## Contract Signed For Construction Of New Dorm

Dr. Theodore Nicksick Jr. announces that the contract for the construction of the addition to the new boys' dormitory at Ranger Junior College was signed Thursday, May 16, in the office of the president by David D. Pickrell, member of the college Board of Regents.

The contract was awarded to Kinnard-Beck Construction Company of Abilene for a bid of \$53,614.

Construction on the addition will start Monday, May 20, and it is expected to be ready for occupancy by September 15, 1963, in time for the opening of the fall semester.

The addition will provide 48 additional beds, bringing the total capacity of the dormitory to 106 students.

This construction marks the beginning of an extensive building program planned by the college. Other buildings to be constructed this year are a gymnasium-auditorium and a new science and administration building.

## Ranger 'Wet' Election Contest Set Thursday

The question of the legal sale of liquor and beer in Ranger goes to the Courthouse Thursday at 9:30 a. m.

On March 23, this year, a record number of voters turned out for the what was the fourth "wet" vote in that city in 12 months.

With only a 11-vote margin, the wets carried, 643 to 632. Eight Ranger men filed a notice of contest on April 23rd in 91st District Court.

In the meantime, five retail, off-premise stores have opened and are selling beer and liquor in Ranger. Judge T. M. Collie will decide this week if their sales are legal, based on the election, and whether they'll be able to continue to sell intoxicants.

County officials, including the county judge, county clerk, county attorney and each of the four county commissioners, were named in the original petition.

These officials, except one filed an answer to the original notice declaring that they were nominal defendants only and further denied that any irregularity existed such as would change the results of the March election.

In the original notice, the dry forces alleged irregularities on the part of Election Judge Calvin Brown. David L. Hooper, Abilene attorney, represents the dries, and the original notice was filed by W. R. Leonard, Lloyd L. Bruce, J. C. Carter, Alvin H. Woody, Arthur Deffebach, Lee C. Russell, Frank H. Brooks Jr. and Avery J. Sullivan.

Brown and Raymon Bryan had filed by Eastland Attorney Frank Sparks, a notice of intervention, and Judge Collie

Jimmy Lee, president, presided over the meeting during which plans were discussed for a workshop on making record books which will be held the afternoon of June 3.

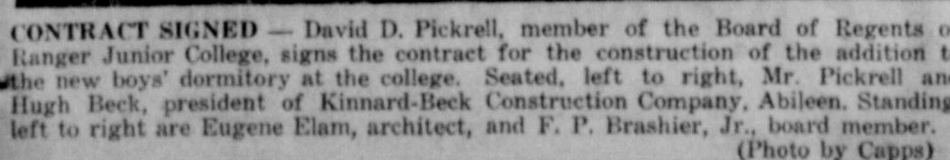

## County Screwworm Case Is Reported; Fly-Drop Begun

A case of screwworms in a two-week old calf on the Davis Smith Ranch, four miles southwest of Gorman on the Eastland - Comanche County line, was positively identified by the Screwworm Eradication personnel on May 10, according to Oscar Schaefer-Rising Star, Chairman of the Health Commission, has advised the County Agent's office in Eastland that the calf will be dropped twice a week for the next four weeks.

The flies, dropped by plane, will be in a two square mile radius centered around the Smith ranch. Schaefer urges all livestock owners in that area to make frequent inspection of their animals for any worm cases. Fresh wounds on any animal should be treated immediately. Should any further cases develop, he urges the owner to notify Smith at Gorman immediately. Schaefer, after an inspection of the area, said that it is entirely possible for a adult screwworm flies to breed in the caves, deep wells or cisterns in that part of the county.

## Browsing With Bev

If you grow asparagus in your garden or if you are a city dweller with a freezer who wants to take advantage of the seasonally low price of asparagus, try freezing some. Home frozen asparagus will keep as long as 12 months in a freezer held at zero degrees or below. Just follow these directions from the U. S. Department of

Agriculture's Research Service. Select young, tender stalks with compact tips. Wash asparagus thoroughly and cut or break off and discard the tough parts. Leave spears in lengths to fit the package or cut them into two-inch lengths. Heat stalks in boiling water according to thickness of stalk; two minutes for small stalks; three minutes for medium stalks; or four minutes for large stalks. Cool promptly in cold water and drain. Pack in containers. Seal and freeze. One to one and one-half pounds of fresh asparagus will

yield one pint frozen.

To get all the nutrients from rice, do not wash it before or after cooking. If you do, you will lose valuable vitamins and minerals.

Modern processing methods make rice clean and ready to cook. By using the correct amounts of water and rice in cooking, you will not have to drain it. The rice will absorb the water.

Also, much rice on the market today is enriched with thiamine, niacin and iron, the nutrients that are lost in the milling process. Vitamin D and calcium, too, are sometimes added. One way this may be done is by adding vitamins and minerals in a powdered form. So, if you wash or drain enriched rice, these added nutrients may go down the drain.

People eligible to receive foods donated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture now get enriched white rice or enriched parboiled rice. Since enriched rice is a new donated food, in the past they received milled white rice, it is important that these persons, in particular, understand how the rice is different and why it shouldn't be washed or drained.

In preparing enriched rice for family size servings, use one cup of enriched white rice and two cups of boiling salt-

ed water. Cover and cook slowly about 20 minutes. After removing from heat, let rice stand covered for 10 to 15 minutes.

Or, place the boiling salted water and rice in a baking pan, cover tightly and bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes.

When cooking enriched parboiled rice, use one-half cup more water and cook five minutes longer than for enriched white rice.
