



There are many different products at the dairy display case, but they generally fall into three classes. To refresh your memory, here they are. The natural cheeses. These

are sold just as they are pro-ducted, with no additional processing. You will find them labeled "natural cheddar" or "natural swiss" or other terms names. Natural cheeses are apt to be different each time you buy them. The sharpness may be more or less evident. If you plan to buy a large amount of natural cheese at one time, it's a good idea to sample the pro-duct to make sure you are getting just what you want Process cheeses, the second category, are cheeses made by combining one or more patural cheeses. The natural cleeses are heated, pasterued and blended together. The same brand of process cheese will taste the same way every time you buy it. Proces cheese also melts easier and thinds with other foods casier than does natural cheese.

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The third group is the proces cheese foods or spreads. They resemble the process cheeses but have more moisture and may also have dry milk solids and seasonings added. As rule, they are much softer than process and natura
