Plans Complete for State Junior College Track Meet

The Texas Junior College Athletic Conference Track Meet to be held at Ranger Junior College Monday and Tuesday, April 30-May 1, will be a two-day event between Blinn Junior College, San Antonio Junior College, and Schreiner Institute for the team championship.

There will be six places given in every event, and the points will be doubled for the relays. Schreiner Institute's 440 and mile-relay teams are pre-meet favorites in these two events.

Portia and Dietzman of San Antonio College have clocked an identical 60.5, 440-yard dash in pre-conference meets. However, Schreiner of Schreiner has run a 50.0 to lead the list of favorites.

The 100-yard dash will feature three sub-10 flat sprinters. Austry of Cooke County and Owen of Schreiner have recorded 9.8 finishes, and Klotz of Blinn has a 9.5.

Armando Cerna of Ranger College heads the list of hurdlers with a spectacular 14.8 in the 120-yard high. Jones of Blinn will offer a time of 15.3 as the nearest rival.

Sellers of Schreiner and Cerna of Ranger will be co-favorites in the 220-yard low hurdles. The time of any entry is a 24.1 by Sellers.

In the distance events, Jack Peterson of San Antonio has turned the 880 in a time of 1:59. His nearest competition is fellow teammate, Robert McMillan, who has a time of 2:02.

Pedro Salas of San Antonio should give that school a sweep in the distance races, for he has a 4:39 in his credit in the mile run. Reese, of Schreiner should make this event interesting as he spins the four laps in 4:37.

A total of 197 students from 13 colleges will participate in the State Meet. Ranger Junior College will have 24 boys entered in the different events.

Tornado Safety Rules Listed By T. C. Weaver

T. C. Weaver, Civil Defense Coordinator for Ranger, has released the following safety rules concerning tornadoes. Weaver said to know what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death.

Following are seven rules to follow in case of the approach of a tornado:

1. If you are near a tornado cellar. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably with pick a n d shovel. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except underground excavations.

2. If you are in an open country: 1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour. 2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

3. If in a city or town, 1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. Stay away from windows! 2. In homes, the corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building. 3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

4. If in schools: 1. In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly supported roofs! 2. In rural schools, that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

5. If in factories and industrial plants: On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

6. Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

7. Keep turned to your radio or television station for latest advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may be up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio a n d television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical rug.

Tornadoes can occur any place in the United States at any time of the year. They happen most frequently in the mid-western, southern and central states from March through September.

Tornado "weather" can be hot, sticky days with southerly winds and a threatening, ominous sky. Familiar thunderstorm clouds are present. An hour or two before a tornado, topsy-turvy clouds appear sometimes bulging down instead of up. The clouds often have a greenish-black color. Rain is frequently hail, precedes the tornado with a heavy downpour after it has passed.

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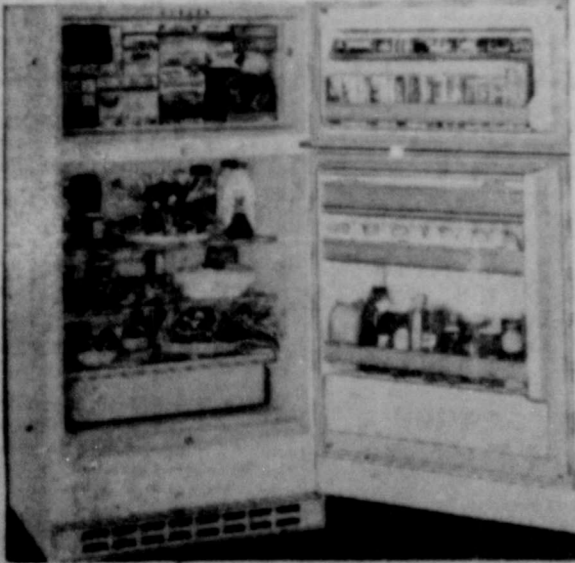

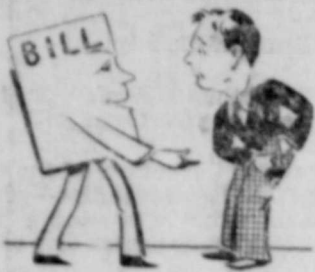
