As Fort Madison is near my wife's home town, naturally there was more than the normal amount of interest in the show.

We watched closely during the parade for the Shriners' car. We had been prepared for this as my wife's little niece was to be riding with the Shriners. Sure enough, as it appeared one could see a small blond head and the smiling face of this little girl on the back of the convertible.

For a little background behind this scene, I will have to go back about two years.

Norma Lee was stricken by polio at the age of four.

The Shriners of Fort Madison took over, providing all the necessary treatments and then just sort of adopted her.

Now Norma is on the road to recovery and the Shriners have maintained more than a small amount of interest in 'her little girl.'

In addition to the Shriners, Norma has another group of friends.

Shortly following her seizure and subsequent release from the hospital, she was noticed by this group of men as she played in the yard. The braces she wore was evidence of her plight and the hearts of these men were touched.

On succeeding trips by her home, they became more and more interested in this child they saw playing, happy in spite of her braces.

Soon there was to be gifts. As these men passed on their way to work, they first dropped off a hand carved leather purse. Later it was to be other items of highly skilled craftsmanship.

They expected nothing in return for their generosity, except the smile and wave they received from their adopted child.

These men were not the accepted civic organization like the Shriners.

They were bound by another common denominator. They were criminals from the Iowa State Prison, going to and from work at the prison's farm, only a short distance down the road from Norma's house.

Could these men be so bad in the eyes of a little girl? I do not think so.

Pecan Men From Nine Area Counties Take Part In Tour

Pecan men from nine counties took part Friday in the annual Eastland County Pecan Growers Association fall orchard tour. The program included visits to five orchards, a new-type sprayer demonstration, and a luncheon at the Victor Hotel in Cisco.

Beginning at 9:15 a. m. with coffee at The Spot Restaurant in Cisco, the tour went first to the Earl Walker orchard, south of Cisco. There they saw 130 improved trees with a good crop outlook.

Next, the tour went to the F. O. Hilburn orchard on the Leon River, south of Cisco. Mr. Hilburn has some 2,900 trees, many of which are improved varieties.

Gary Shayer of Jackson, Miss., demonstrated a blower type spraying machine for orchard use. A new tractor was provided for the machine by

Bob Perkins, Eastland Implement Dealer. The machine took a chemical mix and sent it in mist form throughout the trees. County Agent J. M. Cooper said the pecan men were impressed with the machine.

Following the demonstration the tour went to the Thurman Bros. orchard, also south of Cisco. Here they saw some 1,000 trees of several improved varieties in good crop.

At the Victor Hotel, President C. E. Smith of the association presided. Guests were introduced by Mr. Cooper, including George Blackburn, county agent of Stephens County, and others. Anton White, Cisco, gave a welcome address.

Bids for the 1963 pecan show, which will be held Dec. 13-14, were entered for Ranger by Manager Roy Plumlee of the Chamber of Commerce and for Cisco by Anton White.

Tom Denman, horticulturist at the Agriculture Extension Experiment Station at Stephenville, spoke briefly to report that fertilizer experiments are underway on five river bottom orchards. He noted that production in these orchards has not kept pace with the upland orchards.

Mr. Denman added that

Ranger College Band To Play At State Fair 6th

For the second consecutive year the Ranger Junior College Band will be guest performers at the Texas State Fair, Dallas, October 6 has been designated as Ranger Junior College Day at the Fair, and the sixty-six piece RJC Band, under the direction of Roger C. Martin, will make two appearances. The group will play a thirty-minute concert at 3 p. m. on the outdoor Mobil Stage and at 6:15 p. m. will participate in the Texas State Fair Parade around the fair grounds.

The band will appear in Dallas after performing at the football game between Ranger Junior College and Wharton Junior College on October 5 in Wharton and spending the night in Temple. Two Greyhound buses will be chartered for the trip.

After the performances at the Fair the band will leave Dallas at 7:30 p. m., have dinner in Fort Worth and arrive in Ranger at 10:00 p. m. Sunday night.

Accompanying the band will be Mr. and Mrs. Roger C. Martin and Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth E. Alford.

Mr. Cooper said the county's overall pecan crop appears to be about 45 per cent of normal. Inspection of orchards has shown from 30 to 70 per cent crops, he added.

