Convalescent Center To Be Constructed By Dr. W. P. Watkins

Plans for the construction of a new 30-bed convalescent center in Ranger, was revealed today by Dr. W. P. Watkins, local physician.

The "L" shaped building will be built on a 169 by 120 foot lot located at 161 Main Street in Ranger. Plans call for construction to start around March 15, Dr. Watkins reported.

The convalescent center will contain a large lobby, and will also have a large kitchen and dining room.

The paving program was halted last November due to bad weather, after over 160 blocks were paved within the city limits.

Currently, 24 blocks are scheduled to be paved, Mayor Newsham reported.

To be paved are nine blocks on Spring Road, one block on Fourth St., and one block on Seventh Street, all located in Young Addition. Four blocks on South Austin and two blocks on Blackwell Road are scheduled to be paved. This six block area will connect Mesquite Street and the Highway 80, Oak block on Hunt Street to be paved will connect U. S. Highway and the brick paving on Hunt Street.

In Cooper Addition, 4 blocks are scheduled for paving. They are, two blocks on Oak Street, two blocks on Beverly Street and two blocks on Pecos Street.

Mayor Newsham said that other areas will possibly be paved, but as yet property owners have not made their wishes known to the city hall. He said that property owners wishing paving, should contact city hall and make arrangements as soon as possible, as the paving contractor will not remain in Ranger for a very long period.

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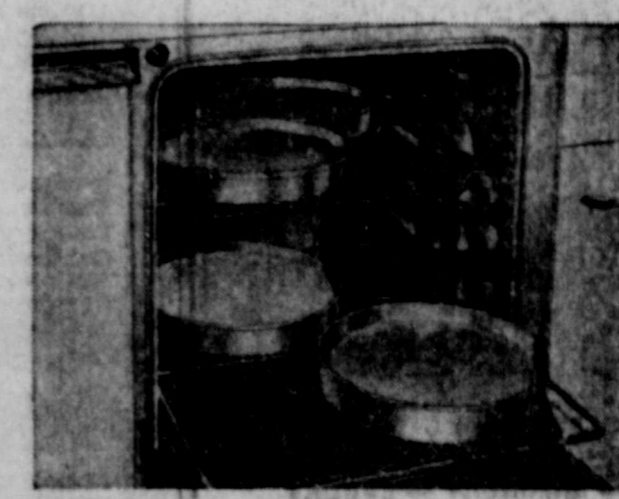
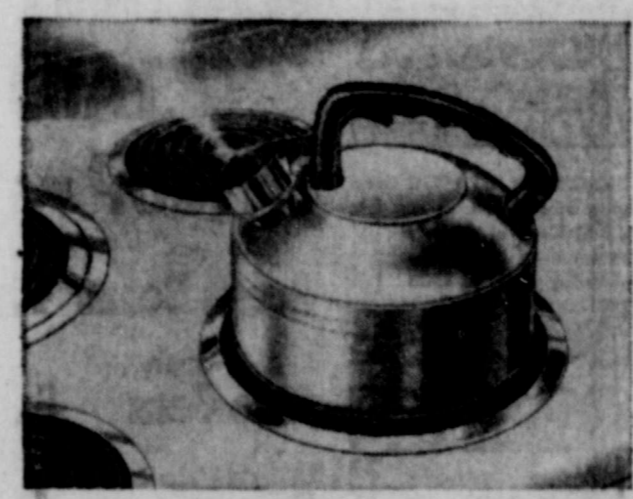
