of Ford Motor Co. in Detroit, Michigan, he joined that company in Detroit in 1903, its first year of operation, as a fitter of running board brackets, and in 1909 moved to Dallas as shop superintendent for the fledgling assembly plant in Dallas.

He remained in the Dallas plant until 1919 when, with Ed Mahar of Dallas, he took over a Ford dealership in Ranger, where the oil boom was in full swing. During the first year here, the firm sold 800 cars.

"Everyone had money and everyone wanted a car," Mr. Leveille said. "We did it even everyone wanted a car," the late Mr. Leveille said. "We didn't even have time to wash them off."

While serving as mechanic and test driver for the company in Detroit he had become acquainted with Henry Ford. He often was assigned to drive Mr. Ford from the Dearborn plant to his home.

When the assembly plant opened in Dallas, Mr. Leveille was named by Mr. Ford to take charge of the operations, which at that time consisted of installing wheels on axels and bolting frames and tops to the chassis.

The autos arrived from Detroit by rail. He and his crew would put the wheels on in the railroad yards and drive the stripped chassis to the assembly plant, on the second floor of the building that housed the Dallas dealership on the bottom floor.

When the Dallas assembly plant held its 50 year anniversary celebration in 1959, it honored Mr. Leveille.

He retired in 1957 after 58 years in the auto business in Dallas.

Home Economic Girls Host School Board Dinner Tuesday

Members of the third year Home Economics Class of Ranger High School were hostesses to members of the school board and several faculty members Tuesday night for a dinner party in the Home Economics Department of the school.

Mrs. Arthur Deffebach, instructor, assisted the girls in preparation of the meal and instructed them in the correct serving procedure.

Sixteen girls are studying advanced divisions of nutrition in foods and entertaining this year. Members of the class include Nell White, Sissy Blackwell, Fredda Free, Sissy Tibbels, Brenda Weaver, Patsy Nyl, Mar, Fron, Jessie Underwood, Edwena Edmonds, Ruth Herrington, Charlene Blackwell, Janie Fisher, Barbara Ford, Mary Anna Herweek, Carolyn Powers and Army Jean Woodruff.

Six juniors and 10 seniors make up the class. The fact that the student has a choice in choosing which years to study art of home making, accounts for the different classification of grade levels. Students may start the subject as early as the freshman year, or may decide to wait later, take one year, and something else the next year, or take the course in consecutive years.

The class is divided into four groups, there being four groups available to prepare demonstrations. Occasionally, it is a team demonstration, rather than the group.

In the first year home economics there is a study of basic principles in the cooking and planning of balanced meals, on the simpler side. Second year work brings in a review of the first year's work, and going into the preparations of meats, more complicated desserts, such as frozen ones or pies, planning of complete full meals, even to the buying of the groceries. The third year culminates the study of nutrition and prepares the young ladies in the role of hostesses in their own homes.

Perhaps the greatest underlying factor of all the study of home economics is time management, stressing if one does not properly plan the use of time, you would neither know what or when to undertake any project, especially in managing a home.

During the progress of the year's study, the class will plan an entertainment with a group undertaking the planning and preparation of the meal, one group doing the setting of the table and serving the meal, and one group taking their places as hostesses and eating with their guests at the prepared meal. Such will be the case, as the class invites a few faculty members at a time to luncheons.

FOR SCHOOL POSTS Contests Loom In County, Districts

County Judge Scott Bailey has certified candidates for school board posts in six districts in the county and for county trustees.

Lloyd L. Bruce of Ranger and J. D. Lauderdale of Cisco, both incumbents, are the only candidates on the county level who have opponents.

Bruce, a veteran school man, is opposed by C. F. (Frank) Coats of Cisco for county trustee at large, and Lauderdale faces Aubrey Easter for the Precinct 4 (Cisco) spot.

Jay Koonce is unopposed for the Rising Star county board seat.

Two places are to be filled in the Carbon district.

R. O. Duncan and Paul Norris are both seeking re-election, opposed by G. B. O. Warren, A. E. G. and J. D. Griffin Jr.

R. M. Paek is unopposed for re-election to the Desdemona board, as are S. C. Cotton and Roy Holly in the Rising Star

school race.

