Cancer Society Elects Officers And Hears Research Scientist

The Eastland County Cancer Society elected officers and directors during its regular business meeting Thursday night and heard a top research scientist discuss progress with hydrogen peroxide.

Sam Kimmell of Cisco was re-elected president of the county-wide group; Mrs. Tom Lewis of Rising Star, vice president; Mrs. D. E. Pulley of Ranger, secretary; and Richard Moore of Cisco, treasurer.

Results of the current Cancer Crusade were reported by Mrs. Cecil Collins of Eastland, crusade chairman.

Most towns have surpassed their goals—Olden, with a quota of \$75, collected \$90.40; Rising Star, \$350 quota, \$365.50 collected; Gorman, \$300 quota, \$239.94 raised; Ranger, \$700 quota, \$910.40 collected; Cisco \$1,000, \$1,016.39; and an incomplete report from Eastland showed \$536.26 collected.

Dr. James W. Finney, assistant chief of cancer research for Baylor University, Medical Center, discussed progress in cancer research progress in lecture and slide films.

He explained the current program, testing the effectiveness of using hydrogen peroxide which is being used to make malignant tumors more sensitive to radiation treatment.

"The process makes the area more sensitive to radiation with the oxygen from the compound, and test results are very optimistic, but months, and perhaps years of clinical testing remains," Dr. Finney pointed out, during the First Baptist Church meeting.

"The ultimate success depends on the continued support of groups such as this," he said.

Over 21,308 pieces of educational literature, has been distributed in this county, a record.

Ranger Guard Unit 'Outstanding' During Maneuvers At Fort Polk

Capt. Bill E. Caffee, commander of the Ranger National Guard Service Battery, 3d RK T. How Bn, 132nd Artillery, now stationed at Fort Polk, Louisiana has sent the following report on the activities of members of the Ranger National Guard Unit during the recent maneuvers.

Capt. Caffee said that the Ranger Guard members performed their assigned duties in an outstanding manner during the United States Army's largest troop maneuver operation in 1962.

He said that the long hours of efficient performance under battle conditions brought comments from many experienced high ranking military officials that they would be proud to go into combat with such a unit.

During an aggressor attack which overran all front line troops, the Ranger National Guard Unit, commanded by Capt. Caffee, formed a front line defense and captured 10 tanks and several wheel vehicles as well as some aggressor officers and was the only unit within a's own battalion which was not over-run by enemy forces.

"The morale and spirit of every member remains very high," Capt. Caffee said. This extended field maneuver has proved that the Ranger National Guard can take assignment comparable with any unit in the US Army."

He said that the men are interested in getting home to families and relatives as well as an expected release in August.

County To Be 'Pilot Site' For Industry -- Connally

Eastland County will be the pilot site for an urban industrialization project if John Connally gets elected Governor.

That was his promise Friday as he whirl-winded through this county aboard his "Victory Special."

The three speaking stops in Ranger, Eastland and Cisco were the only three-in-one county on the Texarkana to El Paso 40-stop vote-seeking trek.

Connally is campaigning for the Democratic nomination and is in the June 2nd run-off with Don Yarborough. Winner of the run-off will meet Republican Jack Cox in the November general election.

In return for his promise for industry, Connally was gifted with an assortment of local items—including the county's revered relic, "Old Rip."

He began talking industry as soon as he entered the county.

Coming into Ranger accompanied by a group of Ranger backers who had gone to Gordon to board his special, he began his talk before about 300 spectators by recalling the Oil Boom days, and the present need for industry to keep the people "next to the soil."

In Ranger he complimented Ranger Junior College and the work it is doing and promised to encourage educational advantages.

He called the moral fiber in this part of the county the best to be found anywhere, and emphasized that industries are needed to keep the strength of the people.

He was introduced in Ranger by Dr. Ted Nicksick, president of Ranger Junior College, and was presented a bouquet and gifts for his family by Mrs. Roscoe Hopper.

Dick Henderson, Dr. Nicksick's wife, Mrs. Hopper and Sam Aills boarded the special train at Gordon.

Dwaine Dennis, editor of the Ranger Times, and H. V. O'Brien, editor of the Eastland Telegram, boarded the gubernatorial special in Ranger to accompany it through the county, de-training in Cisco, following his third speech.

The two interviewed Connally as the train sped toward Eastland.

Asked about the possibility of making this county the pilot site for an industrial program, Connally, who has been campaigning hard for urban industrialization, agreed that this would be an excellent idea and agreed to give it paramount consideration as soon as he is elected.

Asked about the crepe-soled shoes he was wearing, he laughed that during the primary campaigning he had been forced to stand for hours on hard cement, and terrazzo surfaces which almost ruined his feet.

Even though he's campaigning in a different but politically famous, fashion now—aboard his more comfortable, but also taxing campaign train—the Jones are still worn because of their comfort.

His wife Nellie and two sons, John and Mark, are making the trip, and in each stop he apologized for the absence of his daughter, Sharon, who was trying out for cheer-leader at a Fort Worth high school.

En route, he graciously posed for pictures and inquired about the owners of farms which he could see from the train window.

At Eastland he was met by about 150 people, including a band, Miss Carol MacMoy and Chamber Manager Lee Ellis, who introduced him.

Miss MacMoy presented him with the basket containing "Old Rip," and Band Director Phil Hewett named him an honorary member of the Maverick band (He used to play the clarinet "not very well") and gave him a Romeo-Eastland-made, ash tray with the EHS band emblem on it.

During his brief remarks in Eastland, he spoke out most emphatically for industry and promised that "if elected, Eastland County will be the county where he'll try his industrialization plans."

In Cisco, he later promised that he would personally "go to bat" for the industry-going out and heading up study groups to see that plants are located, to provide a place where the county's young people can find gainful employment without leaving the county.

In each of his train-platform talks he remarked of his awareness of this county's drop in population, and its great need for employment stimuli.

Introduced in Cisco by Mayor John H. White, Connally also received gifts from Cisco Connally Chairman, Richard Moore, and James McCrahen, president of the First National Bank.

An assortment of Cisco-made products were given to him and his family. These included a giant pair of Boss Manufacturing Co.—made work gloves (which he promised his hands would grow to, but not his head), a stadium seat, trolling tender, books, including Cisco Press Publisher J. W. Sifton's Mexican Gook Book, and the bank's story of the famous Cisco Santa Claus bank robbery, and leather school notebooks for the children.

Connally invited everyone to the inaugural and "guessed there might just be some Mexican dishes."

The Cisco Junior College Wrangler-ans were on hand to add color and atmosphere to the depot-gathered delegation.

It's been quite a few years since a state-wide political candidate has campaigned through this county on a special train, and Eastland Countians heard what they wanted to hear Friday from John Connally.
