There will be a number of Eastland County bow hunters take to the fields next Tuesday when the deer season for archers opens.

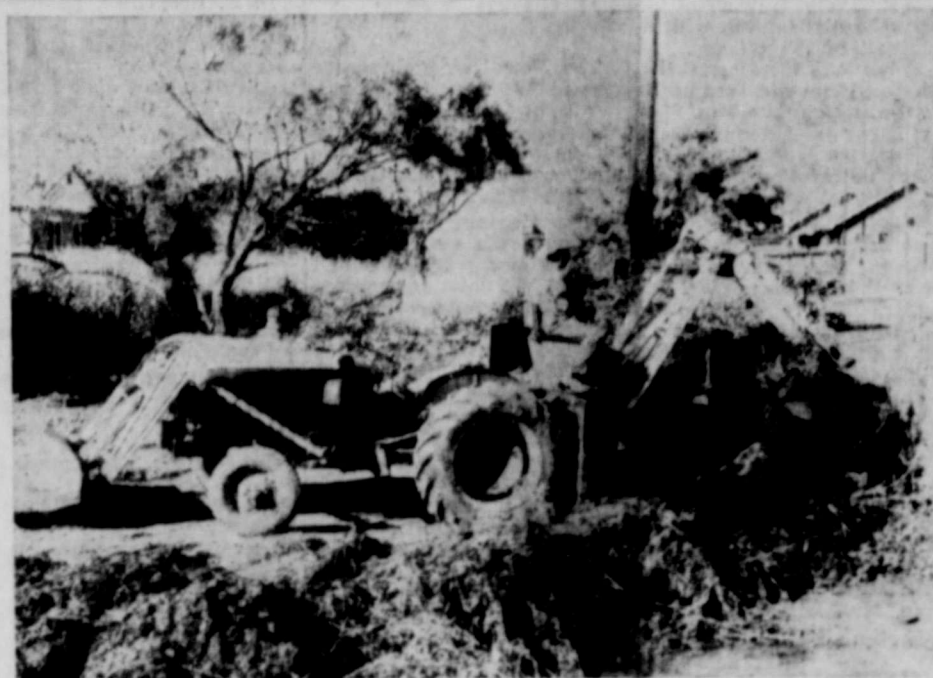
The citation named County Judge Scott Bailey and Commissioners Glenn Justice, J. B. Arther, Buck Collins and C. B. Dill.

Street Dept. In Process Of Drainage System Repair

Progress is being made on the city street department's recent project to open storm drainage systems.

The ditches and creeks which were originally designed to carry off all heavy rainfall have, through the years, become filled to the point of being almost functionless, according to Commissioner Bennett.

Next spring is the date set for the completion of the project which should see all drains and storm sewers open where they flow into the ditches and creeks.

The State, County and Railroad have been approached for a share of the responsibility in seeing this completed. All bridges under Highway 80 will be worked by the state. The county will help with the part that is connected with the county roads.

"The mosquito problem should be helped considerably after the job has been completed," is the report of the street department. "Very little water will stand as it has in the past."

New County Budget Calls For \$430,850 During Coming Year

A budget calling for disbursements of approximately \$430,850.00 during the 1963-64 fiscal year, which begins Oct. 1, has been given tentative approval by the Eastland County Commissioners' Court, according to a report Friday.

The new budget anticipates receipts of about \$400,000.00. For comparison, the county had \$414,709.06 in expenses during the fiscal year that ends this month and receipts were expected to total about \$385,375.00.

The county will continue to be among the five counties of the state with lowest tax rates as the '63-64 budget is based on collecting 80 cents per \$100 valuation, the report said. The 80 cent rate provides 5 cents for the jury fund, 10 cents for the sinking fund, 60 cents for the general fund, and 5 cents for the road and bridge fund.

During the last five-year period, total collections were 92 per cent, the lowest being 91.9 in 1959.

Assessed valuations for next year are \$21,871,540 and were approximately the same last year.

County-wide indebtedness as of January 1, 1964 will be \$41,000, \$15,000 of which will be paid this year.

County Auditor Earl O'Brien reported that last of the road bonds will be retired in 1966 and that bonds have already been paid for 1960, '68, '67, part of '66.

Estimated receipts and disbursements for the various county funds include the following:

JURY FUND — \$8,176.02 receipts and \$8,938.44 disbursements with an estimated 85 per cent collection.

ROAD AND BRIDGE FUND — \$160,576.02 receipts and disbursements of \$58,420 county-wide and \$140,000 for the four precincts, a total of \$198,420. The estimated collection of \$145,000 is expected mainly from automobile licenses with the balance from taxes and fines.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT FUND — \$3,253. A total of \$1,000 is expected to be spent on courthouse maintenance during the ensuing year.

Rangers Take ACC "B" 12-6 In Non-Conference Game

The Ranger Junior College Rangers found the right formula Thursday night at Bulldog stadium, in cooking up an impressive victory over the ACC Junior Varsity.

