Mrs. Lowe says that the happiest hours she has is while reading her Bible. She has read the Bible through one time and backs only a few chapters having completed reading the Bible the second time.

When not reading her Bible, Mrs. Lowe likes to spend her time cooking, sewing, or talking about her grandchildren. She does all types of sewing and particularly likes to embroidery and patchwork.

DR. JAMES W. FINNEY ... to speak on Cancer

Dr. Finney to Speak At Cancer Meeting

The public is cordially invited to hear Dr. James W. Finney speak on cancer at the annual meeting and education of officers May 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the annex of the Eastland First Christian Church.

Dr. Finney, assistant chief of surgery research for Baylor University Medical Center, Dallas, will present a 20-25 minute program of the reasons, prevention and demonstration of the need for cancer research from the inception of the program leading to the ultimate application to the cancer patient. Color slides will be used as illustrations.

He received a BA degree in Bacteriology and a minor in organic chemistry from the University of Texas in 1955 and a MA in Microbiology and minor in Physiology with training in biochemistry and radiation, 1955-57. He has done Microbiology research at the V.A. Hospital in McKinney and Dallas, and at present he is an

assistant in Microbiology, Baylor University Dental School, Dallas. He has worked with terms on the studies in tumor autoimmunity; research in host resistance to tumors; methods of induction and demonstration of autoimmunity in cancer patients. Dr. Finney is one of a team of three men doing research with hydrogen peroxide as a tumor far cancer. The hydrogen peroxide used in the treatment is the same sort of solution women use to bleach (Continued on page 4)

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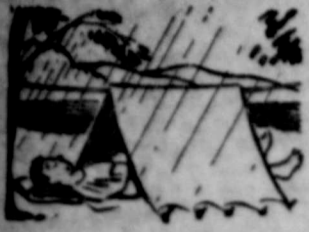

(Continued from page 1) their hair. For the cancer therapy, it is "infused" in the tumor for about 40 minutes, and during the last five minutes, radiation from an X-ray machine also is sent into the malignancy.

It has long been known that cancer cells seem to be deficient in oxygen and that if oxygen is increased in the tumor, then better results can be obtained when conventional X-ray radiation is used. The hydrogen peroxide is simply the means used or increasing the oxygen in cancer sites.

The Dallas team borrowed an idea from the "intraarterial infusion" method that recently has come into use for sending high doses of drugs into a tumor. This method uses a small pump for pushing the drug through long tubes into the patients cancer. It is being used in Fort Worth as well as several other places.

Rise In Schooling In This County

The education trend is upward in Eastland County.

According to latest Government reports, there has been a marked increase in the last ten years in the amount of schooling that local residents have been acquiring.

More of them than ever before have been completing elementary school and have been going to on to high school and to college.

Today, the average resident of Eastland County, by the time he reaches age 25, is equipped with 9.7 years of formal education, which is more than he would have had ten years ago. At that time, the median number of school years completed locally was 9.2.

The figures, just released by the Census Bureau, are based on data gathered during the 1960 national tabulations.

They indicate that, despite all the criticism levelled at them the younger generation is putting more time and effort into the educational process than it has for a long while.

Gains are noted in almost every section of the country in the number of years being devoted to schooling, with some areas showing much greater improvement than others.

Women appear to be taking

full advantage of their educational opportunities. The figures show, in fact, that they tend to stay in school longer than men do, even though a smaller proportion of them continue on through college.

In Eastland County, the median number of years completed by women is 10.2 and, by men, 9.1.

Why are the young folk continuing in school longer than did formerly? To a large extent, it appears to be a matter of economics.

They have come to realize that if they fail to get an adequate education they will be forfeiting job opportunities and thousands of dollars in possible future income.

Reports on this subject from the U. S. Department of Labor and from other agencies have brought home to them the fact that each year of education adds a certain amount to a person's lifetime earnings.

The result has been a decline in the number of students dropping out prematurely in Eastland County and a 5 percent rise in years of schooling since 1950.

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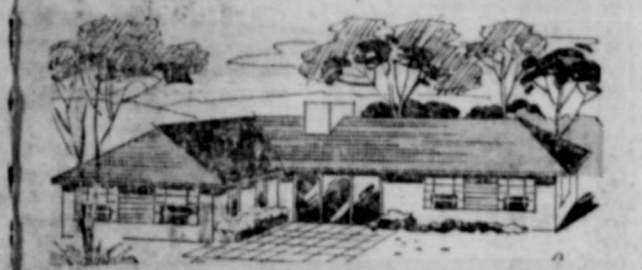
