## Gohlke, Mrs. Cox Win Election

Ranger citizens picked two new members for the vacancies on the Ranger Independent School Board of Education, Saturday, April 6.

Mrs. Dewey Cox, Jr., the only woman who had filed for a position with the board, was given 363 votes to lead the race. Dr. Luther Gohlke received 339 of the votes, with Bill Guess for 235, and Lonnie Stephens receiving 219. A total of 600 votes were cast.

The two new members will fill the posts now occupied by incumbent Lonnie Stephens and Gaston Dixon, who did not file this year.

Voters also were deciding on the member for the county school trustee. Lloyd Bruce lost to Cisco's C. F. Coats in that contest.

## Father Of Local Resident Dies; Rites Thursday

Funeral services were held Thursday for James Ace Carey, father of Mrs. Noble Robertson of Ranger.

Mr. Carey, 87, retired Stephens County farmer, died Tuesday evening at the home of a nephew Carl Carey.

Services were held at 2 p. m. Thursday in Walker Street Church of Christ, Breckenridge, with Burt Grooves, minister, officiating. Burial was in Gunglight Cemetery, south of Breckenridge. Melton Funeral Home was in charge.

Born in Little Rock, Ark., Mr. Carey came to Stephens County in 1877. He had farmed in Harpersville and Gunglight until retiring in 1945 and moving to Breckenridge. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Robertson, and Mrs. Robert Herring of Gorman; three sons, Carl, Clifford and Burl, all of Breckenridge; three sisters, Mrs. Willie Thompson of Crosby, Mrs. Nettie Kline and Mrs. Pearl Kline both of Dallas; 16 grandchildren and 32 great-grandchildren. Five children preceded him in death.

## ATTEND GAS CONFERENCE

D. L. Covington and H. S. Twyman of Ranger were among over 230 participants from 20 states and Canada attending a Gas Conditioning Conference, April 2-3, at the University of Oklahoma, in Norman.

Topics discussed included dynamic absorption of light hydrocarbons, cold weather operations, glycol and methyl alcohol injection in plants and gathering systems, acid gas treating and an operations roundtable.

## Clyde Wins 10-A Meet Baird Comes In Second

Clyde and Baird made strong bids for first place in the District 10-A track meet held at Ranger Junior College track meet here last Saturday, with Clyde winning first place honors by a one-point margin. Clyde posted a total of 152 1/3 points to 151 1/3 for Baird. Third place went to Albany with 83 points, Ranger was fourth with 39 points, Eastland posted 30 points for fifth place and Cross Plains had 10 1/3 points for sixth place.

In the freshman division Ranger won first with 33 1/2 points. Cross Plains 2. Robinson, Ranford with 33 points, Eastland came in third with 30 1/2 points and fourth and fifth places went to Clyde with 25 points, and Albany with 7 points.

Clyde walked away with first place in the junior high division when they polled a total of 46 5/6 points. In second place was Cross Plains with 32 2/3 points, third place went to Albany with 29 5/6 points, fourth was Eastland with 14 1/3 points and Ranger posted 13 points for fifth.

## Clarence Berry Of Oklahoma Dies Here

In the sight-reading event, the band was put to the test of making application of the knowledge it had obtained when they played a selection which the director had never seen before. This is a parallel to the achievement tests given in other subjects of the school program.

The outstanding band of each class was awarded a special trophy. The Ranger Band was the last class A band to perform, following the Alvarado Band which had just received sweepstakes. At a point of evaluating the bands, the judges selected Ranger over Alvarado as the outstanding band of class A.

## Civil Defense Approves Base Plan For Disaster Relief

Mayor Morris Newnham, civil defense coordinator for Ranger and T. C. Weaver, assistant civil defense coordinator, announced today that the Base Plan of Operation in case of disaster in the city of Ranger has been accepted and approved.

Approval was given in a letter from George W. Busby, director office of Defense and Disaster Relief for the State of Texas.