During the afternoon, the tour went to the Cole orchard, southwest of Cisco, where 38 acres have some 400 improved trees. The tour ended after an inspection of the Carlisle orchard, ten miles south of Cisco, where there are 350 improved trees.

With approximately 100 persons taking part, the tour was a good success, Mr. Cooper reported.

Flinn said the Saturday, November 9, afternoon parade will kick off the celebration which will include an ex-student's association meeting for election of officers and other business with Richard Bonney, association president, presiding.

A barbecue dinner for students and ex-students will follow the business meeting.

Highlight of the day will be the football game, played at 7:30 p. m. when RJC RANGERS meet Wharton Junior College's team.

A HOMEcoming dance will be held in the Fine Arts Building following the football game.

Flinn said all bands, riding clubs, businesses, organizations and individuals in this area are invited to participate in the parade.

Ranger Resident Shot To Death At Home Of Ex-Wife

Robert L. Bratton, 41, of Ranger was pronounced dead of 'gunshot wounds' at the scene of a shooting incident at the ranch home of his estranged wife, Maurine Bratton, at 9:45 a. m. Monday.

Mrs. Bratton was charged with murder with malice aforethought in the peace justice court of M. D. Underwood in Ranger.

The defendant waived examining trial and \$2,500 bond was set and executed.

The shooting occurred at 7:30 a. m. Monday after which Mrs. Bratton proceeded to Eastland where she turned herself in to authorities.

Sheriff Lee Horn and District Attorney Earl Conner returned to the scene with Mrs. Bratton after summoning a doctor and ambulance from Ranger.

It is reported that Mr. Bratton went to the home of his estranged wife shortly before the shooting, forced his way into the house by kicking in the front door, and threatened her with a knife. Mrs. Bratton received a wound on the hand as a result of the ensuing struggle.

The body was found a few feet from the gate opening onto Highway 16 in front of Mrs. Bratton's home.

The case, awaiting action of the grand jury, will be transferred to the 91st District Court.

Mr. Bratton was associated with Pipe Line Construction work for the past 23 years. He was construction foreman at the time of death.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Alma D. Bratton, one daughter, Mrs. David Evans of Ranger, a brother, Herman C. Bratton of Ranger, one

grandson, David Allen Evans and one granddaughter, Tina Evans, both of Ranger.

Funeral services for Mr. Bratton were held at 3 p. m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Avery Sullivan officiating.

Burial was in the Evergreen Cemetery with Killingsworth's in charge.

"They have the best team I have seen in that class," said coach Williams.

Rev. Crowe Will Speak At Methodist Conference



All interested persons are advised that the construction of Interstate Highway 20 from 0.8 mile Southwest of Ranger to 1.5 miles East of Ranger is being planned by the Texas Highway Commission. The route will leave the present Highway 80 in the vicinity of FM 2461 and bypass the town of Ranger. Ernen Haby, dean of Ranger Junior College and instructor in agriculture attended the Twenty-Fourth Annual American Cotton Congress, held in Dallas September 27. This is sponsored jointly by the Dallas Council on World Affairs.

Burris C. Jackson of Hillsboro is general chairman of the congress and Dr. Willis M. Tate president of Southern M. Tate, president of Southern side of the council.

The theme of the meeting was "The European Common Market and United States Cotton and Cotton Products."

The meeting was divided into four sessions beginning at 9:30 a. m. and ending with a dinner meeting at 7:30 p. m. Among those heard at the afternoon session were Commissioner of Texas Agriculture, John C. White and Dr. Tyrus Timm, professor of Agricultural Economics, Texas A&M University. These two men have just returned from a three-week tour of the Common Market countries and their conclusions were: the Common Market would not generally harm U. S. agriculture industry and some prices would be increased, such as on cotton, rice, mohair and some would decrease, such as chickens, which now are the main contention between West Germany and the U. S.

There are now a 100 million barrels of excess wine in Europe, in spite of the common market. Europeans have been hungry twice within one lifetime and they do not expect to let it happen again. They have gotten a taste of higher or better living standards and they do not want to change now. This was the

opinion of speakers who have studied the situation there.
