larger over the years, people became able by degrees to acquire more and more of the luxuries and conveniences of modern living.

Just how much money they put into the purchases of these items is another question. Few families can even guess at the cost.

Some help in this direction, as it applies to the average household, is now available through figures in a national study released by the University of Michigan and through surveys by the National Bureau of Economic Research.

The broad picture that they reveal is that families with higher earnings have proportionately more invested in durable goods. The amount so invested comes to somewhat more than their annual incomes.

In Eastland County, with each increase in earnings, local families have acquired additional physical assets.

On the basis of the figures given, the average family in the county now has an estimated \$4,060 in consumer durable goods.

For the 7,130 local households, the grand total of these assets comes to \$28,959,000, figured at the purchase price.

Throughout the United States as a whole, the gross amount invested in such items is of the order of \$365 billion, the reports show. About 40 percent of it, some \$145 billion, represents automobiles.

However, if these possessions were to be offered for sale at the present time, they would yield less than half the amount that was paid for them. Normal wear and tear have reduced their value.

Allowing for this depreciation, the finding is that the average American household would be able to realize about \$900 on its car and \$2,400 on its other durable goods.

Much of this equipment, other than cars, was bought five to ten years ago and is in need of replacement, says the report. It foresees a rise in durable goods sales in the near future.

John Connally To Speak Here Friday, 10:45 a.m.

John Connally will uncap his runoff campaign for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination this week with an old-fashioned, border-to-border whistle-stop train tour.

The "John Connally Victory Special" will roll out of Texarkana at 8 a.m. Thursday, headed west on rails of the Texas & Pacific.

Three days, 38 depot stops and 863 miles later, the three-car special will pull into El Paso after having girdled the state from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

Connally will be in Ranger at 10:45 a.m. Friday for a 15 minute stop. He will make a short talk and shake hands with those present. The John Connally Committee in Ranger has invited everyone to come out Friday morning and greet Connally.

Mrs. Connally, known to thousands of Texans as "Nellie", will accompany her candidate husband on the tour. The train swing will be an innovation in modern-day Texas politics.

While it was a standard technique in years past, candidates in recent campaigns have relied on the auto, airplane, bus and television to carry their message across the state.

Connally, in his successful first primary campaign, traveled more than 25,000 miles by land and air, one of them by train.

RJC Dorm Bids To Be Opened June 1

Plans have been drawn by Elam and Associates and approved by the Board of Regents for a 54-bed men's dormitory at Ranger Junior College. Specifications can be obtained from Elam and Associates of Wichita Falls for sealed bids to be submitted no later than June 1, 1962. Sealed bids will be opened at 3:30 P. M. on June 1 at the college cafeteria. It is anticipated that construction will commence by June 15.

The dormitory is planned for four boys to a unit with two boys in a room. Each room will have built-in desks and closets, and there will be a bath for each four boys. The dormitory will also have a lobby and an armament for the house mother.

The new building will be located running east and west where the present shop building and athletic dormitory are located. Adjacent to the building will be a parking lot and a landscape area.

This phase of the building program will be financed by \$75,000 new revenue bonds, which will be liquidated by the rental from students. None of the recent bond tax money is allocated for this particular building.

The dormitory will open for occupancy for the fall term of 1962.

RJC Government Class Keeps Political Chart

The Texas Government class of Ranger Junior College has been participating this semester in a project both interesting and worthwhile. For the last four months the class has kept a political chart of all the candidates running for the offices of governor, lieutenant governor, and congressman-at-large in Texas.

The students in the class drew names of the candidates February 10, and each student has followed his candidate's campaign and has reported to the class all incidents of interest concerning the candidate whose name he drew. On the political chart each student has

recorded such information as the candidate's occupation, a list of his supporters, his platform, and his stand on various issues.

Two days before election day May 5, the class, as a part of the project, took a straw vote. It was surprising and interesting to see how very close the class came to predicting the results of the heated primary race.