Mr. Busby stated in the letter that "it is hoped that this plan will never have to be used, but it should satisfy the requirements in the event there should be a disaster in your area."

"You and the city officials are to be congratulated on the progress that you have made in civil defense planning for the city of Ranger", the letter concluded.

Assistant Coordinator Weaver said today that plans are being made locally to install two citizen-ban radios in one of the city booster fire trucks and also in the city water department truck. He also said that a large warning siren for the city will be ordered in the near future.

He said that one building in Ranger has been approved for use in case of nuclear bombings and that several more are expected to be designated as shelters in the near future.

## Paving Campaign Complete Mayor Newnham Reports

Mayor Morris Newnham announced today that the current paving program in Ranger has been completed. He reported that a total of 60 blocks have been paved in the most recent campaign and that a total of 108 blocks were paved in the fall of 1962. All assessments have been on a voluntary basis and the city participation has been paid for out of current funds and no taxes will be increased because of the paving, the mayor reported.

He extended his thanks to property owners for their splendid response and invited them to call city hall to report defects in the new paving when cracks or holes appear. He said that in this way the city can make repairs as needed, thereby making the paving last a much longer time.

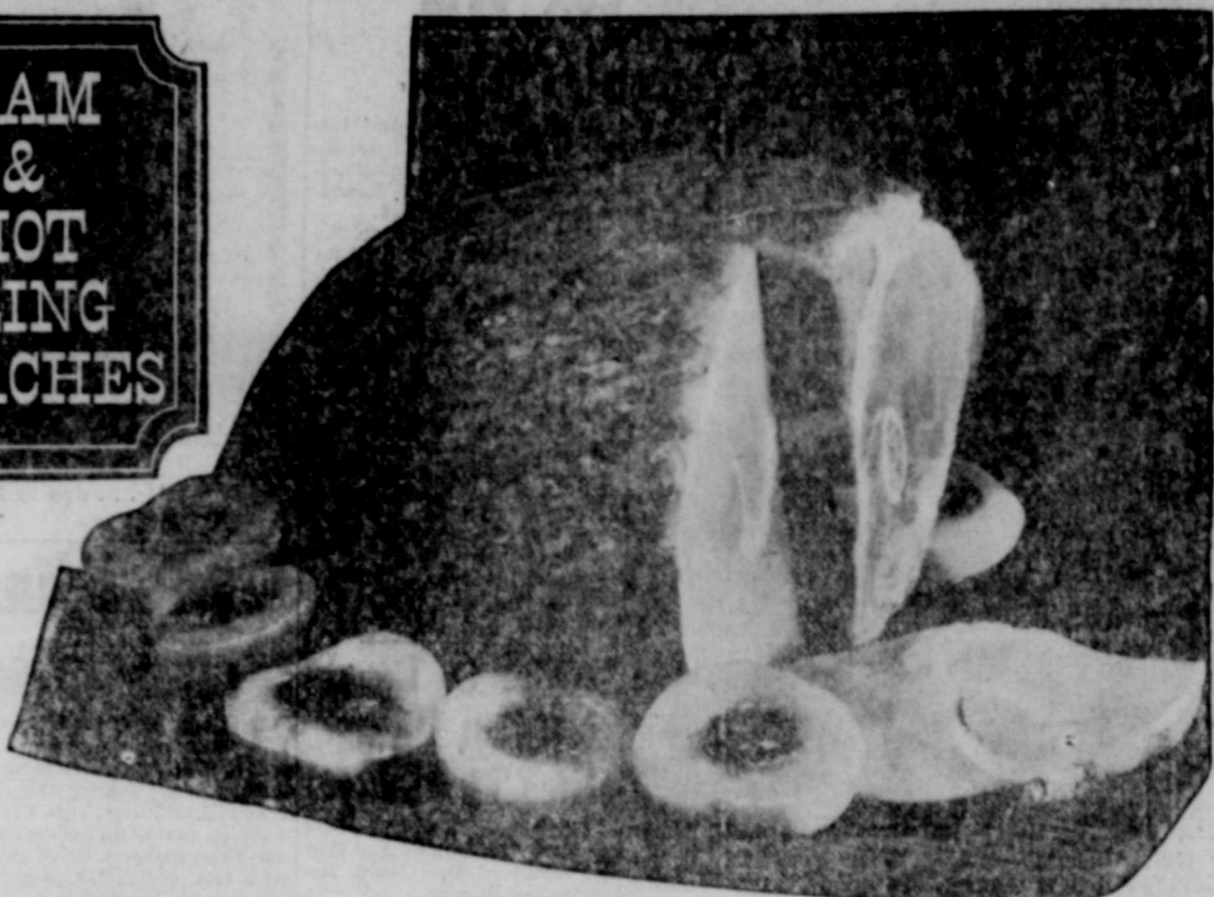

# Accent on Health

J. E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

Sooner or later, everyone needs a family health record. Dr. J. E. Peavy, state health commissioner, suggests you

children's school records, for insurance data, and for your family doctor's use, the health official says.

A school note pad makes a good record book, but don't use it for anything else. And remember it has to be carefully kept if it is to be of full value.

You can start by jotting down the basic information you already have at hand concerning the injury and illness history of each member of your family.

Start it off with a brief list

ing of family history. Enter the date and place of birth of each person, and the place and date and cause of death of any deceased. Also enter pertinent information and the medical facts about each family member, such as the presence of chronic illness— or physical handicap.

Next, start a section for dates of immunizations, being sure to provide space for each member of the family.

Allow room for entering dates of immunizations against whooping cough, polio, small-

pox, diphtheria, tetanus, and typhoid fever. Don't forget to include the dates of booster shots.

