Texas Guardsmen To Receive 'Counterinsurgency' Training

FORT POLK, La. — Texas National Guardsmen of the 49th Armored Division, now on active duty, have received an additional mission and it may prove to be as tough as training-wise—as any intensified combat program.

The Army has the additional responsibility of countering insurgent operation of the "cold war." Doctrine, tactics and execution of operations will be labeled "counterinsurgency."

It. Col. Karl E. Wallace, the division's G-3 in charge of training, discussed the new counterinsurgency mission with unit commanders and representatives from the division general staff.

He reported on a recent conference during which top Continental Army Command staff members outlined plans for the training and operations

endeavor in order to counteract the forces of communist penetration, infiltration and subversion.

"In general, this means the Army is going to fight the enemy on its own battleground, whether it be conventional warfare, or the "wars of liberation." These are the types of "hot-cold" wars being fought in Laos, South Vietnam, Latin America and Asia.

Just how the 49th Armored Division will fit into the overall counterinsurgency program is still being developed. Col. Wallace pointed out training would be implemented on a crash basis as soon as material is available.

The emphasis will be on the non-military aspects of acting as counter-insurgents as well as the more military field of counter-guerrilla warfare. Special Forces training will augment the intensified counterinsurgency program.