Take three parts defense, add two parts offense and mix thoroughly with Wildcats for one full hour. The end results — Ranger 12, Abilene 6.

Abilene's only score came late in the first quarter with tailback Cullen Davis taking a Ranger punt on his own 40 and returning 60 yards for a touch down.

The point after was not good and Abilene led at the end of the first quarter, 6 to 0. This lead was not to last long however.

The kickoff following the TD launched the Rangers into the only sustained scoring drive of the evening.

From the 38 Ranger moved 62 yards in eight plays and two first downs to even the score. The big plays on the scoring drive came on two passes from QB Tom Napolitano to Dwayne Jackson. One for nineteen yards and another for the final 27 yards. Rangers try for extra point failed and the score was tied at half time, 6 to 6.

The defenders of the Ranger team was called upon on more than one occasion to man the barriers as the Cats came knocking.

Four times the stiff forward wall pulled the welcome mat from under the Abilene suitors. Two times on the nine yard line and two times on the eight yard line.

On one occasion the Wildcats had first and ten on the fourteen yard line. Four downs.

One play and Abilene was once again in possession following a Ranger fumble on the eleven.

For the second time within minutes the Rangers were called upon to defend the goal line. Again proving equal to the occasion, after Abilene had attained the four yard line, they were driven back and forced to give up the ball on the eight.

After two exchanges, one punt and one by downs, Abilene was forced to kick for the first time of the evening. This proved to be costly for them.

Taking the Wildcat punt on the twenty yard line, John McKee was set free by two key blocks on two hard charging Abilene defenders. With free air to breathe for a short distance to the 50, McKee seemed almost destined to be cut down at that point. Emerging from the swarm of different colored jerseys, he was once again saved by a block. From that point on it was up to the runner with two defenders to take care of. The odyssey of John McKee ended with what was to be the winning score. The point after try failed and the score was Ranger 12, Abilene 6.

AND SINKING FUND — This bond has been retired and will be inactive this year.

ROAD AND BRIDGE SINKING FUND — \$16,152 receipts and \$16,146.25 disbursements (payment of bonds and interest).

COUNTY FARM — \$1,000 receipts added to a balance of \$2,80 and \$2,900 disbursements.

OFFICERS SALARIES FUND — \$104,487 in receipts with the same amount of disbursements.

GENERAL FUND — \$116,252 receipts and \$99,911 disbursements.

Taxes become due and payable on October 1 through January. If paid during October, a 3 per cent discount will be given, with 2 per cent in November and 1 per cent in December.

January requires payment of the assessed amount with interest of 6 per cent per annum. All county taxes become delinquent on July 1, 1964.

EXTENSION OF INTERSTATE HWY. 20 TO BEGIN SOON

Negotiations for additional right-of-way necessary for the construction of Interstate Highway 20 (U. S. Hwy. 80) from 1.5 Miles East of Ranger, East to 3.6 Miles West of Erath County Line will begin in the near future, according to Jack H. Kirby, Supervising Right-of-Way Engineer for the Texas Highway Department in Brownwood.

Appraisals are being made and reviewed by the Highway Department at this time. The minimum right-of-way width is 300 feet to provide working space for the proposed four-lane divided facility. In addition, frontage roads will be provided on both sides of the highway from its beginning point 1.5 Miles East of Ranger to Rogers' Truck Stop near Thurber Hill. There will be no frontage roads at Thurber Hill. Two roadside rest areas are also planned.

This highway improvement is a part of the 41,000 miles of Interstate and National Defense Systems authorized by the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956. Texas will have 3,633 miles of these express, controlled-access highways, of which

Waterflood Meeting Set For October 9

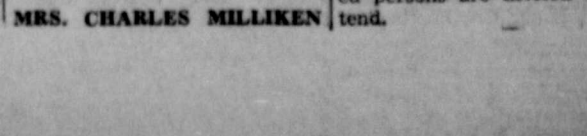

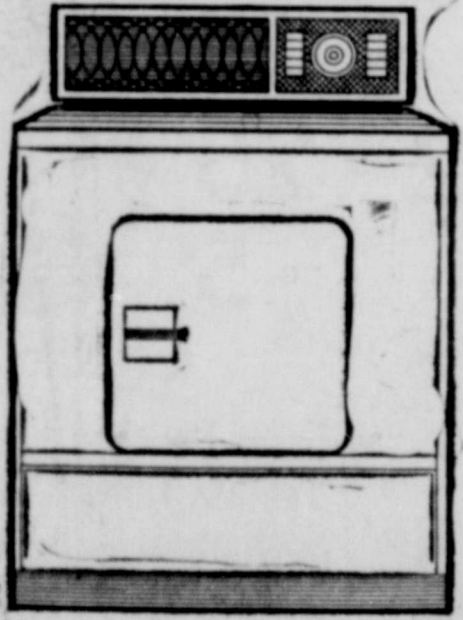