In a section of general information, list such things as the type of blood each member of the family has, and the drug sensitivities or special allergies of each. If the RH factor is known to be present in anyone, be sure to record it prominently.

The health record ought to include a check list of who in the family has had the more common diseases of

childhood — chicken pox, measles, mumps, whooping cough, scarlet fever, diphtheria. Most of these are diseases of childhood, but sometimes an adult is exposed. German measles is a serious threat to expectant mothers, and mumps is a dangerous disease in any adult.

Dates of physical examinations, with a line or two for notes of special advice or instructions that followed the check-up should be noted in the health record. So also should illness requiring hos-

pitalization, listing the nature of illness or injury, name of physician and hospital, dates of entry and discharge, length of illness, and type of surgery, if any.

Finally, list the family's health and accident insurance information for quick and easy reference when needed. (A weekly feature from the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

People who are deliberately indifferent to their personal hygiene are as scarce as pur-

ple cows.

Nature has endowed most of us with an acute sense of pride about such things as daily bathing, brushing teeth, clean fingernails, good grooming. We would go to practically any length to avoid being offensive to anyone — customers, co-workers, or whoever.

And most of us resent even the slightest suggestion that there are times when our PH (personal hygiene) quotient slips a little.

Think about it for a moment: what in this competitive life is as important to the average man or woman as personal cleanliness? What contributes more to their being accepted and welcomed by others.

Fortunately a high PH quotient is easy to come by. Actually it is a habit, a way of life, and a very pleasant one. Here are its main ingredients:

Bathing: Daily bathing is as refreshing as it is healthful. Besides making you more agreeable to be around, you are less vulnerable to disease when you wash off the 24-hour accumulation of perspiration and soil. Most people find it practical to wash their hair at least once a week. One brand of soap isn't necessarily superior to others. The important thing is to use plenty of it.

Dental health: This is absolutely essential to a high level of personal hygiene, so see your dentist regularly. Don't be confused by television commercials about the therapeutic and cosmetic effects of certain tooth pastes or powders. The brushing is what counts.

Fingernails: Nothing is more fatal to attractiveness than dirty fingernails. By all means check yours every morning as part of your getting-ready-for-the-day ritual.

