Feature of the Parade will be the appearance of Miss Texas (Miss Jeanne Amacker) who competed in Atlantic City, N. J., Saturday night. Sharing honors with Miss Texas will be Miss Peanut Bowl, who was selected from a bevy of beautiful county girls in a special pageant Tuesday evening.

The princesses of the Peanut Bowl Pageant will also be highlights of the parade, as will Miss Abilene, Miss Texas runner-up.

Putting military flavor and color in the parade will be the much-honored Armored Division Drill Team from Fort Hood, a five man team which will perform intricate maneuvers within the parade; members in flashy chrome helmets and using M-1 rifles with fixed bayonets. It'll be a "show within a show" on the parade.

## ZIP Code Given Good Reception In Most Regions

The new system of mail sorting and distribution called ZIP Code, initiated throughout the nation by the Post Office Department on July 1, 1963, has been warmly received by the public in general, according to reports from the Post Office Department.

Public acceptance of the program, as indicated by incoming correspondence and by the press, far surpassed expectation. The original concept of ZIP Code was a program to be utilized primarily by large volume mailers; however, this concept was extended and improved by a series of circumstances — chiefly, the warm reception accorded the introduction of ZIP Code by the public generally, and the conclusion by technicians that all mail — business and personal — could be handled with greater speed and increased efficiency with widespread use of ZIP Code.

In the less populated areas, the first three digits of the code identify the main focal points of air, highway and rail transportation, and the last two digits identify the post office or delivery station. In cities that have local postal zones, the first three digits of ZIP Code identify the city and the last two digits designate the local zone number. By reducing the number of steps required in mail handling, and by cutting the time required to process letters, ZIP Code helps the Department contain costs, and operate the postal system with increased efficiency, thus greatly reducing the likelihood of additional rate increases within the coming few years.

## Browsing With Bev

## Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I am a war veteran, but I have never had any dealings with the VA. Can I get a free physical exam from them?

A — Only if it is needed in connection with application for a benefit, such as hospitalization, or for service-connection of some condition.

Q — I heard there is an entire family in my neighborhood being taken care of at a VA hospital. How did they manage to get free medical care for the children?

A — You may have VA care confused with the Armed Forces medical care for families. The VA has no program of medical care for wives and children, although wives may be hospitalized by the VA on their own eligibility if they are veterans. It is possible the family was in some disaster such as an automobile accident and was taken in by a VA hospital briefly, as a life-saving measure. If so, responsible members of the family will have to pay for the care.

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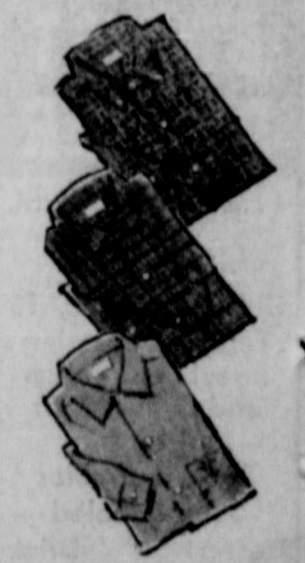
