## RJC Summer Registration Starts Monday

Registration for the first term of the Ranger Junior College 1962 summer session will be held in the Administration Building of the college Monday evening, June 4, from 6:00 to 9:00 P. M.

Classes will begin Tuesday evening, June 5, at 6:00 P. M. Classes will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings of each week.

The schedule of courses is as follows: 6:00 — 8:30 P. M. English 101 (Composition and Grammar)

Government 201 (American National Government) Business Administration 102T (Advanced Typewriting) Business Administration 103 (Office Machines)

Chemistry 103 (General Chemistry) 8:30 — 11:30 P. M. English 203 (Masterpieces of Literature)

History 101 American History — (1492-1865) Tuition is \$10.00 per semester hour; out-of-state students are charged \$20.00 per semester hour. In addition each student must also pay a registration and building use fee of \$10.00 for each six weeks. A laboratory fee of \$2.50 will also be charged for chemistry and business students.

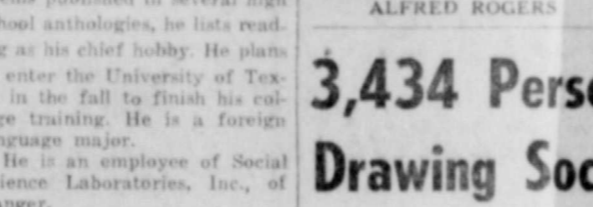
## Sunday Devotion

Cage Brothers Construction Company of San Antonio has been awarded the contract to pave Main Street in Ranger from the west city limits to Highway 80 and from Main Street north on North Austin Street for one-twentieth of a mile.

## Ranger Site For Colony Reunion

The annual Colony Reunion will be held in Ranger on June 17 in the CIO Union Hall located on Highway 80 east. Last year's reunion attracted 169 former students and residents of the Colony Community.

The committee is also seeking information for the year 1968 on the old Colony School that was located near the Colony Cemetery. It is known that Mr. Eric Bruce taught school during that period, but very little is known of the students of that time.

A number of former teachers of the school have indicated that they will attend this year's reunion. During the past five years, ex-students and residents of Colony have attended the reunion from far away as California, New York, Illinois, Louisiana, New Mexico and Oklahoma, as well as from every section of Texas.

President of the Colony Reunion Association is Mr. Wesley Fayner and vice president is Mrs. Loretta Weaver. Both reside in Ranger.

Collins Construction Company for 7.5 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 80 in Eastland county. Hot mix asphalt concrete paving will be applied from Broughter Street in Eastland to F. M. Road 2461 southwest of Ranger. A low bid of \$109,944 was submitted by the company. The project is expected to take approximately 60 working days.

E. P. Hawn, Resident Engineer for the Texas Highway Department at Eastland, will be in charge of the projects while construction is underway.

Main Street in Ranger is designated as F. M. Road 101 and North Austin Street is F. M. Road No. 717. Construction is expected to begin in about three weeks on the Ranger portion of the paving projects.

## Drilling Contractor Buys Property on Highway 80

T. A. Newman Drilling Contracting Company of Texas City, has purchased property on Highway 80, one-half mile east of Ranger, for use as office and pipe-yards storage.

The company has drilled eight wells in the area during the past year and plan extensive drilling operations in the near future. Newman holds oil leases in Eastland, Stephens and Comanche counties. The rig that will be stationed in Ranger is capable of drilling up to 6000 feet. Further expansions plans call for the purchase of a shallow drilling rig in the near future.

A pipe yard will be built adjacent to the warehouse building.

In reply to an opinion by District Attorney Earl Conner, County Auditor Earl O'Brien, asked commissioners to pass an order to redesignate funds that were in the Eastland County's old Road Bond Interest and Sinking Fund into a Road and Bridge Operating and Maintenance Fund.

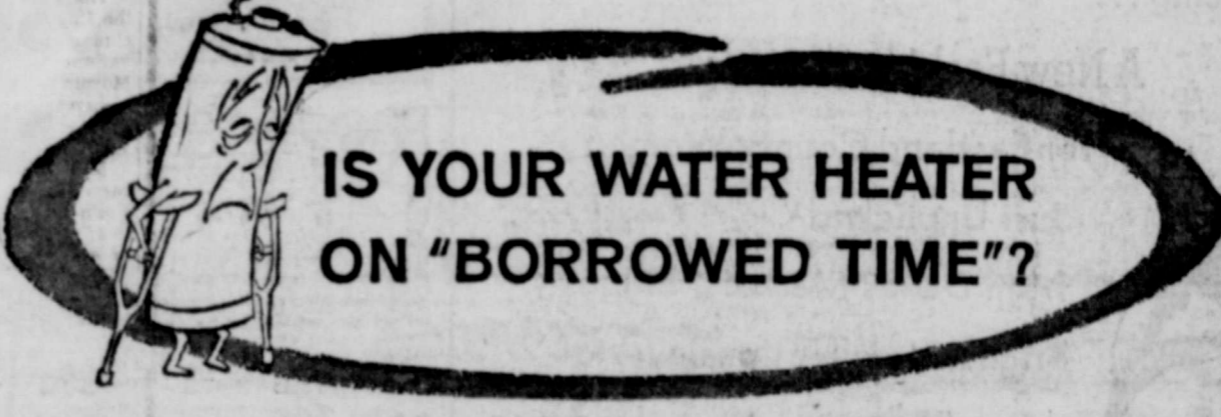

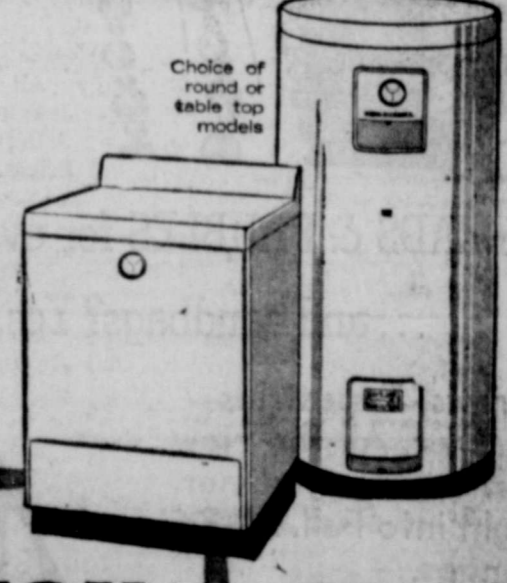

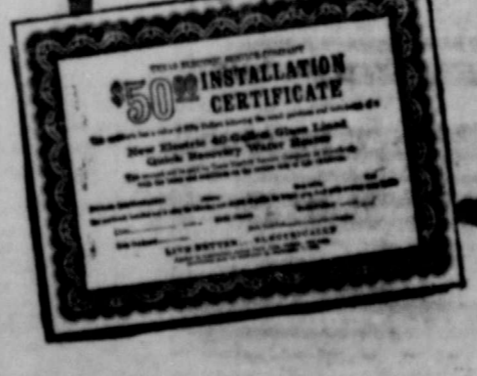