Handwashing: Frequent handwashing, particularly after rest room visits, is another part of a high PH quotient. It is a must habit for cooks, waitresses, barbers, beauty operators, etc.

These ingredients blend together to give you a PH quotient your daily associates will appreciate. Each is a habit in itself, well worth acquiring. We owe it to our friends and co-workers. Perhaps more important, we owe it to ourselves.

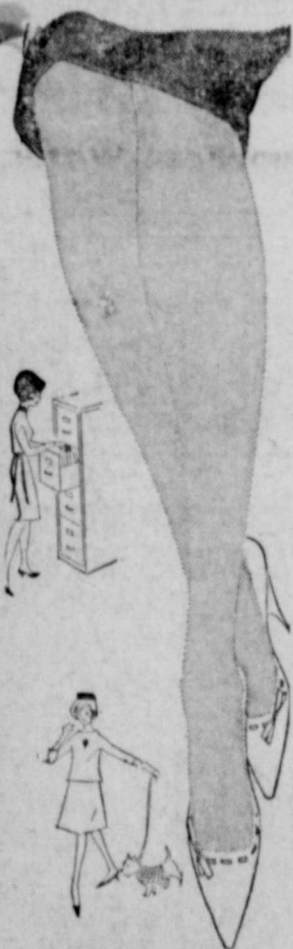

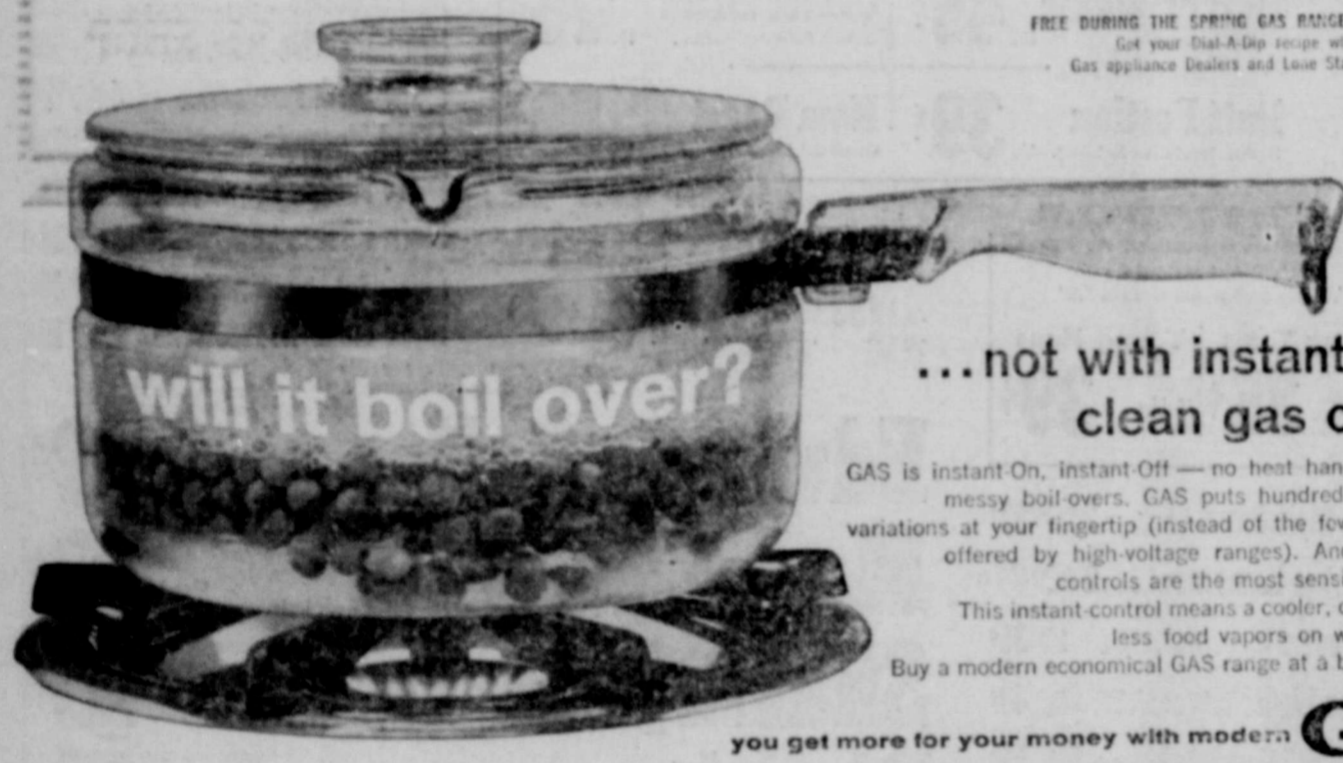

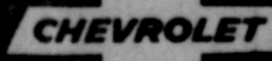

Seventeen girls have shown interest in the Bluebirds by completing the preliminary form.

