Fire Damages Stuard House Late Sunday

Fire of undetermined origin did considerable damage to the Joe Stuard house at 829 Blackwell Road late Sunday evening. The blaze was discovered during a high wind-storm which had whipped the area nearly all day Sunday.

Fire Chief Charlie Isbell stated that most of the fire seemed to be centered under the long back porch which extended along the south side of the house. Most damage was to the flooring of the house and porch.

Although there was very little water damage to the inside of the house, smoke damage seemed to be heavy when the fire spread to the inner walls.

3 Candidates In Race For Ranger Mayor

Three men have filed for the position of Mayor of the City of Ranger. Filing were Morris Newham, Dewey Cox, Jr. and Matthew E. Roberts.

Mr. Newham, present Mayor of Ranger, is seeking his second term in that office.

He was born in Ranger and moved to Longview with his parents at the age of 15. After graduating from Longview High School he attended Rice Institute, receiving an engineering degree from there in 1944.

Following graduation he served two years in the Pacific theater during World War II, and after being discharged he moved to Ranger and began operating Ranger Frozen Food Center.

He has served as president of the Ranger Jaycees, Rotary Club, Board of Regents of Ranger Junior College, and state president of the Texas Food Lockers Association. He also is a director of the Ranger Commercial State Bank.

In December of 1962, Mr. Newham was chosen by the directors of Ranger Chamber of Commerce as Citizen of the Year. He was honored at the Chamber of Commerce banquet held at Lone Cedar Country Club.

Mr. Newham is well known for his civic activities. During the fall of 1962, his leadership was used in the paving of 108 blocks in Ranger, and now paving of 24 more blocks are underway, according to him.

Mr. and Mrs. Newham are parents of two children, Roy 15, and Nancy, 11.

Dewey Cox, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Cox, Sr., has been a Ranger resident all his life.

A graduate of Ranger High School, he attended Ranger Junior College two years, and University of Texas School of Law. He taught business administration in Ranger High School and later taught four years at Ranger Junior College. He has been secretary for the local Rotary Club for the past ten years. This is his first time to seek a public office.

Mr. Cox, his wife, Frances, and two sons, Lee, 16, and Paul, 9, live on Fuchs Street and he maintains his attorney's office at 120 South Austin Street.

Matthew E. Roberts, 28, a resident of Ranger for the past two years, was the first of the three men running for Mayor to file.

Mr. Roberts, manager of Gholson Hotel in Ranger, attended Peasecock Military Academy in San Antonio and one and one-half years at the University of Houston before serving two years in the military service.

In 1955 he began work with his father in the purchase of lumber for the building of house trailers built in Texas. Mr. Roberts said he traveled throughout the United States selling and buying lumber until two years ago when his mother, Mrs. Gwen Roberts, purchased a home in Ranger.
