bring on the Tape

To a boy, there's no good way to measure how hig a piece of cake should be. But nutrition scientists, striving to divide their cake—what America eats—have a strong measure in research. In the face of growing evidence that too much fat in the diet may bring on heart disease, they are using research to decide how large a portion of food's calories should come from each of the calorie-carrying nutrients: Fat, carbohydrate, protein. Recent U.S. Department of Agriculture research points to this conclusion: Carbohydrate—if in the form of starch—deserves a bigger share of the cake than was thought before.

Scientists have learned, through animal studies, that the kind of carbohydrate in food markedly affects the way our bodies handle fat. Each kind affect differently the amount of a fatty substance in the blood, called cholesterol, which is implicated in heart disease. Substituting the starch kind of carbohydrate—in bread, cereals, potatoes—for the simple carbohydrate—of table sugar and the sugar of milk—causes a drop in the amount of cholesterol in the blood.

To explain what this research means in terms of coronary heart disease, U.S. Department of Agriculture nutritionists are looking suspiciously at the way America's food habits have changed in the last 50 years ... at the marked decrease in our consumption of cereal foods and potatoes ... at the marked increase in our consumption of sugar and fat.

The final answer on how to divide the food America eats will come with research on humans now underway.