The class of thirty made a perfect prediction on the Democratic ticket. In the governor's race John Connally led in the straw vote with 10 votes, and Don Yarbrough and Will Wilson tied with 5 votes each. For lieutenant governor James A. Truman was in the run-off

with 8 votes; Preston Smith received 7 votes. The race for congressman-at-large was very close as Woodrow Wilson Roan had 9 votes, and Joe Pool had 8 votes.

The class did not do as well on the Republican ticket. In the governor's race the straw vote correctly predicted Jack Cox with 2 votes to win over Roy Whittenburg with no votes, but missed in the lieutenant governor's race by choosing Kellis Dibrell with 2 votes over Bill Hayes, who won in the state election. Also the class missed in the choice of congressman-at-large by selecting Giles Miller with 2 votes instead of Desmond Barry, who received no votes from the class.

The class voted against the elimination of the poll tax as a condition of voting, and again disagreed with the state vote for the legalization of pari-mutuel betting.

In the class vote for state representatives, Wayne Gibbens with 27 votes won in a landslide over Scott Bailey with 3 votes—another hit.

The project was of great value to the class and created wide interest among all class members. Students have learned a lot about candidates as well as political parties by just reading about the different candidates.

Mrs. James P. Morris, the instructor of the class, thinks that the chart made the students aware of the campaign and that it also showed the difficulty in getting the candidates' opinions on issues. She hopes that the project has created a permanent political interest among the students.

In a survey of the students participating in the project, the following opinions were voiced:

Paul Free: It created interest in government. I learned more about political parties.

Barbara Craig: It helped me to know more about campaigning and candidates. It made the class more interesting.

Winfrey Shipp: The chart was informative, and it led to better understanding of political campaigning and politics in general.

Rita Sipes: It created interest in the class. We could read all about the candidates and decide which one was the best suited for various offices.

Don Faulkenberry: It was a very educational and kept the students aware of issues and opinions.

IN RANGER

Beer; Wine Election Slated For June 9th

An election to determine if the voters want to legalize the sale of beer and wine in the corporate limits of Ranger has been set for June 9 in the Ranger City Hall.

The order for the election was called by County Judge John Hart and Commissioners Tip Arther, B. M. Bennett, Carl Lamb and Buck Collins by County Clerk Johnson Smith during the regular session Monday morning.

Commissioner Bennett made a motion for the election to be called which was seconded by Commissioner Collins.

Absentee voting will be held from May 21 to and including June 5 in the County Clerk's office. Only qualified voters of the corporate limits of the city of Ranger will be eligible to cast ballots in this election.

By law, the original application for an election to be called must be signed by 10 qualified voters, who are required to be residents of the Ranger area.

A total of 318 names appeared on the petitions, 284 of which were considered minimum to order the election.

The number of names required for the calling of the election was determined by the number of votes cast in the Ranger area during the last general election for governor at which time presidential electors were voted on.

Votes cast in the Ranger area at that time totaled 1,135. At least 25% of that total was required on the petition.

In reference to determining the qualified voters, District Attorney Earl Conner stated, "The general election is the only yardstick you can go by."

The application for petition was received by the County Clerk on April 5 and returned on April 27 with the required amount of signatures.

All election costs will be borne by the county. Election judge presiding in the Ranger election will be Calvin Brown, Precinct Chairman of Pct. 2.

Commissioner Tip Arther stated, "More than likely this is only the first in a series of beer and wine elections in the county."

This will be the first election of a prohibition question in Eastland County since 1948, according to records at the county clerk's office. In the spring of 1948, the county as a whole voted on beer with 7,004 persons casting ballots—4,433 against and 2,571 for.

In the same election the Ranger precinct had 760 votes against beer and 317 for it. Ten years before—March, 1938—in a county beer election, the Ranger precinct favored beer by a vote of 537 to 218. Two years later, in October, 1940, Ranger voted for beer, 479 to 314.

The first Ranger prohibition election on record at the courthouse was in June, 1890. 40 persons voted for beer and 38 voted against it.