Four places to be filled in Scranto, with incumbents Louis Morgan, Elvy Taylor and R. F. Starr seeking re-election and R. E. Thompson vying for one of the spots.

Pat Mosley has announced for one of the two spots on the Olden board. Both J. C. Everett and J. D. Harrell are seeking re-election.

In Gorman, Arnold Butler, Othel Clark and E. N. Higginbotham seek school board posts. Former holders did not announce.

Districts with less than 500 enrolled, file candidates' names for certification with the county judge.

In Ranger, whose school does not file for certification, four candidates have filed for two positions on the board. Seeking election is incumbent Lonnie

Annual Livestock Show 'Ready to Roll' Friday

Competition will be the keenest and interest the greatest when the 1963 edition of the Eastland County Livestock Show begins unfolding in Eastland with judging Friday morning.

The total entry list has already topped 650 animals — putting the show in the top bracket of county shows in the state.

Months of grooming and preparation will come to a climax for hundreds of 4-H Club and FFA members and individuals with the giant show this weekend at the new show grounds, located north of hay-dite plant, just off Highway 80.

Rose Wilson of Gorman, president of the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, has announced that this year's show will be the biggest and best ever. To cite one area where competition will be stiff, Assistant County Agent Roger Blackmon has announced that there are almost 50 head of steers vying for top honors in this year's show.

It's a spectators' sport, and the public is being cordially invited to come out and match their wits with the judges.

All animals are to be on the show grounds, properly entered and in their stalls prior to 10 p. m. Thursday, so that classifying and sifting can get underway at 8 a. m. Friday.

Judges are top-flight, Wilson said, and are as follows:

Sifting and classifying, Jake Joyce of Coleman; angora goats, Garland Cody of Breckenridge; Sheep and fat lambs, C. T. Parker Jr. of Ballinger; dairy cattle, Curtis Richardson of Denton; fat steers, Heston McBride of Llano; fat hogs, Dr. Ray Anderson of Fort Worth; swine, Dr. Anderson; and beef cattle, McBride.

Animals shown in the Cisco Livestock Show last weekend will be entered in the county show, and another indication of the popularity of the show is the entry of 67 animals by the Ranger FFA Chapter alone.

Ben McKinnis of Eastland is general show superintendent, assisted in that job by Wilson. Park Flambeck of Cisco heads up the swine division (both classes), assisted by Ben Lancaster and Jimmy Horn, both of Eastland.

C. E. Bridge is in charge of the dairy cattle and George Steele and Joe Criswell head the beef cattle and fat steer divisions.

The annual parade sponsored by the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse will wind its way through the streets of Eastland Friday beginning at 2 p. m.

Eastland schools will have a holiday Friday in celebration of the stock show.

The annual sale will follow the show and will again be held at Eastland Livestock Auction Sale Co., east of Eastland on Highway 80.

O. J. Caraway, owner and operator of the O. J. Caraway Truck and Tractor Shop on Highway 80 East, was born and raised in the Lacasa Community. He is married to the former Miss Dora Elder of East Texas. They have two sons, O. J., Jr., 14, and John Wayne, 13.

He is a member of the Second Baptist Church.

During World War II, Mr. Caraway worked in defense work in Davenport, moving to Breckenridge later. He was shop foreman for Featherline Corporation of Ranger about two years.

Mr. Caraway states this is his first time to seek public office and that he has had 25 years experience with heavy equipment and contracting on the maintenance and operating same.

Fred Bennett, shop foreman

of Social Science, Inc., was born and raised in Gorman where he graduated from high school. He is married to the former Miss Peggy Bell and they are the parents of two boys, Gary, 14, and Mike, 6.

Mr. Bennett is well known in this area for his work with the Boy Scouts for the past eight years. He is a committee man on Explorer Post 10, a member of District Scout Master Training Team and Scout Master of Boy Scout Troop 10.

Mr. Bennett is a member of the Printing House, Christian, serving on the board of directors for a year. He is the Past Vice President of the local organized Jaycees and has also served on the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce.

He served in the military force for two years.

He and his wife are owners and operators of the Building Grill.

