## Lone Star Employees Told About Company's Share Purchase Plan

Over 200 area Lone Star Gas Co. employees heard details of a new employee stock purchase plan from their company's president at a special meeting in Ranger Tuesday morning.

L. T. Potter of Dallas, Lone Star president, told the large audience gathered in the National Guard Armory that the newest employee benefit programs will go into effect June 1, 1963.

All employees of Eastland, Cisco and Ranger offices and plants were present as well as those from Breckenridge, Gordon and Caddo.

Mr. John Bates, superintendent of the Ranger Lone Star Production Co., welcomed the area employees and introduced the Dallas company executives.

Accompanying Mr. Potter were Lewis G. James, executive vice president of finance and accounting; Dale Cole, vice president in charge of personnel; E. A. Brown, vice president in charge of operations; and Gordon Putnam, head of the firm's insurance and benefits department.

## Schreiner Wins State JC Track, Field Meet

Schreiner Institute of Kerrville won top honors in the Texas Junior College Conference track and field meet in Ranger Monday and Tuesday as teams from throughout the state competed in the annual event.

The Schreiner team compiled 72 points followed by Blinn with 56, San Antonio with 39, Ranger with 33½, Navarro with 25, San Jacinto with 22, Cisco with 14, Wharton with 8, Baytown Lee with 7, and Cooke County with 3.

Ranger Junior College was host for the two-day program. A reception for visiting coaches and school officials was given by Dr. Theodore Nicksick, president of RJC, at Lone Cedar Country Club Sunday evening. The two-day meet opened with preliminaries on Monday, and the finals were run Tuesday.

Keith Owen, fleetly Schreiner sprinter, led his team to the victory. He ran the 220-yard dash in 20.8 seconds to set a new record that had stood for eight years. He ran an impressive 9.6 second 100-yard dash to win that event and anchored the school's two relay teams.

Four other marks fell during the meet as new records were set in pole vault, both hurdles and the shot put.

John McFarland of Schreiner won both hurdles races, Rox Jacobsen of Schreiner won the shot put, and Blinn's Charles Lorenz set the new pole vault mark.

Gary Brister of Cisco won the discus throw with a heave that was two inches short of a new record.

Ranger's outstanding performers were Dail Ables and Mack McCarty, who tied for second in the high jump.

In tennis, Bob Rader of Navarro beat Charles Williams of Cisco for the singles title. The score was 6-4, 6-4. The Navarro doubles teams of Lewis and Grubbs won that division with a victory over the San Antonio team.

In the girls division, Jane Hiley of Temple JC won the singles crown with a 6-3, 6-2 victory over Patsy Whalen of Baytown Lee. In the doubles, Pat Garces and Sally Ortiz of San Antonio beat Peggy Wheeler and Becky Thompson of Blinn, 6-2, 6-3.

Johnny Jones of Temple show a 148 to win the state junior college golf crown Tuesday at Lone Cedar Country Club. This gave him a 72-hole medal score of 297.

Jim Murray of Panola JC was second with a 305, and Ronney Beasley of Navarro came in third.

## TJCAA LEAGUE VOTES OUT SENIOR COLLEGE TRANSFERS

Ranger Junior College was host for a buffet dinner at 7:00 p. m. Sunday, April 28, at Lone Cedar Country Club for visiting presidents, deans, coaches, and athletic directors of the Texas Junior College Athletic Association Conference. This was held in connection with the TJCAA Conference track and field meet held at Ranger Junior College Monday and Tuesday, in which about 300 Texas junior college athletes participated.

Preceding the buffet dinner Sunday evening the coaches and athletic directors met to recommend changes in rules and policies for the conference. At a meeting Monday morning the directors of the conference, made up of presidents and deans of the eighteen Texas junior colleges represented, acted on the recommendations of the coaches and athletic directors.

The conference voted not to accept senior college transfers after May 31, 1963. The resolution stated that "students having participated in senior college organized sports cannot transfer to junior colleges after May 31, 1963, and participate in junior college athletic programs."

It was also decided that a school need participate in only one sport to qualify as a member of the TJCAA Conference.

Officers were also elected at the Monday meeting. The 1963-1964 officers include William C. Weir of Schreiner Institute, re-elected president; W. G. McAlexander, Wharton Junior College, vice-president; and Henry J. Boehm, Blinn Junior College, re-elected secretary-treasurer.

At the suggestion of President Weir, it was agreed to pick sites for athletic meets where no point would arise concerning segregation. Texas Junior Colleges represented are as follows: Allen Academy; Schreiner Institute; Decatur Baptist College; LeTourneau Tech; Blinn, Cisco, Lee, Ranger, Weatherford, Navarro, San Antonio, San Jacinto, Cooke County, Concordia Lutheran, Panola, Wharton, South Plains, Temple Junior Colleges.

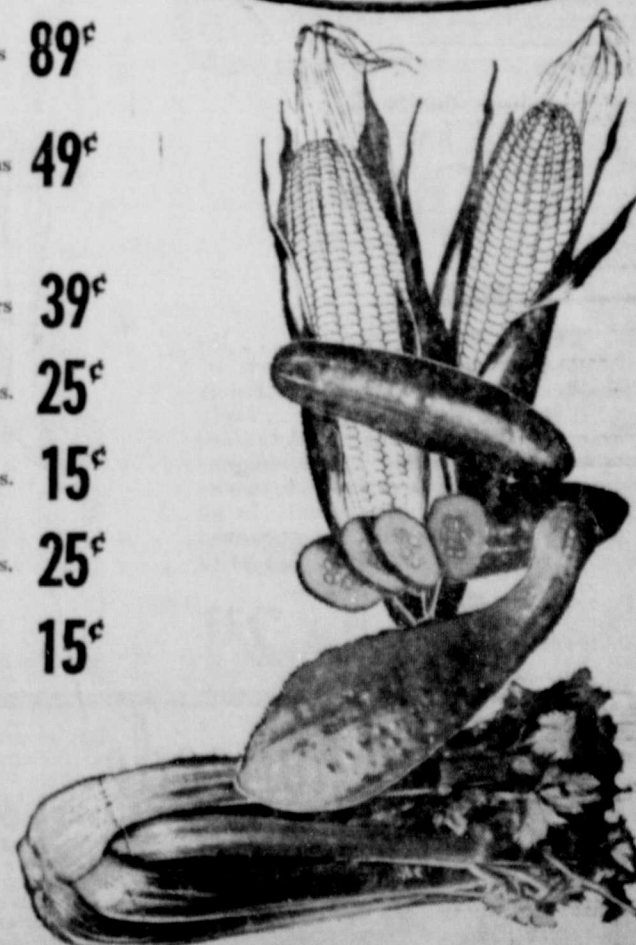

This is part of the extensive building program scheduled for the campus which will include an administration building, a science building and a gymnasium-auditorium

which will have permanent seating for over 1,000 persons and additional temporary seating to provide a total seating capacity for 2,000 persons.  
This gymnasium-auditorium building will be the next project to get under way in the building program, and it is expected that the building program will be ready for use by September 15, according to the college president, Dr. Theodore Nicksick.  
The building will have some 17,000 square feet of floor space with athletic offices locker and dressing rooms, shower rooms and gear storage, housed under the stadium

like seating arrangement. The exterior construction and material colors will be companion to the new dormitory building, which is buff brick with light green trim.
