Social Security Payments Now \$217,450 For County

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Eastland County now top \$217,450, R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of social security in Abilene, said today on releasing his annual county benefit data report.

The new monthly figure represents an increase of 12 percent in beneficiaries and 12 percent in dollar amount over

the corresponding period last year.

"This increase can be attributed to the recent changes in the law and to the growth of our aged population," Tuley said. "As most of it is spent for food, clothing, and shelter, there is no longer any doubt that social security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in Eastland County."

More people in Eastland County, he said, could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the law, and for that reason they are urged to visit or call the local social security office whenever they have a question concerning their benefits or responsibilities.

As of January 1963, in the nation at large, more than 18 million beneficiaries were receiving payments at the rate of \$14.5 billion per month.

The following shows the number and amount of each type of monthly benefit paid in Eastland County, as of December 31, 1962.

Retired Worker, 3635, \$217,450; Wife or Husband, 821, \$27,228; Widow or Widower, 363, \$21,477; Mothers and Children 404, \$18,337; Disabled workers and dependents, 232, \$15,490.

Former Ranger Child Killed By Car Friday

Funeral services for Jessie Lee McDowell, 4, were conducted at 2 p. m. Sunday at the Killingsworth Funeral Chapel with Rev. Earl L. Williams, pastor of Eastland Calvary Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

The child had lived in Ranger until about eight months ago when the family moved to Lubbock where the child was born. The family was enroute from Lubbock to Fort Worth to visit the victim's grandmother, Mrs. R. P. McDowell during the Easter holidays. It was reported that after the family car had stopped because of a flat tire about five miles south of Spur Friday afternoon, the child stepped from behind the car in front of an approaching car. According to information received here, officers reported that the accident was unavoidable.

Survivors are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. John J. McDowell of Lubbock, a sister, Patricia Ann, and two brothers, Jackie Ray and John, Jr., all of the home; two grandmothers, Mrs. McDowell of Fort Worth and Mrs. Bertha Stoner of Morton.

Two Accidents Reported By DPS One Fatality

One fatality resulted from a total of 16 accidents that occurred on Eastland County highways during the month of March, according to a report from the Department of Public Safety.

Six personal injuries and nine property damage accidents were included in the total number of 16.

A total of 14 persons were injured and property damage totaling \$10,660.00.

Total damage for the first three months totaled \$34,520.00 compared to the \$14,560.00 for the same period in 1962.

The 1963 fatality compared with none reported in January, February and March of 1962.

Eight personal injuries were reported during the three month period of 1963, while 13 were reported in 1962.

The 25 total for 1963 topped that of 23 in 1962.

A total of 39 accidents occurred in 1963 compared to the 31 in 1962.

Persons injured in 1963 were 27 while only 11 were injured during the same three month period of 1962.

Garden Club Receives \$125 Grant from Sears

The Ranger Garden Club received a Sears, Roebuck, Co. grant of a \$125 recently at the Texas Garden Club Incorporated, Convention held at San Antonio.

Mrs. Joe Jackson, as a delegate for the club, received the grant during the awards banquet.

Grants were awarded in five classes — from \$500 down to \$100. The Ranger Garden Club was one of 39 applications to participate. Their project was flower-bed development located on Main Street intersecting Highway 80 in downtown Ranger. The two beds are 100 feet x 12 feet each, following the curb of the street crossing and are

lighted for evening and have an automatic sprinkling system.

In April of last year the beds were planted with red zinnias, white and red petunias, and red geraniums which bloomed profusely all summer. The flower beds were attended to during the summer months by Garden Club members and many local garden enthusiasts.

During the 1962 Christmas season, the area was spotlighted with life-size figures of Christmas carolers which had been drawn and painted by the art department of the Ranger Junior College under the direction of Mrs. Florine Pearson.

In the fall, tulips and daffodils were planted for spring blooming.

Money won on the project will be used for evergreen shrubs to be planted along backs of the beds, alternating with rows of red zinnias, white petunias, and red geraniums.

Newnham Re-elected Mayor; McGown Water Commissioner

One of the largest turnouts of voters in recent years for a city election, named incumbent Morris Newnham as mayor and G. C. McGown as water commissioner, here Tuesday. A total of 1026 voters cast ballots in the runoff election.

Mayor Newnham received 619 votes to 403 for Dewey Cox Jr. Mayor Newnham is the only member of the present commission to remain in office. This will be a second term as mayor for Mr. Newnham.

Mr. McGown, in his first try for public office, defeated Lee Cantrell, present police commissioner, 520 to 496.

A third scheduled runoff between Fred Bennett and V. V. Cooper for street commissioner was dropped when Mr. Cooper withdrew from the race following the original city election on April 2.

Other commissioners are George Falls, police commissioner, and Dr. S. J. Jones, finance commissioner. Mr. Falls defeated Leonard Pounds and Dr. Jones defeated incumbent W. J. Sipes in the April 2 election.

James Ratliff, incumbent water commissioner, did not seek re-election.

The new commission will be sworn in May 1.

Medical Care Is Estimated At \$1,577,000 In This County

How much do residents of Eastland County spend a year for medical, dental and hospital care? What is their annual health bill, taking into account the amount they spend for health insurance?

According to recent studies, made by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and by the University of Michigan, the cost is going up rapidly in the local area and in most other sections of the country.

Because of the higher prices, especially for hospital care, the millions of Americans who see doctors, buy drugs or go to the hospital each month are finding that their health dollar is buying only two-thirds as much as it did 10 years ago.

In Eastland County, on the basis of the latest figures, the out-of-pocket expenditures for medical care amount to approximately \$84 per person per year, or 6.0 percent of net income.

Some 68 percent of this represents direct payments and the remainder the cost of health insurance.

In line with the rising prices that have been noted nationally, the current expenditures locally compared with \$63 per capita 10 years ago.

These sums apply merely to private expenditures for health care. They do not include government outlays or medical care provided through private charity.

cent, and eyeglasses, hearing aids and other appliances, 2.3 percent.

The net cost of health insurance, meaning the difference between the amount paid for insurance and the benefits paid by the carriers, increased 15.7 percent.

The American public, according to the latest Government figures, is spending \$21.1 billion a year for medical care. About 28 percent of that bill is met through insurance benefits.

In Eastland County, the overall cost of medical care in the one-year period is estimated at \$1,577,000.

10,794 Licenses Sold In County

A breakdown of the county sales is the following: passenger, 7,376; commercial, 1,640; farm, 1,088; trailers (which includes three weight divisions), 566; house trailers, 14; motorcycles, 27; truck tractors, 73 farm tractors, 8 and motor buses, 2.

Tags went on sale in Eastland County on January 1 and deadline for purchasing licenses was April 15.