This is his first time to enter politics and made this statement, "I am an independent candidate, and will serve on my own merits. I ask only for the opportunity to serve the people, if they desire me to. I have had no previous experience in this capacity, but will strive to give fair and honest service."

Following is a direct quotation of Mr. Cooper regarding his reasons for filing and his qualifications.

"In announcing for Street Commissioner I realize it is a very responsible position. Several years ago I served in same capacity and enjoyed it very much, even though it is a problem to do as much as needs to be done with limited finances.

For the past year I have been retired from Lone Star Gas Company, after 35 years of service with them. I am a native of Ranger having spent all my life here. Mrs. Cooper was Vera Blackwell before our marriage. We have one daughter and her family Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Horton and three grand children, Sharron, Jimmie and Jeff of East Bronswick, New Jersey.

Have been on Board of Regions, Ranger Junior College for past few years. I believe in the future of Ranger and would like to be of service in any way that will help the growth of this City and Community."

COURT APPEAL DELAYS CISCO SCHOOL PROJECT

Another delay of up to four months was in prospect for the Cisco Public School's \$700,000 improvement program today after the 91st District Court's recent decision favoring the school system was appealed to the 11th Court of Civil Appeals by the Citizens Group, opponents of the program.

Attorney Frank Scarborough of Abilene, representing the Citizens Group, filed an appeal in the suit styled Park P. Plambeck vs. Cisco Independent School District at the District Clerk's office in Eastland Monday morning. Notice of appeal had been given at the conclusion of the trial last month.

An appeal bond in the amount of \$500 to guarantee court costs was signed by Albert A. Hansen and Claude L. Rich, local ranchers.

The Plambeck suit, one of two filed by the Citizens Group in their fight to head off the \$700,000 bond issue, attacked the validity of the Sept. 8, 1962, election when voters approved the improvement program.

The case was heard by Judge T. M. Collier in 91st court last month with a verdict in favor of the school system.

Attorney W. B. Wright of Cisco, representing the school system, estimated that the appeal could cause another delay of up to four months in the improvement program.

Allen D. Dabney Sr., Local Attorney, Dies

Allen D. Dabney Sr., 85, prominent Eastland attorney, died Wednesday at 12:30 a.m. in the Eastland Memorial Hospital where he had been confined since suffering a concussion and fracture of the skull on Jan. 23 in a fall at the Eastland County Courthouse.

Funeral services will be held this morning (Thursday) at 10 a.m. at the Hammer Funeral Chapel with interment in the Eastland Cemetery.

Officiating the services will be Don H. Morris, President of Abilene Christian College, assisted by John H. Bannister, minister of the Skillman Avenue Church of Christ, Dallas.

Born August 27, 1877 in Breham, Tex., he spent his childhood days on a stock ranch in Comanche County, and his manhood taught school at May Tex.

After graduating from the University of Texas law school he began his long and colorful career as a lawyer in Eastland, moving later to Eastland in 1909 when he was elected Eastland County Attorney.

Mr. Dabney was a known throughout Texas legal circle as a "fire and brimstone" type of speaker, often using the Bible in references to the jury. His forte was that of a defense lawyer.

However, on one occasion, he was hired as an additional State Prosecutor in the famous "Hanging Skelton Case" in the early 1930's.

The case involved the prosecution of a defendant who had been charged with the murder of an individual whose skeleton was found hanging from a mesquite tree near Ridge Star. He assisted then County Attorney Grady Owen in handling the case.

A devoutly religious man, Dabney had served on the Board of Trustees of Abilene Christian College for 45 years at the time of his death. He was one of the original members of the Eastland Church of Christ and was instrumental in the erection of the present Church of Christ building in Eastland in 1919.

In his earlier years, he was very active in city affairs serving at one time as President of the Eastland School Board, and Chairman of the Eastland City Commission in 1926, drafting the present Eastland City Charter as amended in 1929.

Mr. Dabney was married to the former Mable Spence on November 5, 1905.

Surviving are the wife; three sons, Allen D. Jr. of Lubbock, James of Eastland and Thomas of Dallas; one daughter, Mrs. Geraldine Dabney Sullivan of Dallas; six grandchildren; and one sister, Mrs. Joe Houghton of Brownwood.