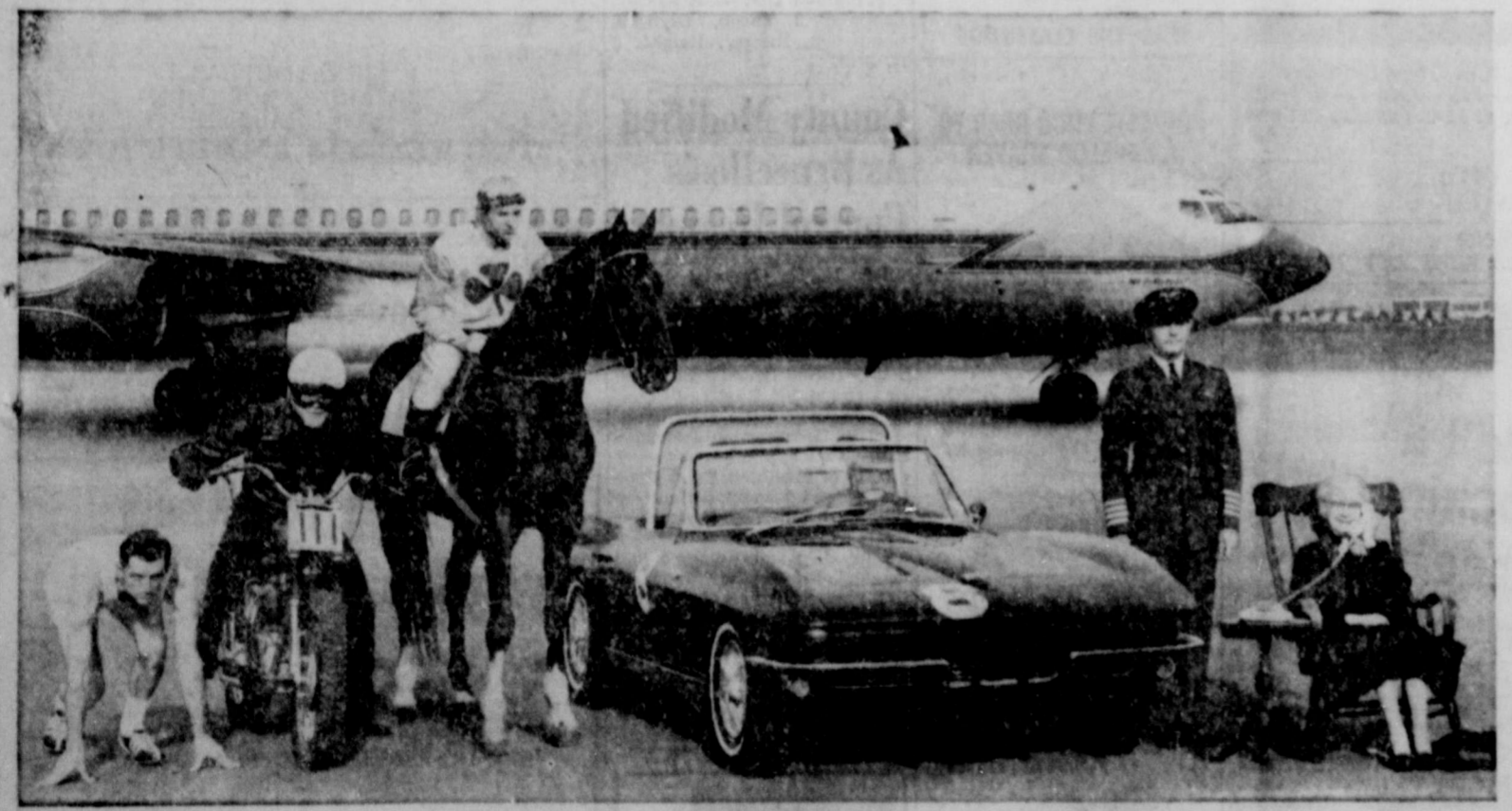

### Rev. Sullivan Gives Views Of Student Troubles

Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of First Baptist Church and advisor of the Baptist Student Union of the RJC campus, recently gave his views on the major problems facing modern students.

"The greatest problem," according to Rev. Sullivan, "is in the area of motivation. Students simply do not have the desire necessary for their studies."

Another big problem regarding the integrity and reliability of students. Cheating has become a big difficulty because of students' trying to "get by" without really studying the subject. The old adage, "The end justifies the means," does not apply to good grades through cheating since grades are not the desired end.

Rev. Sullivan suggested several ways of helping students overcome these problems, through help from churches, school, and the home.

"The Church can help," he stated, "by upholding standards that lend themselves to the development of motivation. Specially the church should keep before the young people the supremacy of the will of God as the ultimate standard for life. Education in the schools can give in the mind and heart of youth the idea of service and can instill patriotic ideals."

However, the best time to solve the students' problems according to Rev. Sullivan, is before they become problems. The home, basic in any situation is a key to solving the problems. Traits of personality are formed in the child at a much earlier age than most people realize. The home can cooperate with the church and the school in helping the child.

"The attitude of parents toward one another, toward the child, toward the world, toward their problems," he concluded, "all go into the making of a child's personality, thus determining the way he faces his own problems."

