**Fire Damages
Stuard House
Late Sunday**

Fire of undetermined origin did considerable damage to the Joe Stuard house at 829 Blackwell Road late Sunday evening.

The blaze was discovered during a high windstorm which had whipped the area nearly all day Sunday.

Fire Chief Charlie Isbell stated that most of the fire seemed to be centered under the long back porch which extended along the south side of the house. Most damage was to the flooring of the house and porch.

Although there was very little water damage to the inside of the house, smoke damage seemed to be heavy when the fire spread to the inner walls.






