The bids will be opened and read in the Administration Building in the presence of Board members, Dr. Nick-sick, college president, architects, and contractor's representatives.

The addition will be build to the new dormitory which was occupied on January 3 of this year and will bring the total capacity to 106 students. This is the beginning of an extensive building program which will see the Gymnasium - Auditorium ready for use by September 15, 1963, according to the time schedule, and will provide a new Science Building and Administration Building.

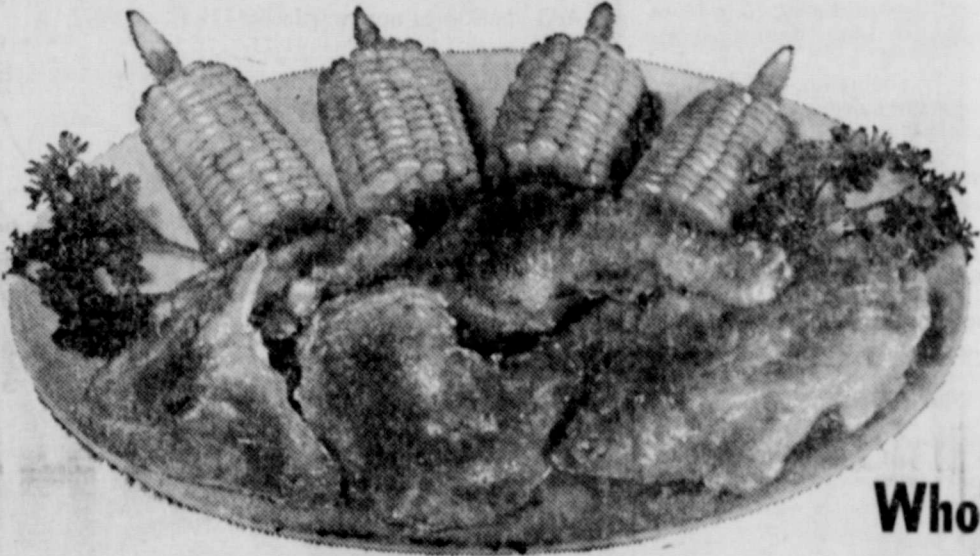
The program consisted of two skits. Mrs. Cora Plumlee and Mrs. Myrtle Short entertained the group with a visit from "Aunt Myrtle".

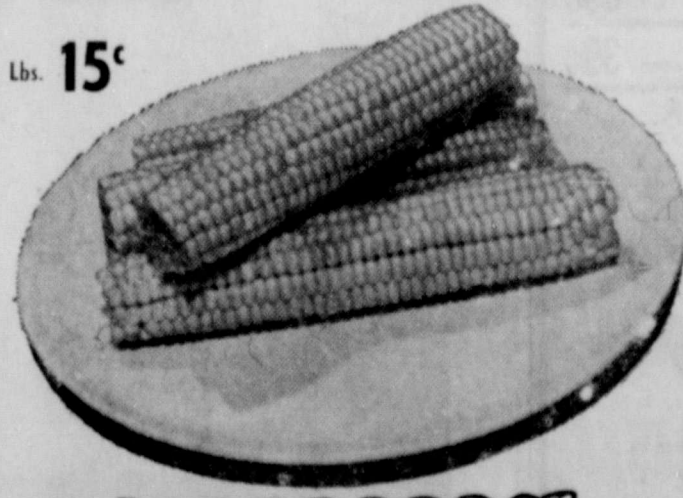

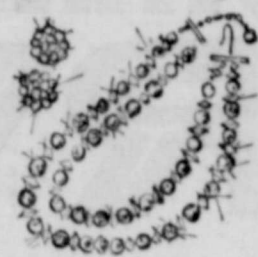

### David R. Flinn Gives His Views On Space Race

Is the space race worthwhile? Is it worth all that we are putting into it? In attempting to answer these questions, David R. Flinn, instructor in mathematics and science at Ranger Junior College, says, "The space race is worthwhile, but part of it cannot be justified now. He says that it is too soon to evaluate it properly, for it is 'curiosity rather than a frontier, combined with a desire to know the unknown.'"

To illustrate his point, Flinn used the example of  $\pi$ , an imaginary number. For five hundred years mathematicians had "played" with the idea of this imaginary number. Not until the last forty years have they been able to make use of the equation.

As to advantages to be de-

received from reaching the moon first, he states, "Whoever reaches the moon first will have a definite military advantage, and if whoever gets there first wants to send a rocket to the earth, he can see to guide it all the way."

In the educational science field he points out that there are enough students that start out a science major, but there are few that finish their courses because they are not capable or are not interested enough in the work involved. However, he assures us, "Students are better prepared here than in any country in Europe except England. The things that students in Europe do, they can do better, but they do fewer things than the students in our country."

He concluded the interview by suggesting that it would be helpful to offer a course in scientific report writing at the junior college level.