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### If You Want Long Life, This Area Recommended By Dr. J. E. Griffin

If you want to have a long life, the Cisco area is good country to live in, according to a person who should know — 91 year old Dr. J. E. Griffin of Cisco.

Dr. Griffin, who came to the Cisco area in 1909, says that the general conditions of this area make it as healthy a country as a person can find, and cites the large number of people in their 80's and 90's who live here as evidence that the high country and low humidity is conducive to long life.

"I had more malaria chills than anywhere else in Texas until I came to this country," says Dr. Griffin. "The disease had about run its course, and I would have probably been dead within a year if I had not come here from the swampy area of East Texas where I had been living."

The Doctor, who was born in Rankin County, Mississippi, on November 11, 1871, graduated from the John Sealy Hospital Medical School at Galveston in 1900. He has been in retirement since he fell and broke his hip in 1961, but he still does some doctoring when one of his former patients feels the need of his advice.

People of the area have reason to remember Dr. Griffin for his medical skill, his reasonable rates, and his willingness to help underprivileged people. A few years ago, a client waiting in the Doctor's outer office overheard him

talking to one of his more underprivileged clients. The man was asking how much he owed the Doctor for the maternity care of his wife. The Doctor said, "Well, I made one trip to your house before the baby came, one trip to deliver the baby, and one trip afterward to be sure that everything was alright. That will be three dollars."

After the man left, the person in the outer office said, "Dr. Griffin, you should live a thousand years to take care of all the poor folks."

The Doctor has a good start, and his many friends wish him Godspeed.

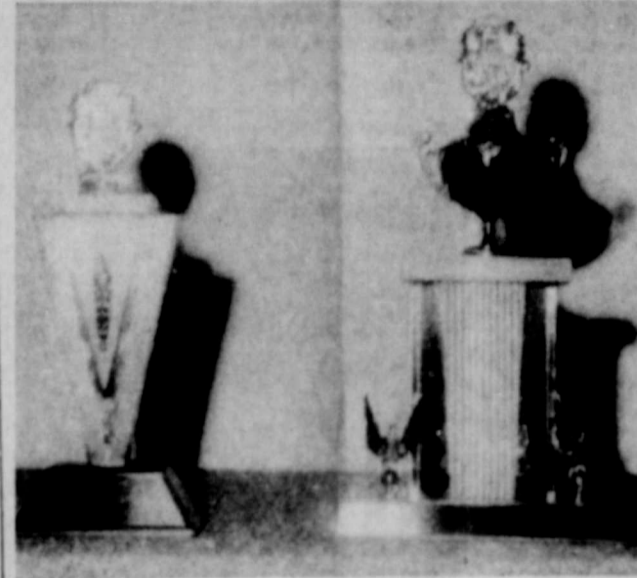

### Rev. Sullivan Gives Views Of Student Troubles

Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of First Baptist Church and advisor of the Baptist Student Union of the RJC campus, recently gave his views on the major problems facing modern students.

"The greatest problem," according to Rev. Sullivan, "is in the area of motivation. Students simply do not have the desire necessary for their studies."

Another big problem regards the integrity and reliability of students. Cheating has become a big difficulty because of students' trying to "get by" without really studying the subject. The old adage, "The end justifies the means," does not apply to good grades through cheating since grades are not the desired end.

Rev. Sullivan suggested several ways of helping students overcome these problems, through help from churches, school, and the home.

"The Church can help," he stated, "by upholding standards that lend themselves to the development of motivation. Specially the church should keep before the young people the supremacy of the will of God as the ultimate standard for life. Education in the schools can give in the mind and heart of youth the idea of service and can instill patriotic ideals.

However, the best time to solve the students' problems according to Rev. Sullivan, is before they become problems. The home, basic in any situation is a key to solving the problems. Traits of personality are formed in the child at a much earlier age than most people realize. The home can cooperate with the church and the school in helping the child.

"The attitude of parents toward one another, toward the child, toward the world, toward their problems," he concluded, "all go into the making of a child's personality, thus determining the way he faces his own problems."

### If You Want Long Life, This Area Recommended By Dr. J. E. Griffin

If you want to have a long life, the Cisco area is good country to live in, according to a person who should know — 91 year old Dr. J. E. Griffin of Cisco.

Dr. Griffin, who came to the Cisco area in 1909, says that the general conditions of this area make it as healthy a country as a person can find, and cites the large number of people in their 80's and 90's who live here as evidence that the high country and low humidity is conducive to long life.

"I had more malaria chills than anybody else in Texas until I came to this country," says Dr. Griffin. "The disease had about run its course, and I would have probably been dead within a year if I had not come here from the swampy area of East Texas where I had been living."

The Doctor, who was born in Rankin County, Mississippi, on November 11, 1871, graduated from the John Seely Hospital Medical School at Galveston in 1900. He has been in retirement since he fell and broke his hip in 1961, but he still does some doctoring when one of his former patients feels the need of his advice.

People of the area have reason to remember Dr. Griffin for his medical skill, his reasonable rates, and his willingness to help underprivileged people. A few years ago, a client waiting in the Doctor's outer office overheard him

talking to one of his more underprivileged clients. The man was asking how much he owed the Doctor for the maternity care of his wife. The Doctor said, "Well, I made one trip to your house before the baby came, one trip to deliver the baby, and one trip afterward to be sure that everything was alright. That will be three dollars."

After the man left, the person in the outer office said, "Dr. Griffin, you should live a thousand years to take care of all the poor folks."

The Doctor has a good start, and his many friends wish him Godspeed.
